
The Church Organized For Service

The Methodist Episcopal Church is a great machine. For ten years your pastor has tried to co-ordinate the different parts of the machine so that he would not become lost or confused in running it. He has further endeavored to look upon the local church as a great factory with responsible men as superintendents and foremen. There is no question as to the responsible man. It is the minister. There is no question as to the responsible body of men. It is the Official Board. There is no question as to the responsible unit. It is the membership. The Official Board (Quarterly Conference) created the minister. They have the power to make or unmake him.

The membership through its loyalty or disloyalty have the absolute power of making or breaking the Official Board and thereby either maintaining a factory that produces 100 per cent goods or destroying a splendid institution until it is fit only for the scrap-heap.

The General Conference has provided beautifully for the mechanical equipment of the factory. They have not provided the workmen. We must do that. Neither have they furnished the raw material, the field of our expressed service. We must find that. The following diagram has been made in order that a better understanding may be had of our plan of work under the Departmental idea:

Record of Proceedings

Attending Selection and Purchase of New Building Site for Saint Paul's Methodist Episcopal Church on Seventh Street, Niagara Falls, N. Y.

For more than two years prior to the events here recorded the pastor, Rev. G. S. G. Hares, who was assigned to this charge in October, 1911, had felt and expressed the need of a different location for the church, or radical changes in the present structure.

To bring this matter fairly before the people for consideration, at a regular meeting of the Official Board held Wednesday, June 14, 1916, in the chapel, the following persons were designated by the pastor to act as a Church Development Committee, to report their findings to subsequent meetings of the governing bodies and to the local church as a whole:

The unanimous judgment of this committee was that the highest interests of the church and Sunday School called for a change of location. As opportunity offered this committee sought out several different available sites and finally at the home of the chairman on Sept. 5th, 1916, a meeting of the committee was held and reports received. The following properties were suggested by the chairman as obtainable at the prices named:

After some discussion, owing to a majority of committee being absent, it was moved and carried to recommend to the full committee that the choice be confined to northeast corner

Walnut Avenue and Sixth Street, 132x132, Sixth Street between Walnut and Pine Avenues, 160x132, and Seventh Street between Pine and Cedar Avenues, 160x132. Present: Knapp, Brown, Larke, Hares, Mrs. Miller and Pierson.

A special meeting of the committee was held at close of morning service Sunday, Sept. 10th. Mr. J. R. Fisher was appointed a member in place of J. C. Schwingle, removed from city. All present save M. J. Brown.

The chair reported conclusions of minority of committee favoring submission to Quarterly Conference of the three sites above named. This was approved with the request that sites on Tenth and Eleventh Streets at Walnut Avenue, be also reported on after an investigation. Messrs. Cathcart and Knapp were appointed a committee to secure options on the last named properties and Pierson and Larke on the other named sites, each being given power to make necessary payments to secure such options.

At a meeting of the Quarterly Conference held in the church Sept. 26, 1916, Messrs. Knapp and Cathcart reported their inability to obtain a price on any other satisfactory sites east of the Erie R. R. The other sites on Sixth and Seventh streets were then presented, an option having been duly granted on the former, together with only a verbal offer on the latter.

The Seventh Street property was unanimously preferred and the Sixth Street option was directed to be returned to Hays and Morris, agents, which was done Monday, Oct. 2. Mr. J. W. Canavan, owner of 120-foot frontage on Seventh Street, declined a written option but agreed to give a reasonable time for the church to act at \$60.00 per front foot for his land and also assured the committee that he would give them ample notice of any other offer he might receive, so that action could be taken if desired.

The committee at first found little evidence of real interest in the project and made no further progress until Nov. 23rd when Mr. Canavan notified Mr. Larke that the Christian Science Church was ready to make a \$500 payment for an option on his land, and he must know our conclusions within a week. This situation was reported by the committee chairman to the pastor on Sunday morning, Nov. 26th. At the conclusion of the preaching service the pastor called the officials of the church together and asked the chairman to acquaint them with the facts as above stated.

After a brief discussion it was decided to again ask Mr. Canavan through Mr. Larke for a written option for three weeks at a reasonable consideration. On advice that a payment of \$100.00 would obtain an option the following persons present subscribed toward meeting the cost of said option:

Dr. W. A. Scott, M. J. Brown, J. R. Hagen, C. H. Wheeler, S. Larke, V. J. Stafford, J. R. Fisher, J. K. Kirby, F. Cathcart, Enoch Round, W. J. Martan, A. W. Pierson.

On Saturday evening, Dec. 2nd Mr. Larke paid Mr. Canavan \$100.00 and received the option good until Dec. 27, 1916, at which time the total of \$2,200.00 was to be paid him in cash and a mortgage given for \$5,000.00. On Sunday afternoon, Dec. 3rd, at Dr. Scott's office, a meeting of those most interested in the project was held consisting of Messrs. Scott, Larke, Knapp, Brown, Stafford, Hagan, Fisher, Pierson and the pastor.

