Laux, Library Committee; (2) Adopted the following resolution: WHEREAS, Recent events at the State University of New York at Buffalo have made it necessary to defend the right of properly constituted student groups to hear speakers of their choice;

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Faculty Council of the State University College at Buffalo fully supports the right of properly constituted student groups and faculty to invite and hear speakers of their choice and that the source of financial support of the University has no bearing on these rights;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the State has a special responsibility to cherish and protect freedom of inquiry and freedom of speech in the State University; and that it is the duty of every good citizen to safeguard these rights; and, further, that the failure of any elected representative of the people to protect and defend these freedoms, in itself, constitutes a serious threat to academic freedom as well as a threat to the rights of all free citizens.

(3) Recommended that the resolution be distributed (see Faculty Council Minutes for list) and that the President call a special meeting of the faculty prior to the scheduled October 18 meeting to deal with this resolution.

(For example, to call MU 2-9970 in New York City, dial "1" 212 MU 2-9970.) If you have any questions, please call your business office representative at the New York Telephone Company.

#### TIME ALLOWED EMPLOYEES TO VOTE

Election Law No. 226. Time allowed employees to vote.

1. If a registered voter does not have sufficient time outside of his working hours, within which to vote at any election, he may, without loss of pay for up to two hours, take off so much working time as will, when added to his voting time outside his working hours, enable him to vote.

2. If an employee has four consecutive hours either between the opening of the polls and the beginning of his working shift, or between the end of his working shift and the closing of the polls, he shall be deemed to have sufficient time outside his working hours within which to vote. If he has less than four consecutive hours he may take off so much working time as will when added to his voting time outside his working hours enable him to vote, but not more than two hours of which shall be without loss of pay, provided that he shall be allowed time off for voting only at the beginning or end of his working shift, as the employer may designate, unless otherwise mutually agreed.

3. If the employee requires working time off to vote he shall notify his employer not more than ten nor less than two working days before the day of the election that he requires time off to vote in accordance with the provisions of this section.

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IV

I. At the Administrators Council meeting held Tuesday, November 13, 1962, the following motions were passed with respect to the Annual Report of the Safety Committee, prepared by Howard J. Meyer, under date of June 20, 1962:

That 24-hour-a-day nurse service and more complete physician coverage be provided.

That students may be allowed to work in a studio, shop, or laboratory after scheduled class hours, under the supervision of a student, or person other than the instructor, who has been certified in writing to a department chairman or division director, as competent and responsible for the maintenance of safety.

That all students and college personnel will be required to wear and use such protective safety equipment as is necessary in the judgment of the instructor to insure their personal safety.

That the Campus Safety Supervisor at this College shall function in the following four areas:

Education: Inasmuch as the students in College are preparing to be teachers in the schools of the State where all children must learn principles for safe living, the Safety Supervisor shall be instrumental in providing the college community with learning experiences, through every means possible that will engender safety-mindedness in the performance of our graduates.

Preparedness: To recommend that adequate protection is provided, proper orientation is given and sufficient exercises are planned and carried out to insure safety for the students, faculty and staff in all emergencies including fire, civil defense and explosion. This preparation shall make use of every device possible, such as "blocked exits" to help the students develop the skills and attitudes necessary to meet all situations.

Environment: The Safety Supervisor, to insure the best possible learning environment for the students, shall be instrumental in making the campus a symbol of a safe place to live. To this end he shall conduct periodic inspections, followed by recommendations for immediate correction of all suspected and known physical hazards.

Reporting: Because accident reporting serves the two-fold purpose of legal protection, as well as pointing out hazards, the Safety Supervisor shall process all accident reports and investigate all accidents that happen on campus.



#### Administrators Council action (continued)

Re the March 13, 1962 Policies for Selecting Chairmen of Departments and Directors of Divisions, the President received from the Dean a recommendation that as a consequence of two departmental chairmen who will retire in June 1963 by virtue of age and the State University of New York Trustees Policies, that these two chairmanships be declared vacant and that such steps as are necessary be taken to fill these vacancies.

IT WAS MOVED, SECONDED, and CARRIED that the Administrators Council hereby declares the Foreign Language and Education positions vacant and that the necessary steps be taken to fill these vacancies.

The President reported that he had received a communication from AAUP President Gene Welborn concerning the assigning of teaching responsibility. The President then appointed an Ad Hoc Committee of the Administrators Council to study the communication from the AAUP, as follows: Dean Robert W. MacVittie, Chairman; Professor Martin Fried, Director Houston Robison.

III. At the October 11, 1962, meeting of the Board of Trustees of the State University of New York, the following action was taken:

"Resolved, That tuition and fees may be waived for any employee of State University who is enrolled in a course of instruction approved by his appointing officer as part of a training program for improved performance in his present position."

President Hamilton, at a meeting in Albany on November 16, 1962, explained that this resolution applies both to full-time and part-time employees of the State University, and the waiver of tuition and fees applies to courses given in the State University of New York.

He also indicated that the approval by the appointing officer means that the chief administrative officer of each unit will be charged with this responsibility. I am asking that the approvals be processed by our usual administrative channels at this College. This will be effective at the beginning of the second semester, 1963.

The purpose of the resolution is to help our personnel to improve their ability to perform the duties of their position.

### LUNCH MONEY TO BE TAXED, LEVITT WARNS

State Comptroller Arthur Levitt has announced that he has been informed by the Internal Revenue Services that luncheon allowances paid to State employees not away from home overnight on official business will be considered compensation and subject to Federal income tax. "I feel that every State employee should be made aware of this ruling," Mr. Levitt said, "and in the absence of any court decision to the contrary, those affected may expect to have their allowances taxed accordingly." Mr. Levitt stressed that the rulings applied only in those cases where an employee was reimbursed for luncheon expenses incurred during the course of short business trips not involving overnight lodging. Allowances for dinner expenses incurred by employees working overtime in their home offices are not subject to tax.

#### MAIL AND PARCEL DELIVERY ON CAMPUS

The moving of the Mail and Supply Room from Rockwell Hall to the Old Gymnasium has created the need for several adjustments.

1. Student messengers make a minimum of 3 deliveries daily, Monday through Friday, to individual offices in Rockwell Hall. If the office is locked, instructions are for messenger to place mail under the door. If mail is too bulky, a card notifying you that you have mail will be placed under the door. These bulky packages or mail will be placed in the Machine Room, RH 27A.

The Messenger will also pick up any outgoing items if requested at the time she delivers to your office. They will not carry heavy or bulky items. These may be delivered to RH 18 where our vehicle operator will pick them up for delivery to Mail and Supply Room. Outgoing mail can always be delivered to RH 18 between 8:15 AM and 4:25 PM, Monday through Friday. Late mail can be delivered to the Mail and Supply Room in the Old Gymnasium up to 4:45 PM daily.

2. Incoming Parcel Post and small packages destined for Rockwell Hall offices will be delivered to the Machine Room, RH 27A, where they will be picked up by addressee. You will be notified when parcels are destined to your office. This room is kept locked when not in use. The key to this room is available in RH 23 (International Center).

3. The Mail and Supply Room will deliver supplies to Rockwell Hall upon requisition.

All requests for office supplies should be turned in each week by Friday Noon to Mrs. Klaus, RH 17. These supplies will then be delivered on Tuesday afternoon, the following week. Any supplies needed before this time will have to be picked up personally.

This system is necessary because of the expansion of the College grounds and the additional workload put on our messenger service.

### WAIVER OF TUITION, FEES, AND OTHER CHARGES WAIVER OF TUITION AND FEES FOR EMPLOYEES

#### GENERAL

Resolution #62-211 of the Board of Trustees reads as follows: "RESOLVED that tuition and fees may be waived for any employee of State University who is enrolled in a course of instruction approved by his appointing officer as part of a training program for improved performance in his present position."

#### DEFINITIONS

##### A. Eligible Employee.

1. Eligible persons must meet the criteria established in either "a" or "b" below.
  - a. Full-time appointment to an academic or civil service position which is paid on a State University payroll.
  - b. Full-time appointment to an academic position in a community college under the program of State University of New York.
  - c. A person who is on leave of absence from either of the above positions is eligible.
2. Research foundation, contract college, or Faculty Student Association positions are not eligible.
3. A student assistant or graduate assistant is not eligible for tuition waiver under these Resolutions. (See Board Resolution #61-234.)

B. Enrolled. The word "enrolled" as used in the Resolution, includes enrollment for credit and enrollment for non-credit or auditing privileges in regular sessions, summer session, and extension courses.

