
Pierce Avenue United Presbyterian Church

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### 1. WHEN WAS DUR CHURCH BEGUN?

I PRESUME THAT YOU WANT TO KNOW ABOUT YOUR LOCAL CHURCH. WELL. IF MY MEMORY SERVES ME CORRECTLY IT WAS DURING THE YEAR 1893. THE SAME YEAR THAT THE C. E. AND SUNDAY SCHOOL WAS STARTED. INFACT IT WAS THESE TWO AGENCYES THAT CAUSED THE CHURCH TO BE FORMED.

2. WHAT WAS THE COMMUNITY LIKEAT THAT TIME?

THERE WAS NO COMMUNITY AT THAT TIME . THERE WERE BUT 5 OR SIX HOUSES BEMWEEN THE SIGHT OF THE PRESENT CHURCH AND PINE STREET AND THEM WERE ON THE EASTR SIDE OF STEDMAN STREET WHICH IS THE PRESENT NINETEENTH ST.

THE SIDEWALKS WERE TWO BOARDS LAID LENGHTWISE WITH A SPACE OF THE WIDTH OF ONE BOARD BETWEEN WHICH OF COURSE MADE IT VERY INTERESTING FOR THE BOYS AND GIRLS WHO WERE SO INTERESTED IN EACH OTHER THAT NOBOY ELSE LIVED ON THE STREET BUT THEM.

OF COURSE WALKING ON THIS KIND OF SIDEWALK MADE IT VERY NECESSARY THAT THE GENTLEMENN SHOULD USE PARTICULAR CARE THAT THE KADY DID NOT STEP DUNN BETWEEN THE PLANKS. I HAVE KNOWN MANY INCIDENTS WHERE IT SEEM QUITE NECESSARY THAT THEY BOTH SHOULD WALK ON THE ONE PLANK.

> AT THMES THERE SEEMED TO BE NOTHING MUT MUD AND WATER SIGHT AND THE BOYS VERY OFTEN HAD TO WEAR THEIR HIP RUBBER BOOTS, AND ALSO BE SURE THAT THEIR ARM MUSCL WERE IN GOOD SHAPE, ESPECIALLY WHEN THEY CAME TO ANN EXTRA KARGE MUD PUDDLE, FOR YOU SEE IT WOULD NEVER DO TO HAVE THE YOUNG LADEX GET HER FEET WET.

AT THAT TIME ALSO THERE WERE BUT THREE HOUSES BENNEEN STEDMAN STREET AND SUGAR STREET ON PINE STREET.

WHY BID THE PEOPLE ORGANIZE THE CHURCH?

WELL. THE CHURCH AS WELL AS

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL AND THE C.E WERE THE RESULTS OF THE WORK DID BY OUR OLD AND NEVER FORGOTTEN FRIEND MR E A BUTKER. MR BUTLER HAD A BIBLE CLASS OF YOUNG PEOPLE WHO USED TO MEET EVERY THURSDAY EVENING AT THE FIRST PRESBY CHURCH IN THEXXXXX VILLAGE OF NIABARA FALLS NY AT THE AND AFTERWARDS HALL KNOWN AS C M YOUNGS HALL IN THE OLD FRONTIER BUILDING THE PRESENT SIGHT OF BIER BROS AND M AMBERG'S STUBES. THERE WAS A C E SOCIETY KRN FORMED FROM SOME OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE OF THIS CLASS XND AT THE FIRST CHURCH IN 1885 AND CONSEQUENTLY MR BUTLER WAS DRIVEN OUT SO TO SPEAK. HE CAME DOWN ON STEDMAN STREE AND STARTED TO HOLD COTTAGE PRAYER MEETINGS, MEETING FROM , AND AGAIN THIS IS WHERE THE BRAUWN UF THE YOUNG MEN CAME IN HANDY AS THEY HAD TO CARRY CHAIRS FROM HOME TO HOME WHEREEVER THE MEETINGS WERE BEING HELD

IT WAS A COMMON SIGHT TO SEE THE YOUNG MEN AND EVEN THE YOUNG LADIES CARRY A CHAIR UNDER EACH ARM DOWN STEDMAN STREET TO ONE OF THE HOMES . THE COTTAGE - MEETINGS GREW AND PROSPERED AND IT WAS DECIDED TO FORM A SUNDAY SCHOOL. THE FIRST CHURCH BECAME KNIKE INTERESTED AND THE SCHOELKOPF FAMILY WAS PERSUADED TO GIVE THE FURST CHUCRH A LOT IN THE'S COMMUNITY WHICH THEY DID THAT LOT IS NOW OCCUPIED BY THE PIERCE AVENUE PRESBY CH AND SUNDAY SCHOOL.