At this meeting A. W. Pierson was chosen chairman of a campaign committee with J. R. Hagen, Secretary, and W. J. Downey, Treasurer. Subscriptions aggregating \$1,800.00 were made at this time toward the purchase price. A general church meeting of officials and members was held on Wednesday, Dec.

6th at which time the project was formally approved, many added subscriptions received, the frontage fixed at 160 feet, and the Trustees directed to purchase.

On Sunday morning and evening, Dec. 10th and 17th considerable time at each service was given to public appeals by Dr. M. J. Brown and A. W. Pierson assisted by Prof. A. Knapp and a corps of workers.

The public appeal closed at the evening service, Dec. 17th, with \$10,800.00 subscribed.

A special meeting of the Trustee Board was held at the office of S. Larke on Main Street Tuesday evening, Dec. 19th, Messrs. Larke, Ashbaugh, Huse, Downey, Stafford, Pierson and the pastor being present. In the absence of President Cathcart, Mr. Huse was elected chairman. Discussion of ways and means for meeting necessary payments followed.

A. W. Pierson offered to accept a cash payment of \$800.00 for the 40-foot lot owned by him and embraced in the site, together with a Trustee Note for \$600.00 and to deduct at once the full amount of his \$1,000.00 subscription, this leaving that portion of the site free of incumbrance to enable a new parsonage to be built at once if so desired. This offer was accepted and the note and payment agreed to.

It was also agreed that in addition to the cash payments received up to and including Sunday, Dec. 24th, a trustee note, if needed, would be given for the balance not raised up to \$3,000.00.

Messrs. Scott and Pierson were named a committee to engage Geo. M. Tuttle to act as legal adviser in all matters connected with the property transfers. Owing to the necessity of obtaining a court order for mortgaging the Canavan lots which would involve some delay, it was decided to pay Mr. Canavan \$400.00 additional on Dec. 27th and obtain contract for deed running for six months, with power to take deed at any time. Following the payments on pledges received Sunday, Dec. 24th, it was found that about \$1,600.00 cash was available and other subscriptions received, bringing the total up to a little over \$11,000.00 from two societies and 185 individuals.

At the annual election of officers of the Trustee Board on Dec. 30th at the office of Simon Larke, a formal resolution was unanimously adopted appealing to the court for power to mortgage the Canavan lots, and directing the officers of the board to execute the necessary papers, including any trustee notes that may be required to secure and retain title to the entire site.

The officers of the Trustee Board decided that it would be better to settle in full for the Pierson lot by payment of \$1,400.00 cash which was done on January 7th and the deed received for that lot free of incumbrance. The formal consent of the court to place mortgage was received on January 9th and on the 15th of the same month James W. Canavan was paid a total of \$2,200 cash with interest and given a three year \$5,000 mortgage for balance due. At this time to clear the Canavan lots of certain restrictions governing their use previously imposed by A. W. Pierson, said lots were recommended to Pierson and by the latter delivered to the church free of such restrictions.

In addition to the above mortgage of \$5,000.00, the trustees gave two notes at the Bank of Niagara to raise the full amount of cash required, one for \$250.00 for thirty days, and one for \$1,700.00 for three months, making a total present indebtedness of \$6,950.00, all bearing interest at 6 per cent. The total amount

now outstanding on pledges together with cash in hand, aggregates approximately \$8,350.00, a sum deemed sufficient to meet all obligations, including interest, shrinkage, legal expenses, etc., leaving the property free of debt on maturity of pledges in 1919.

At the close of an Official Board meeting held Jan. 10th, the trustees present named Dr. W. A. Scott, Rev. G. S. G. Hares and A. W. Pierson a committee to appoint a new permanent finance committee to look after all matters pertaining to collection of old and obtaining new subscriptions, and securing written obligations for pledges orally made, said committee to hold office for three years or until the final collection of all payments on said pledges.

This committee met at Dr. Scott's office on Friday evening, Jan. 12th, and named the following Finance Committee: Prof. A. S. Knapp, Chairman; J. R. Fisher, J. R. Hagen, C. B. Otto and A. W. Pierson.

Mr. W. J. Downey was by a previous vote of the Trustee Board made permanent treasurer of the building site fund. Mr. Carl Mahon accepted appointment as assistant treasurer to look after all collections in the Sunday School, whose pledges amounted to about \$450.00. Those two officers together with the pastor were made ex-officio members of the above finance committee.

The appeal to court on behalf of the church for permission to mortgage was made through Dempsey, Tuttle and Rice, attorneys, by Dr. W. A. Scott, the newly elected President of the Board, and by Simon Larke, Secretary and Treasurer, who also executed the mortgage and other necessary papers.




CHART YOUR LIFE FOR CHRIST