##### C. Fees which can and cannot be waived.

1. Waiver covers the following fees:
  - a. Tuition
  - b. Registration
  - c. Laboratory or instructional fees

(continued)



- C. 2. Waiver does not cover these fees:
- Special fees for individual lessons or instruction in music
  - Diploma or graduation fees
  - Student activity fees
  - Health and accident insurance charges
  - College or student union fee
  - Transcript fees
  - Infirmity fees
  - Any other fees required to pay for non-instructional services

D. A Training Program for Improved Performance in His Present Position.

1. An Application may be approved only if:

- The instruction is clearly related to improvement of performance in the applicant's present position, and
- If it is a part of a total training program planned by or for an individual.

NOTE: Insofar as (b) is concerned, isolated courses from time to time will not be approved unless integrated into a consistent and approved training program objective.

2. Illustrative Examples to Clarify Relationship of a Training Program to the Applicant's Present Position

- An instructor in English, whose program objective is the doctorate in a discipline within the humanities, falls within the intent of the policy, because the program is aimed at improved performance as a teacher of English. That the person may concurrently earn promotion in rank, either after or midway in the program, does not disqualify him from eligibility.
- An instructor in English, seeking to complete a doctorate in school administration, does not qualify as eligible. The program is not clearly related to improvement of performance as a teacher of English.
- Specific single courses or sequences can be approved, when there is a clear relationship to improved performance of present duties.

EXAMPLES:

- (1) A librarian, for a subject field in which she is expected to give reader and reference service.
- (2) A professor for a course in computers.
- (3) A secretary for the introductory course in her department.
- (4) A business office employee for a course in accounting or personnel.
- (5) A typist for a course in business technology.
- (6) A maintenance employee for a course in construction technology.
- (7) A faculty member for a post-doctoral or other advanced course in relationship to his field.

III. Faculty Council, at its meeting on May 6, 1963, approved publication of the following statement in the Staff Bulletin:

Because recently-announced policy changes regarding faculty income for extra-session teaching and the contemplated adjustment in teaching load resulting from these changes may not be clear to all members of the faculty, the Faculty Council is prompted to submit this analysis and interpretation of the new policies:

1. In general, the changes, many of which were recommended by the Middle States Association and the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education, are immensely beneficial to the faculty and to the College. The allocation of 32 new teaching positions for the College, which provides enough additional staff to conduct the September-June graduate and extension classes within the framework of normal faculty assignments, is the most significant change. A long sought goal, this new arrangement will be notably beneficial to the faculty because it decreases the teaching load, allowing more time for research and other kinds of professional growth, and also because it strengthens the quality of the College's academic program, particularly on the graduate level.

Not all the details of the change are yet clear, but the tentative and unofficial estimates of the Dean and of the Director of the Graduate Division suggest, for example, that some faculty members who anticipated an 18 semester-hour teaching assignment for the next semester may have only a 12 hour load. Although the greater immediate reduction may be felt by teachers of graduate courses, all faculty members will benefit from the improved student-teacher ratio through a reduction in teaching load, class size, or both.

The 32 positions allocated in mid-April are in addition to the 41 provided at the beginning of that month. Since the contemplated increase in student enrollment is only 300, there will be a dramatic adjustment in the student-teacher ratio. Such an improvement should be warmly welcomed by every faculty member because it portends an advance in the contribution we can make to our students and in the College's service to the state and to the academic world.

2. The decrease in potential income (\$600 or \$900 for the year '63-64) for those faculty members who accepted invitations to teach graduate or extension courses in the first or second semester is regrettable. However, the increase in summer-session salaries is a great advantage to the faculty. The change from 14.28 to 16 per cent of annual salary for the six-weeks session represents an increase, on the average, of about \$200; for the eight-weeks staff the average increase will be about \$150. Considering the greater number of faculty effected by the increase - and without resorting to a computer to verify the conjecture - the total extra income for the whole faculty may be the same.

The Council is confident that the College officers who initiate invitations to summer-session teaching will do what they can to minimize hardships resulting from the policy explained above. Efforts to equalize the opportunity for earning extra income should be made, however, only with the full awareness that the first concern must be the excellence of the College's program.

3. The Faculty Council heartily commends the officers of the College and of the University for their wisdom and foresight in proposing these changes in policy; it commends them also for their success in achieving these very desirable improvements.

VI. Our College will begin a Bachelor of Arts degree program in September of 1963 in the liberal arts. The program will admit only students who are graduates of the two-year institutions and students eligible for junior class or third year in our own college. We will not begin admitting freshmen in the B.A. program until September of 1965. The new program in liberal arts is not a teacher preparation program.

Students who are currently enrolled in our college and who will be at least junior class level in the Fall of 1963 may apply for transfer and admission. The following procedure should be followed by our college's students: (1) Obtain an application for transfer from RH 107 which is the Office of the Director of Liberal Arts; (2) Complete the form and return to RH 107.

Each student will have a personal interview scheduled at a later time when his application for transfer and his college transcript have been reviewed. Any student who is eligible to continue in our college under academic regulations is eligible to apply.

It must be pointed out that our college will admit only fifty students to the B.A. liberal arts program for September of 1963. This number includes our present students, as well as graduates of two-year institutions.

There will be more information about the B.A. curriculum forthcoming in the RECORD. Dr. Houston Robison, Director of the Liberal Arts Division, will answer questions in the meantime.

Chapter 840 continues for one more year or until July 1, 1964 the provisions of paragraph 2 of subdivision b of section 512 of the Education Law. This amendment allows an increased death benefit for 24 years of credited state service beyond the first 12; in other words, 2 years salary payable to the beneficiary of a member who dies in service after being credited with 36 years of state service. This bill is Assembly Int. 3285, Print 3355.

Chapter 841 allows additional interest on the contributions of those persons who became members on or after July 1, 1948. The amendment is effective for one year beginning July 1, 1963 and ending June 30, 1964 and the amount of such additional interest will depend upon the earnings of the investments of the System for the year ending June 30, 1963; however, the additional interest allowed cannot exceed 1%. This bill is Senate Int. 1914, Print 1956.

Chapter 871 provides that the employer rate of contribution for the Retirement System shall be based on the salaries paid to members rather than on the total payroll. Under the Law as it is at present it seems unfair to levy the employer rate of contribution against the salaries paid certain teachers who will never be members of the System. In this category we find certain classes of substitute teachers and other persons employed in the adult education program. This bill is Senate Int. 1610, Print 1634.

Chapter 876 provides that military service shall be allowed in a claim for prior service for those members who, under a previous membership, were allowed credit for such service but who, upon terminating their membership and again rejoining the System, were denied credit for that military service. This bill is Assembly Int. 4662, Print 4848.

Chapter 882 amends the Law to provide that members may, under certain conditions, make loans from their accumulated contributions in the Retirement System. This bill is Senate Int. 2390, Print 2484.

Chapter 912 makes it possible for members who were previously credited with service in the State Employees' Retirement System to now get credit for that service in the Teachers Retirement System. The amendment also clarifies the Law with respect to transfer of credit from other retirement systems in the state. This bill is Senate Int. 2021, Print 4108.

### TO MEMBERS OF N.Y.S. EMPLOYEES RETIREMENT SYSTEM

The 55-year retirement plan has been reopened for all members of the N.Y.S. Employees Retirement System who are not at present members of the plan. This plan will be reopened until December 31, 1963. Applications can be obtained in the Business Office, RH 17.

### NEW LAWS AFFECTING TEACHERS RETIREMENT SYSTEM MEMBERS

Two changes in the Education Law with regard to the Teachers Retirement System will affect members at our college and which we expect will create a flood of questions. One is an amendment to the Law providing that members may make loans from their accumulated contributions; the other allows members who were previously credited with service in the State Employees Retirement System and who could not transfer such service when they became members of the Teachers Retirement System to get credit for such service in the Teachers Retirement System. Presented below is a brief summary of the provisions of these amendments.

Loans by Members of Teachers Retirement System: (effective July 1, 1963)

A member in active service having at least one year of credited service, and who will not be eligible for special service or superannuation retirement within one year, may apply for a loan from his accumulated contributions.

(continued)



Members may borrow once during each six-month period, an amount not less than \$300, but not more than (1) fifty per cent of his accumulated contributions or (2) an amount that, with interest, can be repaid prior to attainment of eligibility for special service or superannuation retirement.

The Loan Repayment installment will be (1) at least equal to the member's normal contribution rate (exclusive of any reduction by offsetting social security taxes, or election to reduce contributions for increased take-home pay, and (2) sufficient to repay both the amount borrowed and interest, by the time the member attains eligibility for special service or superannuation retirement.

