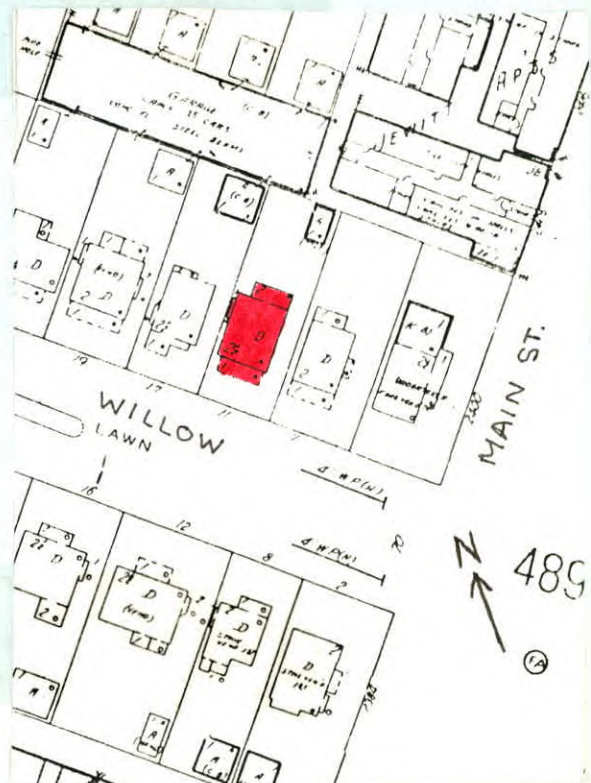

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located four blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story American Four Square. Hip roof with modillion style brackets under extending eave. Full-width hip roof porch, enclosed. Recessed wood paneled door. Left bay has three-part window. Rectangular stained glass center with slender elongated stained glass sides. Right bay has single rectangular stained glass window. Second floor has double-hung 1/1 window

SIGNIFICANCE window surround. Louvred

19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1909 in each bay. Entablature

ARCHITECT: window shutters. Fluted Doric end pilaster strips.
Hip roof dormer with flared extending eave.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: top light.

An American Four Square with Colonial Revival style influence. Willow Lawn, a one-block street between Crescent Avenue and Main Street just south of Jewett Parkway, is located on the lands of Elam R. Jewett and was named after the Jewett homestead. The last street to be created in the eastern portion of the Parkside subdivision, Willow Lawn was deeded to the city by Jewett's widow in 1905. It is the only Parkside street with a grassy median. While this specific street does not appear on Olmsted's 1870's maps of "The Parkside," it follows Olmsted's subdivision rule of providing easy access to a major thoroughfare leading toward downtown.
