

House is directly opposite Delaware Park which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): This is a 2 2 1/2 story 2 day structure with a gable roof. The house has many features common to early Colonial Revival houses. These include a Palladian window set into a cutout arch in the fish-scale gabled section of the roof on the west facade. The arch has a keystone at its center and is supported by double

	window has been boarded in. A fan decorative motif is located in the arched center portion of the window. In addition, the house features a rounded two story fish-scale bay on the south facade and a Colonial Revival porch on the west facade with Doric columns and a flat roof. Lattice work appears on the porch foundation.
