INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district) Building is situated on a standard sized building lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is directly opposite Delaware Park which was designed by FLO and is listed on the National Register. A dense grove of trees and the Buffalo Zoo are across the street from this property.
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two story American Four Square. Hip roof with a hipped dormer on the front facade. Dormer has three six light windows. Exterior chimney on west side of house. Enclosed porch across front of house has six light over single pane windows. Entrance has sidelights and a tri-part transom. Stone foundation. House is brick veneer. SIGNIFICANCE

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Typical example of the American Four Square that was built in the Parkside neighborhood. This section of Amherst Street, between Colvin and Parkside,, was conceived by FLO around 1873 as part of a residential "suburb" adjacent to Delaware Park. This suburb was called "The Parkside" by Olmsted and appears on an 1876 map drawn by him as a proposed area of curved winding streets on the north and east sides of the park. This section of Amherst St. was actually created by the City of Buffalo in 1875 when Amherst St. was extended from Delaware Ave. to Main St The street follows Olmsted's original plan maintaining the picturesque character that he envisioned for the streets surrounding the park.