Each loan shall be insured against the death of the members on the following basis:

	<u>Per Cent Insured</u>
within thirty days of the making of the loan	no part
within sixty days of the making of the loan	25%
within ninety days of the making of the loan	50%
over ninety days of the making of the loan	100%

An annual premium of one per cent (1%) per annum of the amount loaned, will be charged for this insurance, although members over age 60 may be charged up to 4% of the loan as an insurance premium.

As the loan provision does not become effective until July 1, 1963, no loans may be made prior to that date.

Prior Service Credit to Members of the New York State Teachers Retirement System: (effective immediately)

It is now possible for members who were previously credited with service in the State Employees Retirement System and who were ineligible to transfer such credit into the Teachers Retirement System to apply for such credit.

If a member of the Teachers Retirement System wishes information concerning purchase of credit for prior service with the Employees Retirement System, he should contact the Teachers Retirement System directly for information concerning the purchase of such credit, or evaluation of his eligibility for such prior service credit.

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## LEAVE FOR EXTRAORDINARY WEATHER CONDITIONS

## CSEA GROUP LIFE PLAN OFFERING CONVERSION PRIVILEGES

Notify the switchboard WHERE you are calling and she will give you the WATS line.

To call outside the "716" area: Dial Area Code + Telephone Number. Example: 212 + MU 5-1234.

To call within "716" area: Dial the telephone number. Example: FA 4-2221.

If you reach a wrong number or are cut off, dial "0" on the WATS line and ask the operator for credit.

DO NOT dial the access code "1" on WATS line.

DO NOT place Person to Person or Collect Calls or ask for time and charges.

DO NOT use WATS line for calls to Albany--our operator will decide if it should be used.

If you wish to call a non-dialable place, dial "0" on the WATS line and ask for assistance. Give her the number and she will dial it for you. NOTE: Station to station calls only.

If you do not have the number you desire, please ask information:

2. The decrease in potential income (\$600 or \$900 for the year '63-64) for those faculty members who accepted invitations to teach graduate or extension courses in the first or second semester is regrettable. However, the increase in summer-session salaries is a great advantage to the faculty. The change from 14.28 to 16 per cent of annual salary for the six-weeks session represents an increase, on the average, of about \$200; for the eight-weeks staff the average increase will be about \$150. Considering the greater number of faculty effected by the increase - and without resorting to a computer to verify the conjecture - the total extra income for the whole faculty may be the same.

The Council is confident that the College officers who initiate invitations to summer-session teaching will do what they can to minimize hardships resulting from the policy explained above. Efforts to equalize the opportunity for earning extra income should be made, however, only with the full awareness that the first concern must be the excellence of the College's program.

3. The Faculty Council heartily commends the officers of the College and of the University for their wisdom and foresight in proposing these changes in policy; it commends them also for their success in achieving these very desirable improvements.

VI. Our College will begin a Bachelor of Arts degree program in September of 1963 in the liberal arts. The program will admit only students who are graduates of the two-year institutions and students eligible for junior class or third year in our own college. We will not begin admitting freshmen in the B.A. program until September of 1965. The new program in liberal arts is not a teacher preparation program.

Students who are currently enrolled in our college and who will be at least junior class level in the Fall of 1963 may apply for transfer and admission. The following procedure should be followed by our college's students: (1) Obtain an application for transfer from RH 107 which is the Office of the Director of Liberal Arts; (2) Complete the form and return to RH 107.

Each student will have a personal interview scheduled at a later time when his application for transfer and his college transcript have been reviewed. Any student who is eligible to continue in our college under academic regulations is eligible to apply.

It must be pointed out that our college will admit only fifty students to the B.A. liberal arts program for September of 1963. This number includes our present students, as well as graduates of two-year institutions.

There will be more information about the B.A. curriculum forthcoming in the RECORD. Dr. Houston Robison, Director of the Liberal Arts Division, will answer questions in the meantime.

LETTER RECEIVED FROM SWISS FEDERAL INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY

The following letter was received from the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology in Zurich, Switzerland:

"Dear friends in Buffalo,

This is Walter Traupel, rector of the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology speaking. We thank you most cordially for your greetings. In the name of Professor Pallmann, President of the Board of our Institute, and in the name of all my colleagues I congratulate you on the inauguration of the new building of your College in Buffalo. We are convinced that this new and important extension of your activities is worthy of the high tradition of the State University of New York.

Men of science have always sought and upheld an international exchange of ideas. Such an exchange is vital for the search of truth, which knows no national boundaries. Please take these congratulations from Switzerland as a token and promise of such international collaboration.

We were very glad to gather from your message that you, too, give due weight and importance, next to teaching and research in technology, to the moral sciences and to the arts. Ever since the foundation of our Institute we have endeavoured to introduce students of technology to the humanities and the arts and to honour the idealist efforts of the human spirit. Today this is more important than ever, for mankind has still to learn how to use the power over nature that science and technology have won for us. The human spirit and the rights of the individual must be safeguarded. Let me tell you how glad we are to see that in your great country, whose influence in deciding the future of our world is so great, the importance of these moral and spiritual things is so fully realized.

I conclude by repeating our sincere congratulations and by expressing our very best wishes for the future of your university."

NEW YORK STATE TEACHERS RETIREMENT BOARD INFORMATION

The following amendments relating to retirement were approved in 1963:

Chapter 73 extends for one more year or until about April 1, 1964 the provisions of sections 528 and 529 of the Education Law relating to the 5% take-home-pay plan for State employees and teachers in the Community Colleges who are members of this System. This bill is Assembly Int. 1014, Print 1014.

Chapter 74 amends section 511-b of the Education Law to provide that members who have been retired for superannuation or special service and whose allowance, computed without optional modification, exceeds \$3,500 annually, may waive the amount in excess of \$3,500 in order to earn \$1,800 in a calendar year where compensation comes from public employment other than as a teacher or in the adult education program. This provision is effective for a period of one year until July 1, 1964. This bill is Assembly Int. 1206, Print 1206.

Chapter 75 gives members of the System, until July 1, 1963, another opportunity to elect the special service retirement plan. This bill is Assembly Int. 1577, Print 1577.

Chapter 629 provides that a member retired for superannuation or special service may accept employment as a substitute teacher in any school district or with any other employer, or as a lecturer or on a per hour, per diem or monthly salary basis in the publicly supported colleges within the State of New York or in the adult education program of any school district and receive compensation therefor in an amount not in excess of \$7,000 in any calendar year without loss or suspension of his retirement allowance, provided he immediately notifies the Retirement Board of his intention to receive such compensation pursuant to this subdivision. This provision is effective for a period of one year until July 1, 1964. This bill is Assembly Int. 1160, Print 1160.

Chapter 632 extends the provisions of section 511-b as amended by Chapters 74 and 629, for a period of one year until July 1, 1964. This bill is Assembly Int. 1161, Print 1161, revised Print 5529.

Chapter 750, known as the "death gamble" bill, amends subdivision b of section 512 of the Education Law and is effective from April 23, 1963 through June 30, 1964. This amendment applies only to those who die in service after becoming eligible for superannuation or special service retirement, in which case the benefits are computed as if the member had retired on the day preceding his death. This bill is Senate Int. 2421, Print 2515.

Chapter 753 provides that additional interest shall be allowed on additional contributions made for the purchase of annuity on retirement date as provided in paragraph b of subdivision 3 of section 516 of the Education Law, commonly known as contributions under Chapter 193. The additional interest will be allowed for a period of one year from July 1, 1963 through June 30, 1964 and will depend upon the earnings of the investments of the System for the year ending June 30, 1963. The additional interest allowed cannot exceed 1%. This bill is Senate Int. 1949, Print 1992.

Chapter 791 is known as the "extended illness" amendment and provides that the death benefit payable in the case of the death of a member during the period that membership is valid will be allowed if his terminal illness was in existence at the time he left teaching and that he had been incapacitated and had not been otherwise gainfully employed since he ceased teaching. This bill is Assembly Int. 2921, Print 2966.



Chapter 840 continues for one more year or until July 1, 1964 the provisions of paragraph 2 of subdivision b of section 512 of the Education Law. This amendment allows an increased death benefit for 24 years of credited state service beyond the first 12; in other words, 2 years salary payable to the beneficiary of a member who dies in service after being credited with 36 years of state service. This bill is Assembly Int. 3285, Print 3355.

Chapter 841 allows additional interest on the contributions of those persons who became members on or after July 1, 1948. The amendment is effective for one year beginning July 1, 1963 and ending June 30, 1964 and the amount of such additional interest will depend upon the earnings of the investments of the System for the year ending June 30, 1963; however, the additional interest allowed cannot exceed 1%. This bill is Senate Int. 1914, Print 1956.