A MAN BY THE NAME OF ASHER CUDDABACH' BOUGHT UP MOST OF THE LAND IN THIS COMMUNITY AND THEN GOT SORE BECAUSE THE PEOPLE DID NOT BUY LOTS FROM HEREITAND USED HIS INFLUENCE TO HAVE STEDMAN STREET CUT OFF AT WHITNEY STREET OR LANE AND THAT IS WHY THE PIERCE AVE CHURCH IS NOT ON THE CORNER OF 19TH ST AND PIERCE AVENUE. WE SHOULD HAVE HAD A CURNER Lot. AS I SAID BEFORE. WEEWERE A MISSION OF THE FIRST CHURCH

AND THEY CARED FOR US FOR SOME TIME.

SOME OF THE MEN SUCH AS MR BUTLER, MR BRETT, MR DUTCHER, MR LUNDY SR MR WILSON MR CAIN MRS SWAN AND A FEW OTHERS WHOM I DO NOT RECALL AT THIS TIME, GOT TOGETHER AND DECIDED TO ORGANIZE A CHURCH, WHICH THEY DID AND INCORPORATED THE PRESENT PIERCE AVENUE PRESBY CHURCH.

THEY MICENT IN THE LITTLE
BRICK MISSION WHICH WAS BUILT

WHEN THEY HAD GROWN SOME, AND ELL WAS THROWN ON ON THE NORTH SIDE OF THE LITTLE CHURCH AND AFTERWARD A BALCONY WAS BULID IN TE BACK END OF THE

THE NEW ELL AND ENCLOSED WITH SLIDING GLASS WINDOWS.

AGAIN THEY WERE CROWDED OUT AND A NEW CHURCH AUDITORUM WAS ADDED ON THE FRONT OR NORTH END OF LOT WHICH IS THE PRESENT CHURCH. AND YOU KNOW ABOUT THE PRESENT BUILDING IN WHICH YOU NOW SIT AND TOOK THE PLACE OF BOTH THE ORIGINAL MISSION BUILDING AND THE ADDITIONS.

I WANT TO TAKE YOU BACK FOR JUST A MINUTE TO KNEX MR BUTLER'S BIBLE CLASS. AND SAY XXXX AGAIN THAT THIS CLASS WAS THE BASE UPON WHICH THIS PAPC WAS FOUNDED. THE YOUNG PEOPLE WHO ATTENDED THAT CLASS LEARNED MORE ABOUT THE BIBLE FROM WEEK TO WEEK THAN THEY IN SIX MONTHS. LEARN NOWADAYS MR BAX BUTLER WAS NO PREACHER BUT HE WAS A NO I BIBLE STUDENT AND HE FAUGHT ITT FOO. WELL, AFTER THE CLASS WAN HAD RUN A WHILE AND MORE ESPECIALLY IN THIS NEIGHBORHOOD IT DEVELOPED SOMEWHAT INFO A SORT OF MATRIMONIAL BUREWU WHICH WAS SOMEWHAT NATURAL AFTER ALL, FOR WHEN YOU GET A CROWD OF YOUNG PEOPRE A MEETING TOGETHER WEEK AFTER WEEK AND ESPECIALLY THOSE OF OPPOSITE SEXES. THERE IS BOUND TO GROW UP A FEELING OF FAMILIARITY WHICH AS A RULE DEVELOPES ONTO SOME THING STRONGER AND CAUSES MEN AND WOMEN TO PICK OUT CERTAIN ONES WHO ATTRACT THEM IN A SPECIAL WAY.

LET ME GIVE YOU AN APT ILLUSTRATION.

