Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story frame residence. Flat top hip roof with flared eaves. Paired ancone brackets under eave. Partial-width hip roof porch. Fluted Doric columns support entablature. Spindle balustrade. Opaque glass paneled door. End bays have two story semi-hexagonal bays. Double hung windows, 1/1 lights. Pedimented <u>SIGNIFICANCE</u> gable dormer. Paired corner brackets under cornice. 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: c. 1909 Three double-hung 1/1 windows.

East side entrance has glass ARCHITECT: and wood paneled door flanked by paneled pilaster strips supporting entablature. Dentils under cornice. BUILDER: <u>Semi-hexagonal hip roof bays flank entrance. Second</u> floor center bay has semi-hexagonal oriel. Double hung

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: 1/1 windows in bays and flanking oriel.

An American Four Square form with Colonial Revival styling. Originally the Buffalo and Williamsville Macadam Road, Main Street was a pre-existing street at the time Olmsted designated it as the eastern border for "The Parkside." While the streets within the subdivision were designed specifically to avoid commercial development, this portion of Main Street became a combination of commercial and residential structures. It was also a major thoroughfare into the city, allowing easy access to downtown from this suburban neighborhood.
