

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

An excellent example of an American Four Square Residence with Colonial Revival details. The house was built by Charles Metz, head of Joseph Metz & Sons, specializing in interior woodwork with an international reputation. Examples of their work can be seen in churches and elegant buildings throughout the US, South America and Europe. For the interior Metz selected rare imported woods. The dining room is panelled in solid mahogany with walnut doors. Maple woodwork is in the kitchen pantry and library. The master bedrooms have California redwood and striped bird's eye maple woodwork. Other bedrooms have golden oak, All hallways, stairways reveal rare woods as fume1 oak, mission and golden oak. The second owner of the house was John G. Sattler, founder of the Sattler Department Store. It later became the residence of Thomas L. Holling, one time Mayor of Buffalo - 1938-1941.

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boxed bay windows, center 8/1 window flanked by 4/1 windows. South side of building has hip roof two story entrance bay. Semi-circular pedimented entrance hood supported by ancones. Entablature with dentils. Elongated second story window tri-part with single lights and transom. Entablature window head. Second floor windows, double hung with lintel.

In 1951 Mr. Holling, then President of Pleasant Valley Wine Co., donated his home to the Diocese of Buffalo to be used as a house of study by the Order of the Cistercians of the Common Observance.

Agassiz Circle was designed by Olmsted as the western terminus for Humboldt Parkway. The Circle acted as an entrance to the Park and a crossing for important streets. Olmsted suggested that the circular form would provide for "greater convenience in crossing and turning" and that such an area would "offer suitable postitions for fountains, statues and public monuments,"
