

	HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:
	The Colonial Revival duplex is unique to this area as most homes are one family
	due to restrictive covenants in the deed of sales. The house resembles 15 Colvin
	Avenue in its building design. The builder Manly G. Eighmy, along with his father
	Lee Wells Eighmy, operated a company that constructed many houses in the Chapin
	Parkway and Middlesex Road sections. The home's estimated cost was \$10,000.
	The street takes its name from James Tillinghast, owner of the property up until
	July 15, 1889 when it was conveyed to George L. Thorne and Byron Angell to be sub-
	divided for residential purposes. The subdivision named "Meadow View Park"
	carried restrictive covenants in its deeds of sale. The restrictions set forth
	minimum house costs and minimum measure for street frontage. The homes on
	Tillinghast were to be of 'tasteful design' and the cost was not to be less than

\$3,000. The street reflects Olmsted's philosophy regarding roadways located within a subdivision; Tillinghast is a broad, long roadway with no intersectin thoroughfares, running east to west "with no special directness toward the town."