Chapter 871 provides that the employer rate of contribution for the Retirement System shall be based on the salaries paid to members rather than on the total payroll. Under the Law as it is at present it seems unfair to levy the employer rate of contribution against the salaries paid certain teachers who will never be members of the System. In this category we find certain classes of substitute teachers and other persons employed in the adult education program. This bill is Senate Int. 1610, Print 1634.

Chapter 876 provides that military service shall be allowed in a claim for prior service for those members who, under a previous membership, were allowed credit for such service but who, upon terminating their membership and again rejoining the System, were denied credit for that military service. This bill is Assembly Int. 4662, Print 4848.

Chapter 882 amends the Law to provide that members may, under certain conditions, make loans from their accumulated contributions in the Retirement System. This bill is Senate Int. 2390, Print 2484.

Chapter 912 makes it possible for members who were previously credited with service in the State Employees' Retirement System to now get credit for that service in the Teachers Retirement System. The amendment also clarifies the Law with respect to transfer of credit from other retirement systems in the state. This bill is Senate Int. 2021, Print 4108.

### TO MEMBERS OF N.Y.S. EMPLOYEES RETIREMENT SYSTEM

The 55-year retirement plan has been reopened for all members of the N.Y.S. Employees Retirement System who are not at present members of the plan. This plan will be reopened until December 31, 1963. Applications can be obtained in the Business Office, RH 17.

### NEW LAWS AFFECTING TEACHERS RETIREMENT SYSTEM MEMBERS

Two changes in the Education Law with regard to the Teachers Retirement System will affect members at our college and which we expect will create a flood of questions. One is an amendment to the Law providing that members may make loans from their accumulated contributions; the other allows members who were previously credited with service in the State Employees Retirement System and who could not transfer such service when they became members of the Teachers Retirement System to get credit for such service in the Teachers Retirement System. Presented below is a brief summary of the provisions of these amendments.

Loans by Members of Teachers Retirement System: (effective July 1, 1963)

A member in active service having at least one year of credited service, and who will not be eligible for special service or superannuation retirement within one year, may apply for a loan from his accumulated contributions.

(continued)



Members may borrow once during each six-month period, an amount not less than \$300, but not more than (1) fifty per cent of his accumulated contributions or (2) an amount that, with interest, can be repaid prior to attainment of eligibility for special service or superannuation retirement.

The Loan Repayment installment will be (1) at least equal to the member's normal contribution rate (exclusive of any reduction by offsetting social security taxes, or election to reduce contributions for increased take-home pay, and (2) sufficient to repay both the amount borrowed and interest, by the time the member attains eligibility for special service or superannuation retirement.

Each loan shall be insured against the death of the members on the following basis:

	Per Cent Insured
within thirty days of the making of the loan	no part
within sixty days of the making of the loan	25%
within ninety days of the making of the loan	50%
over ninety days of the making of the loan	100%

An annual premium of one percent (1%) per annum of the amount loaned, will be charged for this insurance, although members over age 60 may be charged up to 4% of the loan as an insurance premium.

As the loan provision does not become effective until July 1, 1963, no loans may be made prior to that date.

Prior Service Credit to Members of the New York State Teachers Retirement System: (effective immediately)

It is now possible for members who were previously credited with service in the State Employees Retirement System and who were ineligible to transfer such credit into the Teachers Retirement System to apply for such credit.

If a member of the Teachers Retirement System wishes information concerning purchase of credit for prior service with the Employees Retirement System, he should contact the Teachers Retirement System directly for information concerning the purchase of such credit, or evaluation of his eligibility for such prior service credit.

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## LEAVE FOR EXTRAORDINARY WEATHER CONDITIONS

# STUDENT TEACHING IS A BIG OPERATION AT BUFFALO STATE

Caryl Hedden, College Coordinator of Student Teaching, reports that there are 374 student teachers out in the schools working under the supervision of 50 college supervisors, some of whom devote full time to the responsibility. The students are in 165 different school buildings of 49 school districts. The distribution of student teachers and supervisors by divisions is as follows: Art - 55 (9); El.Ed. - 158 (15); Ex.Ed. - 24 (6); H.Ec. - 28 (4); I.A. - 41 (5); Sec. Eng. - 17 (3); Sec. Math. - 16 (3); Sec. Sci. - 12 (2); and Sec. S.S. - 23 (3).

Dr. Conant's recommendations for a practice teaching period of 8 weeks are far surpassed here, where most students have a full semester of student teaching in two different situations.

#### TIME ALLOWED EMPLOYEES TO VOTE

Election Law No. 226. Time allowed employees to vote.

1. If a registered voter does not have sufficient time outside of his working hours, within which to vote at any election, he may, without loss of pay for up to two hours, take off so much working time as will, when added to his voting time outside his working hours, enable him to vote.

2. If an employee has four consecutive hours either between the opening of the polls and the beginning of his working shift, or between the end of his working shift and the closing of the polls, he shall be deemed to have sufficient time outside his working hours within which to vote. If he has less than four

consecutive hours he may take off so much working time as will when added to his voting time outside his working hours enable him to vote, but not more than two hours of which shall be without loss of pay, provided that he shall be allowed time off for voting only at the beginning or end of his working shift, as the employer may designate, unless otherwise mutually agreed.

3. If the employee requires working time off to vote he shall notify his employer not more than ten nor less than two working days before the day of the election that he requires time off to vote in accordance with the provisions of this section.

4. Not less than ten working days before every election, every employer shall keep posted conspicuously in the place of work where it can be seen as employees come or go to their place of work, a notice setting forth the provisions of section 226 of the election law. (Former No. 226 was repealed and new No. 226 added by L. 1960, c. 793, eff. January 1, 1961.)

Note: The College will be in session November 5, Election Day, and November 11, Veterans Day. All staff members are requested to be on duty except if excused by their supervisor. The compensatory time accumulated may be liquidated during Thanksgiving, Christmas, or any other time mutually agreeable to both you and your supervisor.

## OFFICIAL NOTICES

I. N.B. Title C of Article IX entitled "Chairmen of Departments and Divisions" in the Policies of the Board of Trustees 1962, State University of New York, reads as follows:

1. Designation. The members of the academic staff of each College in charge of the departments or divisions of such college shall be designated as chairmen of such departments or divisions, which designations shall be in addition to their academic rank.
2. Term. Chairmen of departments or divisions of colleges shall be designated by the President, after receiving the recommendation of the chief administrative officer of the college. Such designations shall be for renewable periods of three years; provided, however, that the President may relieve a designee of his duties at any time.
3. Termination of Appointment as Chairman. If the Chairman of a department or division of a college is relieved of his duties as chairman he shall, unless otherwise provided by the Board of Trustees, retain such rights and privileges as he may have by virtue of his academic rank.
4. Responsibilities. The chairmen of departments and divisions of a college shall be responsible to the chief administrative officer of the college for the supervision of the personnel and educational program of the departments or divisions for which they serve. They shall have such other powers, duties and responsibilities as may be assigned by the chief administrative officer of the college.

On December 10, 1963, the Administrators Council passed the following motion which replaces the "Policies for Selecting Chairmen of Departments and Directors of Divisions, March 13, 1962":

## PROPOSAL

The Chief Administrative Officer of the State University College at Buffalo shall consult members of the college faculty before recommending the appointment or re-appointment of chairmen of departments or divisions of the college to the President of the State University.

Each student is urged to review his schedule and file a conflict form available at the Rockwell Hall Reception Desk. Adjusted conflicts may be picked up at the Reception Desk on January 15, 16 and 17.



V. Will you please read the following announcement to all of your classes:

After examinations, the following must report to Rockwell Hall Reception Desk and file a probation appeal form, including student telephone number, and a completed green grade average card, (a) all earning less than a 1.00 semester average, and (b) all earning less than a 2.00 semester average who are currently on Final Probation. At the same time, each of the above must also make an appointment with the Probation Appeals Committee which will meet January 27 through January 29.

All students on Second Final and Special Probation must report in person to the Office of the Dean of Instruction, RH 100, with their green grade average card completely filled out.

VI. Please read to your students the following Procedure for Withdrawal from College and Dropping Courses:

(1) Withdrawal means from the entire college program and when noted on the multi-copy registration form and duly processed through the office of the division director constitutes official withdrawal from College. See the 1963-64 Catalog, page 82, for full statement. Unofficial withdrawal from the college will result in an "E" grade for each subject. Official withdrawal will result in the status of "W" being entered for each subject.

