

par the Olr les Ave by sec of sub	HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Woodward Avenue runs rallel to Parkside Avenue and extends from Humboldt Avenue to e northwest portion of Crescent Avenue. This street appears on msted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside," although it is so curvilinear than originally planned. Portions of Woodward enue (originally called Davis Avenue) were deeded to the city five different owners between 1887 and 1892; except for the ction north of Amherst, this was done when comparable sections Crescent Avenue were deeded. Following Olmsted's rule for a burban street, Woodward Avenue does "not lead with special rectness toward town."
