Neither Mrs. Kimmey, who had a previous commitment, nor Miss Sheldon, who was ill at that time, was present May fourteenth, 1948, but both fully supported the projected program.

A preliminary meeting had been beld April ninth, 1948. To quote:

"At the officers' meeting of the Central Zone Art Group last week, April 9, at 1 p.m., in Miss Sheldon's office. The aim is to unify the art teachers of this zone, and then of the entire state.
