RATIONALE:

This module will provide an overview of autism spectrum disorder (ASD). The module will also provide insight into how Sesame Street has raised awareness and acceptance of ASD through a Muppet named Julia who is on the spectrum.

CLASS MODULE:

This module can be used for Intro Psych, Developmental Psychology, Introduction to Special Education, Early Childhood Development, Typical and Atypical Development, etc. This module is an overview to ASD so would probably be used for a 100-level or introductory class.

POTENTIAL FORMAT:

This module can be modified for use in an online, hybrid, or face-to-face class format.

SAMPLE LESSON PLAN (SUPPLEMENTAL MATERIALS)

BEFORE CLASS:

Read this introductory [article on autism spectrum disorders](#) published in The Lancet in 2018.

IN-CLASS:

- In small groups, ask students to create “Two truths and a lie” about ASD.
- Distribute white boards, or response/index cards that say “Truth” or “Lie” to the class.
- Ask each small group to share a few items with the entire class.
- Ask students to then identify by using response cards which are facts (truths) and which are misconceptions (lie) about ASD.

View and discuss a PPT providing an overview of ASD (I have several prepared if others would like me to include)

Implement a 3-2-1 exit ticket:

- three facts I learned today
- two facts I already knew
- one question I still have about ASD.

Participate in small group discussions (F2F or remotely, via Zoom/FaceTime, etc.) related to the Meet Julia video clip:

- How would you prepare Big Bird (or any young child) for a first meeting with Julia, to avoid some of the confusion and conflict felt upon their first meeting?
- How many characteristics of ASD do we see Julia demonstrate in the video clip?
- How did Elmo, Abby, Alan accommodate Julia’s needs during their interactions?

- How do the Sesame Street creators use engagement strategies like music and problem-solving techniques to support child viewers in their understanding of Julia?

Small group assignment: **Watch** additional Sesame Street videos that focus on Julia. There are several found at this playlist: https://www.youtube.com/playlist?list=PL8TioFHubWFtrZ_oqh1uqmijgSPt2ii_0

After you have gotten to know Julia a bit better, within your small group, **create** a social media profile (Facebook, etc.) for Julia. Think about what Julia might enjoy.

Then, **include** information on her profile that would describe Julia, such as:

- Events
- Books
- Movies
- Activities
- Friends
- Possible check-ins, etc.

With this person in mind, **create and narrate** a short video, entitled: “What makes _____ amazing?” List attributes, skills, abilities, strengths, etc. that make your selected person *amazing*.

Meet with a partner from class, face-to-face or remotely.

Share your videos with each other.

Discuss 2-3 things you have learned about ASD as a result of viewing your partner’s video.
