

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district) Building is situated on a small triangular lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. It is located four blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story frame with cross gable roof. Full-width hip roof porch. Patterned cement block base. Wrought iron supports. Three-light wood door flanked on one side by double hung 1/1 window. Left semi-hexagonal first floor bay. Singlehung 1/1 windows. Entablature window surrounds. Second floor has two sets of paired double hung 1/1 windows. Plain SIGNIFICANCE

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A simple frame residence whose shape conforms to an irregularly shaped building lot. Elam Place, a one-block street between Crescent Avenue and Greenfield Street just north of Jewett Parkway, is located on the lands of Elam R. Jewett and was named after him. It was deeded to the city by his widow in 1889. A similar street appears on Olmsted's 1870's maps of "The Parkside," although that street was angled to connect Greenfield with the intersection of Crescent and Jewett. Elam Place also follows Olmsted's rule that a subdivision street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
