

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:	
A Colonial Revival style residence with Craftsman style details constructed to conform to a narrow urban lot. Summit Avenue is a	
truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent	t
Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section	
of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenu	ie,
appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section	0
between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This	•
street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special	
directness toward the town."