(2) Dropping a course(s) means cancelling registration in one or more courses, but short of full withdrawal. Any student wishing to drop a course(s) must secure a drop card(s) from the Registrar's Office and take it to the instructor(s) involved for his (their) recommendation(s). This card must then be returned to the division director for further processing if the instructor's recommendation is one of approval. If the request is not approved, the student may appeal directly to his division director with the card showing the instructor's negative recommendation. After the director consults with the instructor involved, he may or may not approve the dropping of the course(s).

If a drop is approved, the status of "W" will be entered on the record. If a student who does not receive approval to drop fails to continue with the course, his grade at the close of the semester will be determined by the instructor.

The above is effective January 6, 1964.

V. Procedure for Withdrawal from College and Dropping Courses:

(1) Withdrawal means from the entire college program and when noted on the multi-copy registration form and duly processed through the office of the division director constitutes official withdrawal from College. See the 1963-64 Catalog, page 82, for full statement. Unofficial withdrawal from the college will result in an "E" grade for each subject. Official withdrawal will result in the status of "W" being entered for each subject.

(2) Dropping a course(s) means cancelling registration in one or more courses, but short of full withdrawal. Any student wishing to drop a course(s) must secure a drop card(s) from the Registrar's Office and take it to the instructor(s) involved for his (their) recommendation(s). This card must then be returned to the division director for further processing if the instructor's recommendation is one of approval. If the request is not approved, the student may appeal directly to his division director with the card showing the instructor's negative recommendation. After the director consults with the instructor involved, he may or may not approve the dropping of the course(s).

If a drop is approved, the status of "W" will be entered on the record. If a student who does not receive approval to drop fails to continue with the course, his grade at the close of the semester will be determined by the instructor.

The above is effective as of January 6, 1964.

GRIEVANCE POLICY AND PROCEDURE, Section 4, revision dated 1/14/64, to replace Section 4 in document of 12/5/63

#### Section 4

The Grievance Committee shall hear all Initial Claims of Grievance that are brought to it in accordance with the procedures that have been detailed below. However, the Committee asks all aggrieved persons to remember that the definition given above for the term grievance includes as an essential condition a violation of existing College policy and does not provide for consideration of hardships alleged to derive from poor policy or from absence of policy. The Committee then may recommend affirmative action on a complaint that College policy has not been followed, but will not act favorably on a complaint that existing policy is poor or wanting.

Paragraph A. Specifically, College policy on certain matters is determined by law and/or by administrative regulations which no one at the College has power to change. Examples of such matters include: salary schedules, retirement benefits, termination of temporary employment, non-renewal of term contract, refusal of tenure, and termination of employment for cause. Any complaint alleging that College policy on such a matter had not been followed would be seriously considered, but not a complaint about the substance of the policy.

Paragraph B. Again, specifically, on all other matters College policy is determined by the Faculty which has provided that, "Responsibility for recommending policy for the College shall be divided among the Administrator's Council, the Faculty Council, and the Student Personnel Council." (By-Laws of the Faculty, Article II, Section A) Any complaint alleging that College policy on such a matter had not been followed would be seriously considered, but not a complaint about the substance of the policy.

Paragraph C. Once more specifically, College policy on promotions is determined by the Faculty which has provided for a Promotions Committee and that, "This committee shall make recommendations for faculty promotions to the President of the College." (By-Laws of the Faculty, Appendage, "The Promotions Committee") Any complaint alleging that College policy on promotions had not been followed would be seriously considered, but not a complaint about the substance of the policy.

Paragraph D. Where matters of policy are concerned, if the complaint is that there is no policy to cover, or that the applicable policy is poor, then the complainant should turn to an appropriate policy-forming body. All faculty are reminded of their continuing opportunities to participate in the government of the College, and especially of two provisions for appeal and/or change that are specified in the "By-Laws of the Faculty," namely:

Article VI, Section F, Paragraphs 1-6. The agenda for each council are published in advance, individual faculty members have "the right to attend any regular meeting of any council," council recommendations to the President of the College are published, any recommendation of a council may be appealed by "written petition of 25% of the faculty," the President shall call a



meeting of the faculty "within 30 days of such request," and "faculty attending the meeting shall have the privilege of directly informing the President of the College of their position in the matter."

Article VII, Section B, Paragraphs 1-2. Any faculty member may propose to the By-Laws Committee an amendment to the By-Laws, or any "25% of the faculty may petition the President of the College to present an amendment to the faculty."

Paragraph E. Furthermore, all faculty are reminded of their opportunity to join the American Association of University Professors, the Branch Association as well as the Faculty Association of State University, and to promote resolutions for action by these organizations.

III. Faculty Council, at its March 9, 1964 meeting, took the following recommending action: Approved the proposed policy on New York State Proficiency Examinations, as follows:

1. Credit may be granted to students admitted to the college for subjects in which a grade of A, B or C was received in the New York State Proficiency Examination when such subjects meet the curricular requirements of the specialized divisions of the College.
2. Students receiving a grade of D may be admitted to an advanced course but no credit will be granted for the beginning course thus exempted.
3. The general admissions and residence requirements of the College will apply to students requesting credit for the New York State Proficiency Examinations.
4. Matriculated students must receive advance approval from their Division Director before undertaking examination for credit.
5. Credit for examination will not be granted to a student who has credit for a college course in the same or an overlapping subject area.
6. Credit in excess of 32 credits will not be granted for either advanced placement examinations or the New York State Proficiency Examinations, this restriction for a trial period of three years.

IV. Mid-term for the Spring Semester of 1964 is April 10, 1964. In accordance with the policy recommended by Faculty Council and published in the Staff Bulletin on 12/18/63, and approved by President Bulger as published in the Staff Bulletin on 2/26/64, each faculty member should apprise his students of their mid-semester standings.

## OFFICIAL NOTICES

I. The action of the Faculty Council as recommended by the Council and the Dean of Instruction on April 6, 1964, concerning the "Core Program for the B.S. Degree" is approved with the exception that the wordage of Section C is changed from "there shall be" to "it is recommended that we provide."

### CORE PROGRAM FOR THE B.S. DEGREE

- A. A core program shall be required in each curriculum leading to the B.S. degree (Teacher Education).
- B. 41 hours should constitute a minimum for all programs outside of their concentrations. These should include:

a. Physical Education activities	2
b. Writing and/or speaking	6
c. Fine Arts (art, music, dance, architecture, theatre, etc.)	6
d. Social Studies	9
e. Science	6
f. Literature	6
g. Philosophy	3
h. Mathematics	3
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- C. It is recommended that we provide 15 credit hours of free electives, 9 of which must be outside of the student's area of major specialization. Areas of specialization are to be identified as follows:

Art (Art, education)  
English (English, speech, drama, education)  
Foreign Languages (French, German, Italian, Russian, Spanish, education)  
Mathematics (Mathematics, education)  
Music (Music, education)  
Science (Biology, chemistry, earth science, physics, education)  
Social Studies (Anthropology, economics, history, political science, social studies, education, sociology, psychology)  
Elementary Education (education)

Exceptional Children Education (Exceptional Education, education)

Home Economics (home economics, education)

Industrial Arts (industrial arts, education)

- D. There should be a continuing study, improvement and evaluation of the core program with a formal report every four years.

TO FACULTY: Each student in meeting with his adviser should have in his possession (1) a list of courses available for September 1964, dated April 27, 1964, (2) a yellow 5 x 8 card headed "Pre-Registration" filled out with his intended program and (3) a summer session registration form if he has registered for the Summer.

The faculty need only concern themselves with the appropriateness of the program as indicated by his advisee on the yellow card.

S.S. 230 - (now Hist. 200) - Colonial History of the American People will still be available as an elective but NOT as a Group A requirement.

Hist. 313 - History of Latin America: The Colonial Era

Hist. 314 - History of Latin America: The National Era

S.S. 300 - History and Culture of the Middle East

S.S. 240, 241 and 242 will still be available as electives but NOT as a Group B requirement.

2. REMINDER to all Exceptional Education freshmen: if you have not returned your concentration form, please do so to KH 208.

3. Elementary Education Students:

Those whose last name initial falls in A-L will register for Ed. 201 for the first semester. Those whose last name

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initial is M-Z will not start the sequence until the second semester next year.

Those students of our present sophomore class have theoretically all completed Ed. 201 and Ed. 202. However, only about half of them will be able to register for Ed. 301 for the first semester next year, and the others must wait to take Ed. 301 during the second semester. Cards are being distributed from the E.E. Office telling students in which semester they must register for this course. Though this information is printed on the cards, you may wish to know that: a green card means Spring Registration in Ed. 301. (After this year, with the initiation of the plan listed in #1 above, this staggering for Ed. 301 will take care of itself.)

