		large lots and relative seclusion of the street were viewed as essential advan-
		tages of surburban living. The street takes its name form James Tillinghast, owner
		of the property up until July 15, 1889 when it was conveyed to George L. Thorne
		and Byron Angell, to be subdivided for residential use. The subdivision named
		"Meadow View Park" carried restrictive covenants in the deeds of sale. The re-