MR BUTLER HELD ONE OF HIS MEEN'N MEETING IN THE OLD ARMSTRONG HOME ON THE PACKARD ROAD OR AS WAS KNOWN IN THOSE DAYS THE OLD LINE KILN. I HAPPENED to aftend that Meeting and in THE COURSE OF THE MEETING MR BUTLER CALLED FOR TESTIMONIES. A YOUNG OVER ON THE OPPOSITE SIDE OF THE BIG PARLOR IN WHICH WE WERE MEETING AROSE AND GAVE TESTIMONY TO THE SAVING GRACE OF JESUS; THIS WAS THE FIRST TIME I EVER LAID ANS ON THE YOUNG WOMEN. I BECAME ACQUANNIED WI RH HER AND AFTER FEELING THAT SHE COULD PUT UP WITH MY TEMPER AND ODDITIES FOR 4 YEARS REFORE SHE DECIDED THAT SHE MARRIAGE COULD DO THE SAME AFTER SHE MARRIED ME AND FOR 35 YEARS ENDING FONDARION THE 23RD SHE CHAS DONE SO. SO IT IS WITH MANA A GOOD DEAL OF PRIDE THAT I SAY THAT I GOT MY WIFE OUT OF MR BUTLERS BIBLE CLASS. I COULD NAME YOU AT LEAST DOZEN OTHER COUPLES WHO CAN MAKE THE SAME CLAIM.

NOW I JUST WANT TO SAY A WORD ABOUT THE MINISTERS WHO HAVE SERVED THIS CHURCH DURING THE PAST YEARS. AS TELE-LAST SUNDAY ... MR GEO NICHOLLS Was OUR FIRST PASTOR HE SERVED FROM JULY 1893 TO APRIL 1896 NEXT CAME THE REV J W ROSS WHO SERVED FROM JUNE 1896 TO OCT 1897. HE WAS FOLLOWED BY MR H D LELAND WHO SERVED FROM DEC 1897 TO APRIL 1898 AND HE IS THE MAN THAT GOT ME INTO TROUBLE FOR HE WAS THE MONISTER WHO HITCHED ME UP TO THIS WOMAN WHO HAS BUSSED FOR THE PAST BE YEARS. ALUNG CAME MR EDWIN D HARDIN WHO HAD JUST COME OUR OF COLLEGE AND SERVED FROM OCT 1898 TO MAY 1903. NEST IN LINE BAVE OB PERSHING WHO SERVED FROM DEC 1903 fo FEB 1906. HE WAS FULLOWED BY OUR GOOD FRIEND US SCHAUL WHO CAME APRIL 1906 AND SERVED UNTIL 1917. HE WAS THE ONE WHO ENLARGED THE ELL WHICH WAS to THE OLD CHAPEL ADDED BUILDING THE BALCONY IN THE ENCLOSING IT WITH REAR AND SLIDING GLASS WINDOWS.

THAT THE NEW CHURCH AUDITORIUM WAS BUILT IN 1911.

HE WAS FOLLOWED BY OUR PRESENT PASTOR WHO CAME TO US IN DEC 1917. DURING HIS MINSSTRY WE ADDED THE CHURCH ORGAN WHICH WAS DEDICATED IN L921 AND THE BUTLER MEMORIAL HALL WAS ERECTED IN

# Found in The 1933 Trustee Minutes.

History of the Pierce Ave. Presbyterian Church.

In 1892 Steadman St., now 19th St. was opened and a few houses built. There being no walks or pavements, the residents were debarred from chuprivileges until Mr. E.A.Butler& Mr. Henry Crowell took\*hand in a series of house to house prayermeetings the first being held in the home of Mrs.M. Connell cornellof Pine Ave. and Steadman St.

Afterwards on prayermeeting evenings, it was usual to see all the chairs of the neighborhood carried to the place of worship. It was soon decided to have a Sunday School and Church. The Sunday School was organized A pril 22, 1893 with 27 present with Mr. E.A. Butler Supt. The Pierce Ave. Presbyterian Church was formed by the Presbytery of Niagara September 19th, 1893 and incorporated according to the laws of New York State Fefruary 15th, 1894.

Its first building erected in 1393 was fifty feet long and thirty feet wide and was constructed of brick at a cost of \$2,500.00. It was placed on the rear of a 60 foot lot given by the Schoellkopf family and located

about 1815 Pierce Ave.

