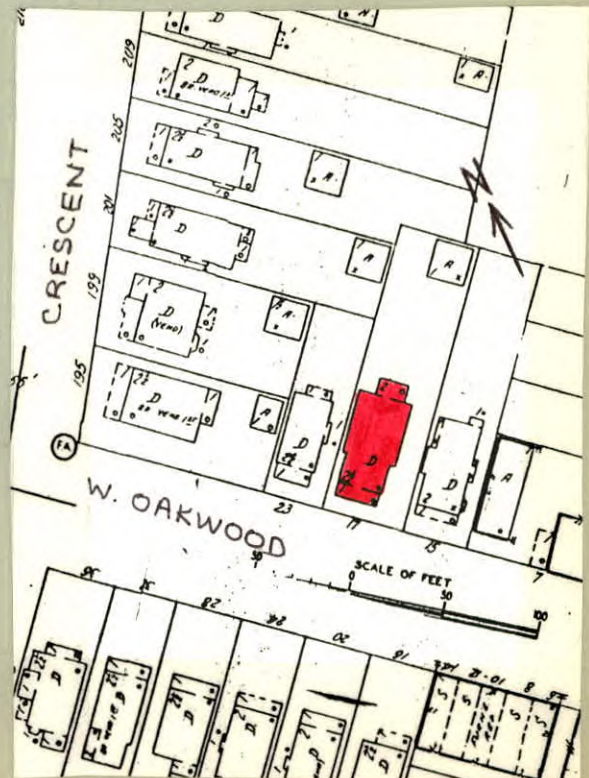

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located four blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story with Colonial Revival styling. Front facing gable roof with cornice end returns. Full-width Craftsman style porch, enclosed. Low-pitch hip roof with extending eaves. Shingled base and shingled Doric pilasters. Diamond design decorates pilaster at capital. Two 4-part windows; six lights each with transom. Right side of porch has lighted

SIGNIFICANCE

19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: c. 1893
ARCHITECT: lighted sidelights. Second floor has two double-hung 9/1 windows. Two paneled window shutters with heart-shaped cut-out pattern.
BUILDER: Cornice with dentils spans second floor. Gable has recessed window with curved sides. Double hung 15/1

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

A simplified Colonial Revival style with Craftsman style porch. West Oakwood Place extends from Main Street to Parkside Avenue. At the northern border of the first section of the subdivision to be developed, the eastern portion of West Oakwood was deeded to the city by Jacob Davis in 1887 and the remainder by Caroline Jewett in 1888. West Oakwood closely resembles a street found in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." While it does not connect with Jewett Avenue at the park entrance as Olmsted originally planned, it remains curvilinear and as a cross street provides easy access to the main thoroughfares and the park.