Students should have a sheet indicating the required courses and other courses possible in their areas of concentration. PROGRAM FOR VARIOUS AREAS OF CONCENTRATION CAN BE OBTAINED FROM DR. LANGE'S OFFICE.

4. Science Majors: Art 215, omitted from the list of courses, is available for the Fall.

IV. Instruction and tickets for June Commencement are being sent to each June graduate by his Division Office. A limited number of additional guest tickets will be made available by Joseph Iraci, president of the Senior Class.

V. The Final Examination Schedule will be distributed to faculty mailboxes and posted in each building as of Thursday, May 7. Faculty are urged to contact the Office of the Dean of Instruction, Ext. 403, for any adjustment or corrections to the schedule, and to canvass their classes in an effort to discover large areas of conflicts (six or more students) and suggest possible alternate times.

Each student is urged to review his schedule and AFTER checking the CORRECTED SCHEDULE (which will be posted May 13 outside the Dean of Students Office in Rockwell Hall) is to file his conflict. An earned doctorate degree, or the rank of professor
- (6) Music  
An earned doctorate degree, or the rank of professor
- (7) Science  
An earned doctorate degree, or the rank of professor
- (8) Mathematics  
An earned doctorate degree, or the rank of professor, or a master's degree and special training and experience which are acceptable to the Mathematics Department Graduate Faculty and to the Graduate Committee
- (9) Home Economics  
An earned doctorate degree, or the rank of professor, or a master's degree and special training and experience which are acceptable to the Home Economics Division Graduate Faculty and to the Graduate Committee

An earned doctorate and three years experience subsequent to receipt of the doctorate, or special training and experience which are acceptable to two-thirds of the Exceptional Children Education Division Graduate Faculty and the Graduate Committee

C. Experience

A minimum of three years of college-level experience will be required of all graduate faculty members.

2. Approved the Recommendation of Policy on Qualifying Examination for Admission to the Graduate Program dated June 1, 1964:

The only objective scholarship criterion for admission to the graduate program in the past has been a 2.3 undergraduate average. This has been recognized as being inadequate by the Graduate Committee and was so cited as being inadequate by the Middle States NCATE accreditation report.

A qualifying examination will be required of all students applying for admission to candidacy for the master's degree. The Graduate Committee recommends the Graduate Record Examination Aptitude Test and appropriate advanced tests in the area of specialization to all divisions and departments. A division may develop its own tests or use other criteria in addition to the Graduate Record Examination.

Whatever tests are used will be provisionally approved for three years and then reviewed.

A description of the other qualifying examination or criteria will be filed in the Graduate Office.

The effective date of this requirement of a qualifying examination shall be January 1, 1965.

3. Approved the Graduate Academic Regulations dated June 1, 1964:

When a short-term workshop is offered on a two-or-three-week basis, often with a visiting professor or with visiting consultants, it is sometimes difficult to evaluate students' achievement with the regular grades of A, B, C, D, E. In such cases, through prior agreement of the instructor, his division director, and the Director of the Graduate Division, a grade of S or U (satisfactory, unsatisfactory) may be granted.

III. PLEASE READ TO ALL CLASSES: The college has instituted a new procedure for determining each student's course needs for each semester. This procedure involves an audit of each student's academic record. This audit has been completed since June 1964. It also includes each student having been programmed for the second semester. However, these audits and second semester programs do not include the student's selection of electives. Therefore, each student who intends to carry one or more elective is asked to indicate his choice on an elective selection card available at the Registrar's counter or at the Rockwell Hall information counter. Obviously, Seniors graduating in February and Freshmen and those who are to student teach need not fill out this card.

The card will be available as of December 9. It must be returned by December 14 to the Registrar's Office.

IV. The following policy has been effective since January 4, 1964:

1. Withdrawal means from the entire college program and when noted on the appropriate form and duly processed through the office of the division director constitutes official withdrawal from College. See the 1963-64 catalog, page 82, for full statement. Official withdrawal will result in the status of "W" being entered for each subject. Unofficial withdrawal from the college will result in an "E" grade for each subject.

2. Dropping a course(s) means cancelling registration in one or more courses. Any student wishing to drop a course(s) must secure a drop card(s) from the Registrar's office and take it to the instructor(s) involved for his (their) recommendation(s). This card must then be returned to the division director for further processing if the instructor's recommendation is one of approval. If the request is not approved, the student may appeal directly to his division director with the card showing the instructor's negative recommendation. After the director consults with the instructor involved, he may or may not approve the dropping of the course(s).

If a drop is approved, the status of "W" will be entered on the record. If a student who does not receive approval to drop fails to continue with the course, his grade at the close of the semester will be determined by the instructor.

## OFFICIAL NOTICES

Relationship of this College with the State University of New York at Buffalo - The following comments on press statements which appeared last week concerning the relationship of this College with the State University of New York at Buffalo may be of interest. The statements appeared following the presentation to the State Legislature of a report on higher education by Dr. Herman B. Wells and two other consultants appointed by that body. The press reports mentioned the possibility of a "merger" of the two institutions and were quite misleading and inaccurate in this connection. At no point does the Wells Report recommend such a development and subsequent press reports clarified this position. It is our understanding that the Wells Committee commented on the situation as it affects the two institutions and recommended that a study be made of the relationship between them. The Wells Report has not yet been considered by the Central Office of the State University of New York or by the Board of Trustees of the State University of New York.

It should be noted that in the most recent State University Master Plan issued in November 1964, it was pointed out that "a special situation exists in Buffalo, where the proximity of the college and the university center offers unique opportunities for cooperation. The curricular relationship between these units is presently being studied."

7. No commitments for printing, food or opening of College facilities should be made on behalf of the College with any professional or community group without the specific approval of the Coordinator of Special Projects.

III. Faculty Council, at its meeting on March 29, proposed the following change in policy and procedure for dropping a course:

Dropping a course means cancelling registration in one or more courses but short of full withdrawal from the college.

A student may drop a course during the first nine weeks of a semester and receive a "W" for that course provided he has first consulted with the instructor concerned and the director of the division in which he is a student. The division director shall process the drop after ascertaining that the student has discussed the matter with the instructor.

A student who drops a course after the first nine weeks will receive the grade of "E" for that course. An exception may be made for unusual circumstances beyond the control of the student. In such cases, the student may petition the Dean of Instruction for permission to drop a course without penalty. After the Dean consults with the instructor involved, he may or may not approve the dropping of the course. If he approves, a "W" will be entered on the record. The Dean may not delegate this responsibility to any person other than professional staff in his office.

If a student does not process an official drop, and fails to continue with the course, his grade will be "E".

This policy will become effective with the Fall Semester 1965-66.

The Director will review the recommendation and, if approved, will notify the Director of Summer Session (in duplicate) on a CHANGE STATUS CARD. The Summer Session Office will notify the Registrar's Office and the Business Office if there is a refund of tuition, (3) A student who drops a course after the beginning of the fourth week will receive a grade of "E" for that course. An exception will be made for unusual circumstances beyond the control of the student. In such cases, the student may petition the Dean of Instruction for permission to drop a course without penalty. After the Dean consults with the instructor involved, he may or may not approve the dropping of the course. If he approves, a "W" will be entered on the record, (4) If a student does not process an official drop through the Summer Session Office, and does not continue with the course, his grade will be "E".

The Institute is being conducted in cooperation with the African-American Institute and the U.S. Department of State Agency for International Development. Twenty-one liberal arts students from nine African countries will be in attendance. The University of California at Los Angeles has also been selected by the Agency for International Development to hold a similar institute this summer and the College and UCLA are the only two institutions conducting this program. Excerpt from President Paul G. Bulger's comments at opening faculty meeting on Sunday, September 12, 1965:

"... It is my suggestion that as a faculty our main objective for this academic year should be a balanced program of intellectual activities with emphasis on excellence in teaching. Of course, basic to the carrying out of this objective is the work of the individual faculty member and the need to build our library resources. . .

As we look at higher education in the United States and throughout the world, we are impressed by the tremendous pressures brought about by the size and cost of our institutions of higher education, the threats to academic freedom, the criticisms of quality of administration and teaching, and the behavior of a segment of our student bodies. We must, if we are to continue to be communities of scholars, further develop our sense of community and act as thoughtful, dedicated members.

This year I ask for your best effort to move this institution 'onward and upward.' Robert Frost put it this way:

The words are lovely, dark and deep.

But I have promises to keep,

And miles to go before I sleep.

As a faculty let us say -

But we have promises to keep,

And miles to go before we sleep.

#### INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION

Visit to South America: President Paul G. Bulger visited South America for three weeks in July. President Bulger is Vice-President of the Board of Trustees of Santiago College, Santiago, Chile, and he served as consultant there on this occasion on legal matters and the appointment of a new Director for the College. This was Dr. Bulger's eighth official trip to Chile since 1958. At the request of Secretary of State Rusk and Senator Robert F. Kennedy, he had discussions with the Director of the U.S.A.I.D. Mission in Asuncion, Paraguay, Mr. John P. Wiley, concerning the Partners of the Alliance Program.

Semester in Siena: The fall Semester in Siena Group of forty students arrived in Siena last Monday, September 13. The students are accompanied by faculty leaders Professor Norman Weaver (all-college group) who will serve as General Coordinator and Professor John Bice (art group). Professors Stanley Czurlies (art group) and Joseph Wincenc (all-college group) have been appointed as faculty leaders for the 1966-67 program. African Institute: A Summer Institute, "Teaching as a Profession in Africa," was held from July 1 to August 27 under the direction of Professor Ram Desai. Twenty-one liberal arts students from nine African countries were in attendance and the Institute has been most favorably commented upon by State Department officials and distinguished African visitors.

A record number of 70 international students, representing 41 countries, is enrolled at the college this year. Most of the students are from African and Latin American countries, but Asian countries are significantly represented for the first time. Lists of the students are available at the International Education Office. Special thanks is extended to those faculty members and students who so kindly helped with meeting new international students upon their arrival in Buffalo and in extending hospitality.

Over the last four years 18 international students have graduated from the college, 8 with bachelor's degrees and 10 with master's degrees. Most of these students are now serving in important positions in their home countries, and 3 are continuing with advanced studies in this country. Mr. John Paraskevopoulos is doing doctoral work in exceptional education at the University of Illinois, and Mr. Pravin Suchak has been admitted for doctoral studies in mathematics at Ohio State University.

Owing to heavy pressure on office space in Rockwell Hall, Room 203 has been vacated as an International Center and is now being used as the office for the Arts and Sciences Division. Alternate plans for relocation of the Center are being explored.

#### VESTING - TEACHERS RETIREMENT SYSTEM

The Governor approved a measure which reduces from 15 to 10 years the length of service requirement for Teachers Retirement System members who discontinue service after July 1, 1965 and prior to July 1, 1966 and also permits members to receive a deferred retirement allowance on or after the date he would first be eligible for retirement had he remained in service but in no case prior to the date he attains age fifty-five. II. The Committee on Academic Freedom, Tenure and Professional Welfare, on May 17, 1965, recommended in the area of Reappointment and Non-Reappointment of terms, that the following motions should become college policy:

(1) Divisions and departments shall institute formal procedures consonant with State University Personnel Policies to evaluate faculty members at the appropriate times. A statement describing these procedures shall appear in the minutes of the faculties, and shall be reported to the Dean.

(2) The college practice for notices regarding renewal or non-renewal of term appointment shall follow the standards as set below:

Notice of renewal or non-renewal, or of intention not to recommend reappointment to the State University Trustees, should be given in writing in accordance with the following standards:

1. Not later than March 1 of the first academic year of service, if the appointment expires at the end of that year; or, if a one-year appointment terminates during an academic year, at least three months in advance of its termination.
2. Not later than December 15 of the second academic year of service, if the appointment expires at the end of that year; or, if an initial two-year appointment terminates during an academic year, at least six months in advance of its termination.
3. At least twelve months before the expiration of an appointment after two or more years in the institution.

(3) The Committee recommended, and Faculty Council approved, an ad hoc committee of the Faculty Council shall be appointed. It shall study the potential problems expected from the new large-group instruction building. This committee shall make recommendations to this Council, among which shall be a means to assess periodically the faculty's experience with the new facility.

#### 1965 ENACTMENT TO NEW YORK STATE LABOR LAWS

Increased benefits in some State Social Programs of the labor law were passed by the 1965 Legislative Session and signed by Governor Rockefeller. The following summary is presented for your information and guidance. Additional information can be obtained for you when needed in Mr. Caputi's office, RH 111.

Unemployment Insurance - (1) The maximum benefit has been raised from \$50 to \$55 weekly. The new maximum of \$55 is payable when the average weekly wage is \$109 or more, (2) The new law has increased from \$50 to \$55 the earnings limit for partial unemployment benefits. If an employee works less than four days a week and earns less than \$55 (instead of \$50) he is entitled to some insurance benefits, if otherwise eligible, (3) Another enactment provides greater unemployment protection to domestic workers. All domestic workers of an employer who has paid his employees cash wages of \$500 or more in a calendar quarter are now covered by unemployment insurance.

#### NEW YORK SALES TAX INFORMATION

This information is distributed in an effort to help clarify the 2% New York State Sales and Use Tax and the 2% Local Sales and Use Tax which became effective August 1, 1965. Since the tax rulings are in their infancy stage, there are still many questions to be resolved, but possibly the following decisions will be of some interest and help. (1) Are some organizations exempt? YES - Exempt organizations include: New York State and its agencies and instrumentalities and non-profit organizations operated solely for religious, charitable, scientific, literary or educational purposes. However, if any of these organizations sells goods or services in a shop or store and such goods or services are normally sold commercially, then the exempt organizations must collect the sales tax from its customers. Re: College Store Sales are taxable except newspapers, periodicals and drugs. (2) Meals served in the college dining halls and snack bars taxable? NO. (3) Food vending machines taxable? NO - except when owned and operated by a private concern. (4) Photo-copying services taxable? NO - unless operated by the College Store. (5) Rental of automated data processing equipment? NO.

(6) Sales of annual yearbooks? NO. (7) Movie admissions? NO. (8) Rental of guest rooms on campus? NO. (9) Fees collected for participating sports? NO. (10) Admissions to athletic events? YES. (11) Admissions to social and cultural events? NO. (12) Research services performed under contracts and grants? NO. (13) Hospital and medical services provided? NO. (14) Student assessment fees? NO. (15) Laundry services, dry cleaning or linen rentals? NO. (16) Dues charged by college fraternities and sororities? NO - College fraternities of students are exempt, social clubs are subject to taxation. (17) Film rental services? NO - an exemption certificate must be obtained from the schools using the film.

#### REVISION OF TRAVEL REGULATIONS

Department of Audit and Control letter of September 30, 1965 authorizes revision of travel regulations for travel performed after November 4, as follows:

1) Paragraph 8.4e The maximum allowance for public transportation between an employee's residence and common carrier terminal at the beginning and conclusion of a trip is raised from \$2.00 to \$3.00, including tips. Such allowance is also extended to include reimbursement for the cost of transportation to and from the State garage to obtain or return a pool car. Subject to the \$3.00 maximum each way, reimbursement will also be made for personal car expenses (including mileage allowance, tolls and parking) used in traveling between an employee's residence and transportation terminal.

2) Paragraph 8.9d The per diem rate for meals, including tips, shall be allowed at \$7.00 rather than \$6.65. The allowance for incomplete days will be as follows: Breakfast, \$1.25; Lunch, \$1.65; Dinner, \$4.10; Total - \$7.00. For meals taken in railroad dining cars the following charges shall be allowed (including tips): Breakfast, \$2.00; Lunch, \$2.50; Dinner, \$4.75.

3) Paragraph 8.9h The lodging rates prescribed in Section 8.9.d and g are maximums. In all instances, it is expected that administrators will direct and employees will obtain suitable accommodations at the lowest possible cost to the State. Less-than-maximum rates may be obtained, for example, (a) where employees are on extended assignments (30 days or more) at one location, (b) in resort areas during off seasons, (c) in rural areas, and (d) where groups of employees travel together.

The above instruction applies to travel expenses defrayed by State Funds. Attention is further invited to the fact that travel funds available in the College Budget have not been increased to meet increased costs inherent in application of the new rates.

IV. Agenda for the next meeting of Administrators Council, to be held Tuesday, January 11, from 9:00 to 11:00 AM, will be a general discussion of college problems. President Paul G. Bulger

V. Faculty Council, at its meeting on November 29, 1965, took the following recommending action: Moved that all courses which are formulated by departments or divisions for updating and strengthening existing curricular programs be submitted to the Dean of Instruction, and that the Dean recommend approval of those courses he finds are necessary in the particular program as long as the overall pattern of the approved program is not altered, i.e., number of hours for major, for elective courses, and for other required courses is not altered. That any courses submitted to the Dean, which, if approved, would result in a change in program pattern be returned to the department or division concerned with the stipulation that a new program be submitted to the Council.