The entire cost of the building was meet by the First Presbyterian Church of this city. Such was the growth of the S unday School that in the spring of 1904, eleven years after its formation, an addition of 35 feet square was added to the north side of the original building at a cost of \$4,000.00\*\*\*\* one thousand of which was donated by the board of Church Erection of our denomination, the remaining remaining being paid off by the congregation in 1906.

The members of the congregation and their friends assisted inmany ways in their efforts to clear up the indebtedness and especially the Ladies

Missionary Society.

In 1907 a balcony was placed in the rear of the church, or rather in other words using a portion of the first or original building for the balcony, we king a Primary Department for the Sunday School 50 by 30 feet at a cost of \$8,000.

In 1905 a personage was erected at 1889 Pierce Ave. at a cost of \$4,500.00 The Sunday School gradually kept increasing until a membership of over 900 was recorded and early in 1911 it was decided to proceed with the Erection of a larger building , large enough to accommodate future requirements. After very careful study of the matter it was decided to erect a building 58 by 60 feet with a seating capacity of 750 and at a cost of \$10,000.00. of which sum the congregation hoped to secure \$5,000.00 by subscriptions and gifts from themselves and friends in the city. The building was completed and turned over to the Trustees April 13th, 1913.

After a few years ,it became very necessary to consider the matter of a pipe organ and finally in 1921 the long standing dream became a reality and the present pipe orban was installed. Very much credit for the realization of the dream should be given to the long and faithful efforts of the choir and

their friends.

The increasing growth of the Sunday School and their demand for additional room and more convenient and serviceable quarters resulted in a call for a special Congregational meeting to be held Wednesday evening Feb.20th, 1924 to consider the matter. After careful consideration a building committee was duly elected to consider the matter in detail and wereefurther given authority to proceed with the erection of a building and equipping the same.

The above organized and proceeded along the lines outlined by the congregation. An architect was secured and contracts were let for the erection of the present Eutler Memorial building. Contractor was notified June 24th, 1925 that the site was ready to demolish the first original building and the

addition to same erected in 1904. The new Butler Memorial building was completed with the necessary equipment and turned over to the Board of Trastee April 3th, 1926.

The essential part of any community is a place to worship so in 1892

E. A. Butler and Henry Crowell formed a group to have prayer meetings in the area homes. They took their own chairs with them. The venture was so successful, that they decided to have a Sunday School and Church. A Sunday School was organized and met April 22, 1893 with 27 present. Eugene A. Butler was chosen as Superintendent. Then on September 19 of the same year the Pierce Avenue Presbyterian Church was formed.

The first building erected at 1815 Pierce Ave. was 30' wide and 50' long. They intended their church to be on the corner of Stedman Rd. and Pierce Ave. (Stedman is now 19th St.), but finally the road did not come through to Pierce. This first building was erected at a cost of \$2500 on the rear of a lot 60' wide. It was donated by the Schoellkopf family.

In 1904 an addition of 35' square was added at a cost of \$4000. The board of Church erections donated \$1000. The remaining balance was paid off by the congregation in 1906. In 1907 a balcony was placed in the rear of the original building for the Primary Dept. of the Sunday School at a cost of \$800. A parsonage was erected in 1905 at 1889 Pierce Avenue at a cost of \$4500. The Sunday School kept increasing until a membership of 900 was recorded.

In 1911 it was decided to proceed with the erection of a larger building - 58' by 60' - with a seating capacity of 750 and a cost of \$10,000. This is our present sanctuary and was completed and ready for use April 13, 1913. In 1921 a pipe organ, much desired by the congregation, was purchased and installed.

In 1924 it was decided not to hold classes in the sanctuary if possible and so a building committee was duly elected. They then made plans to demolish the original building, at the rear of the lot and erect a Butler Memorial Building. This present building was completed and ready for use by April 8, 1926 at a cost of \$45,000.

Then in about 1935 the Church bought the house and lot on the west side of the building. This was rented for a few years then demolished and we now have a lawn next to our church.

Our first pastor was Rev. George Nichols, in 1893. He was later pastor in Dresden & Cato, N.Y. where he died about 1935. Including our present minister, Rev. Roger Purdy, we have had a total of 13. The Rev. W.C. Crofts served our church the bongest time - 22 years.

DREVIOUS TO THE YEAR 1885 A BUNCH OF YOUNG PEOPLE FROM THE FERRITORY OF THE FISHT PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE VILLAGE OF NIAGARA FALLS TOGETHER WITH SOME FROM JOSH STREET PINE AVENUE 29th +30th et-STEADMAN STREET WHICH IS NOW 19TH STREET CLEVELAND AVE - NUE AND NIAGARA AVE AND 16TH AND 18TH STREETS OF THE VILLAGE OF SUSP BRIDGE

USED TO CONGREGATE IN ABIBLE

CLASS EACH THURSDAY EVENING AT THE FIRST PRESBY CHURCH AND AFTERWARD ON A HALL IN THE OLD FRONTIER MART WHICH IS NOW OCCUPIED BY THE **利泉其後太太國帝太太國國政**义 STORES OF BIER BROS AND MAN AMBERG. THE LEADER WAS THAT WELL BELOVED MAN AFTER WHOM THE BUILDING WE ARE NOW SITTING IN MAS NAMED E. A. BUTLER AND THE CLASS WAS KNOWN ALL OVER THE TERRITORY NOW KNOWN AS THE CITY OF NIAGARA FALLS AS THE BUTLER BIBLE CLASS.

SOME OF YOU KN HAVING KNOWN MR BUTLER WILL REALIZE THAT THE MEMBERS OF THAT CLASS WERE STUDYING THE BIBLE AND GROWING IN GRACE AND KNOWLEDGE IN THE YEAR 1885 IN THE MONTH OF OCTOBER QUITE "A FEW MEMBERS OF THE CLASS DRGANIZED A CE SOCIETY IN CONNECTION WITH THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH AND I WA A CHARTER MENBER OF THAT SOCIETY. OF COURSE THIS SOMEWHAT UPSET MR BUTLERS PLANS AND SO HE FOOK THE REMAINDER OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE AND CAME OUT INTO THIS

TERRITORY AND BAGAN TO HOLD MEETINGSAT THE DIFFERENT HOMES. I HAVNE TIME TO SWELL VERY MUCH ON THIS ASPECT OF HIS MEETINGS BUT I WOULD LIKE TO SAY THAT ONE OF THE REQUISITES OF THE YOUNG MEN WAS LONG AND THE HIP RUBBER BOOTS GIRLS OF COURSE WOULD HAVE TO PROVIDE THEMSELVES WITH TH THE BEST KIND OF RURRERS. THAT MANY AND I DARE SAY TIMES THEY TOOK ADVANTAGE OF A GOOD PAIR OF STRONG ARMS BELONGING TO THE LONG HIP Boots.

THE DUTCOME OF THE COTTAGE PRAYER MEETINGS INAGURATED BY MR BUTLERS BIBLE CLASS WAS THE FORMING OF A SUNDAY SCHOOL, WHICH WAS AND KNOWN AS THE ORGANIZED PLERCE AVENUE PRESBY FERIAN SUNDAY SCHOOL, WHICH IN TURN 1893 WAS THE IN OCTOBER CAUSE FOR THE FORMING OF A CE SOCIETY KNOWN AS THE PIERCE AVENUE PRESBYTERIAN C É THE OUTCOME OF THESE UNITED EFFORTS WAS THE PRESENT PA P CHURCH.

THETHE EARLY HISTORY OF CE "LOYALTY" WAS AN OUTSTANDING QUALITY OF THE CE. LOYALTY TO THE LOCAL SOCIETY, LOCAL CHURCH AND ITS MEETINGS. THE CE WAS THE SOCIAL KOMM CENTER OF THE CHURCH WITH WHICH IT WAS CONNECTED. IT WAS THE CENTRAL MEETING PLACE OF ALL THE YOUNG PEOPLE OF THAT COMMUNITY SO TO IN FACT YOU MIGHT SPEAK. SAY THAT IT WAS THE CHURCH NOW THIS SOUNDS AS I PSELF. IF I WAS KNOCKING THE

YOUNG PEOPLE OF TUDAY.

WELL. IF THE COAT FITS PUT IT ON. THERE IS SOME PLAUSIBLE EXCUSE FOR SOME OF THE YOUNG PEOPLES TODAY .