VI. Faculty Council, at its meeting on December 20, 1965, took the following recommending action on Challenge of Courses: (Any undergraduate student may challenge any required course for any prerequisite for such a course) in the curriculum for which he is enrolled. (a) Credit for successful challenge of courses and for advanced credit may not exceed thirty-two semester hours for any student, (b) Advanced standing (but no credit) will be granted for successful challenges of courses beyond the thirty-two semester hours of credit permitted above, (c) A student may not challenge a course more than once.

Successful Challenge of a Course. The passing of the examination administered as the result of a Challenge. A grade will be recorded for successful challenge for credit. A successful challenge for advanced credit will be recorded on a student's record.

Advanced Credit. Credit received as a result of scores on College Advanced Placement Examination or New York State Proficiency Examination.

Advanced Standing. Exemption from a course without credit for that course and authorization to take in lieu of the exempted course a more advanced course.

VII. In order for students who are presently on Final Probation or Special Probation to be cleared for second semester registration, and who may wish to make an appeal before the Probation Appeals Committee, they must report to the Office of the Vice-President for Academic Affairs, RH 208, with their grades indicated on a grade average card by Tuesday Noon, January 25, 1966.

The Spring Semester in Siena group consisting of thirty-eight students left by Icelandic Airlines from New York City last Tuesday, February 8, and arrived yesterday in Luxembourg enroute to Siena. Dr. Stanley Czurlas, who will be a faculty leader with the 1966-67 group, met with the students in New York City for a pre-departure session. Dr. Norman Weaver, Coordinator of the Siena group at present in Siena, met the group on their arrival in Luxembourg.

In cooperation with the U.S. Department of State and the Institute of International Education, the College has been selected to undertake a special project for ten Polish teachers of English. The Polish teachers arrived last week and they will be with us for the spring semester and summer session 1966. Our ten visitors are highly competent people with fine records of achievement and experience in their home country and they represent a very significant resource on campus. It is hoped that faculty members will make full use of these resources in a mutually effective way. A committee has been formed to provide an appropriate program for this noteworthy venture and further information may be obtained from the Director of International Education, RH 205, Ext. 693, where inquiries will be welcomed.

Exchange Program with the University of Puerto Rico 1966-67: The Exchange Program with the University of Puerto Rico will operate again in 1966-67 and it will be appreciated if faculty would kindly draw the attention of students to this program. The Program is designed for students who are now completing their sophomore year and who are in good academic standing. Competence in Spanish is required but special emphasis is also placed on personality characteristics and personal attributes indicative of the student's capacity to represent appropriately the College and the United States in a different culture and to adjust satisfactorily to a new learning environment. #### MYRON LEWIS RECEIVES SIX-WEEK ASSIGNMENT IN ETHIOPIA

Myron E. Lewis, Jr., Associate Director of the Industrial Arts Education Division, will depart March 10 for a six-week assignment in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. He will represent the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of International Trade, at a World Trade Exhibit in the area of furniture manufacturing and woodworking.

The purpose of the exhibit is to establish industries that can take advantage of Ethiopia's timber resources. New tools, machines and methods will be introduced that are compatible with the natural and cultural resources. In 1964 Professor Lewis acted in a similar capacity in Guatemala.

### COLLEGE RECEIVES \$171,200 GRANT

A \$171,200 federal grant, the largest ever awarded the College, has been received for the preparation of professional personnel in the education of handicapped youth and children. Dr. Horace Mann, Director of the Exceptional Children Education Division, has announced that the grant money will be used for undergraduate traineeships and graduate fellowships for the 1966-67 academic year, and that the sum represents an almost \$80,000 increase in support over the grant received last year. #### MEDICARE MONTH IN NEW YORK STATE

(1) The Medicare law passed by Congress last year contains two major programs: basic hospitalization coverage, commonly called Medicare, and voluntary medical insurance coverage, for which the elderly must enroll; (2) Benefits under both these programs commence on July 1, 1966. However, persons now 65 or older who want voluntary medical insurance coverage must enroll by March 31, 1966; (3) Whether a person has worked under Social Security or not, even for a short time, he should contact the local Social Security office. Such a person can have hospital and medical insurance, but he must apply; (4) If a person is still working, he should contact the local Social Security office, whether or not he now has plans to retire, since he must apply to benefit under both insurance plans; (5) If a person is presently receiving Social Security or railroad retirement benefits, he should have received a medical insurance enrollment card. The card must be filled out and mailed to the Social Security office to guarantee coverage, but no action is needed to guarantee protection under the basic hospital insurance plan.

First semester freshmen grades will not apply toward probation. Students having academic difficulty are expected to approach their Division Director for assistance and guidance.

A report was given by Dr. Sigmund Smith and a motion passed commending the faculty representatives to the First Annual Faculty Assembly of State University of New York at West Point, N.Y. Copies of the proceedings will be deposited in the Library and in Division and Department offices.

"An increasing number of tuition application waivers (form B-140) have been reaching the Central Personnel Office as late as three months after commencement of the courses. Although this late arrival causes us no particular difficulty, such delays in processing work undue hardship on the business offices at the instructing campuses. Please inform your staff that all applications for tuition waiver and reimbursement must be submitted to your offices early enough to permit action and return to the staff member before he registers for the course, because he must present the forms (with employing campus approval thereon) at the time of registration. It is hoped that rejection of late waiver requests by instructing campuses will not be necessary.

"Please note also that the "job-related" category cannot legally be used by employees not in the classified service. Professional service employees may obtain 100% waivers of tuition for "job-required" courses (which may even include any and all courses part of an established program leading to a graduate degree when such degree is considered necessary for promotion and/or continuing status), but they must pay full tuition for all other courses taken in the University. #### REVISION OF TRAVEL REGULATIONS

Department of Audit and Control Circular letter of April 11, 1966 advises of the following change to travel regulations effective April 16, 1966, based upon an extensive survey of lodging accommodations in hotels and motels throughout New York State.

A. Paragraph 8.9 Meals and Lodging is amended as follows: (d) Maximum rate for lodgings: actual cost not to exceed \$8.00 per night in New York City (including the counties of Rockland, Nassau, Suffolk and Westchester), Albany, Binghamton, Buffalo, Elmira, Ithaca, Jamestown, Poughkeepsie, Kingston, Rochester, Syracuse and Utica. Elsewhere in the State actual cost of lodging not to exceed \$7.00 per night.

B. It was disclosed in this survey that lower off-season rates are offered by hotels and motels in the rural areas of upstate and Long Island. Therefore, special note of this should be made when traveling during the period from Labor Day to Memorial Day.

C. Audit and Control will provide each State agency with the names and addresses of hotels and motels who have offered accommodations within the aforementioned maximum rates at a later date.

#### LEGISLATIVE INFORMATION

The following information is provided by the Director of Business Affairs for the benefit of faculty and staff: 8% Take-Home Pay - Mr. Michaels' bill AI 2159, passed the Assembly just minutes before the recess was called. Scattered opposition (there were 20 votes against the bill) again indicates a growing resistance to voting teacher benefits. This resistance first appeared a week earlier when a close vote on Mr. St. Lawrence's Sabbatical Leave bill, AI 3389, moved Mr. St. Lawrence to table the measure. We expect this bill to be called up for further consideration after the recess. SI 4511 RULES COM. (Education) - AI 5830 RULES COM. (Rules) -- Amends 355-a, Education Law, to repeal provision that after state university employee in classified service accepts appointment to unclassified service, that he shall charge to accrued sick leave balances, all approved sick leave in excess of one month prior to requesting additional sick leave otherwise allowable, or provided by state university trustees, and to provide that if he be in unclassified service and transfers to classified service, not more than 150, instead of 30 days of sick leave shall be credited.

SI 4532 RULES COM. (Higher Education) - AI 5828 RULES COM. (Rules) -- Amends 355a, Education Law, to authorize state university employee to enter into agreement with such university for reduction of basic annual salary and for contributions to purchase of annuity contract for employee by state in amount equal to salary reduction, and to make other provisions as to contents of agreement, purchase by state, termination, payroll deduction and payments.

SI 4533 COM. (Higher Education) - AI 5829 RULES COM. (Rules) -- Amends 355a, Education Law, to provide that beginning in 1966, any classification or reclassification of position in professional service of state university, and allocation or reallocation of position to certain salary grade, shall take effect at beginning of payroll period the first day of which is nearest the first day of July following approval of budget director and appropriation of funds, and to fix other provisions as to adjustment of salaries upon reallocation of position.

SI 4588 RULES COM. (Motor Vehicles Com.) -- Amends 501, Vehicle and Traffic Law, to provide that person who operates motor vehicle elsewhere than in city to transport pupils or teachers to and from school shall not be required to have chauffeur's license, therefore, instead of excepting only those operating motor vehicles for such purpose with seating capacity of less than 11 passengers in addition to driver.
