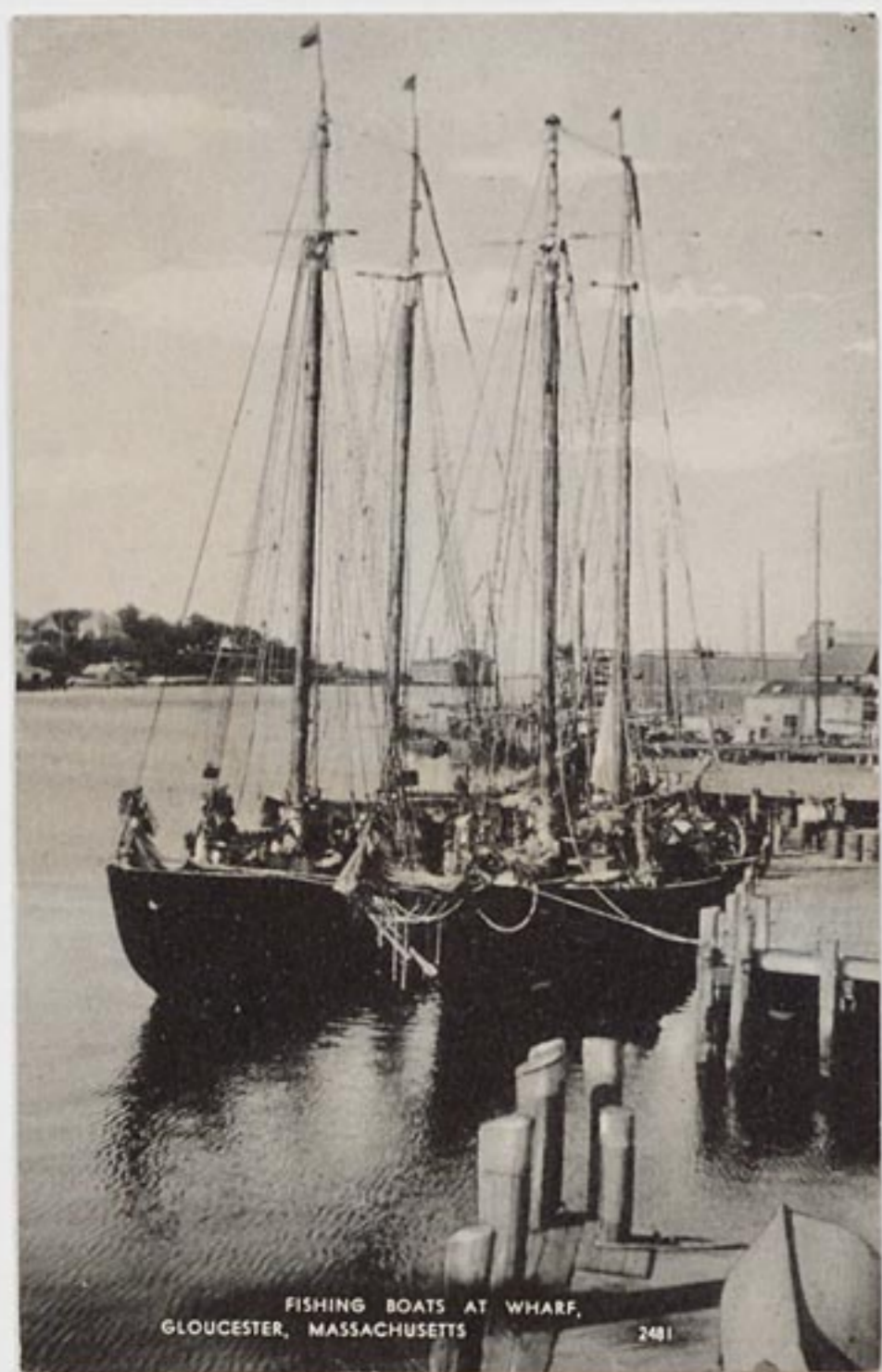

**T**HE trawler rose on the crest of the black sea. The wave broke in a white smother over her bow. The northeast gale, which had set in with darkness, lashed the spray across the glass of the pilot house. The vessel rolled deep to port, sluggish to helm with her load of fish, and slid down the heaving mountain of the Atlantic.

"Close," said the Captain at the wheel. "Close, that one."

"Aye," said his mate.

The wheel watch, with the Diesels turning over only enough to give steerage way, was a two-man trick. The two stood in utter darkness except for a faint glow of the binnacle lamp and the reflection, in the glass of the pilot house, of two small lights burning on the bulkhead behind them. The lights made twin bright spots on the glass, and dimly outlined between these, magnified in reflection, showed the figure of a woman—The Woman.

"Our Lady is a comfort on a night like this," said the Captain.

The other crossed himself. "Can you hold it alone?"

"Aye."

The mate turned to a niche in the bulkhead. The statue which was magnified by reflection in the wheelhouse glass stood there between small electric lights—a 16-inch tall statue of the Blessed Virgin in the role of Our Lady of Good Voyage, right arm upraised, a fishing vessel cradled in her left arm. The mate knelt briefly in prayer while the trawler pitched and rolled and the seas crashed and the wind clawed in vain.

In his turn the mate relieved the skipper and Captain Joe turned and knelt and said his prayer—of thanksgiving for the goodness of God manifest in the bountiful catch—of supplication for the mercy of God in the protection of ship and crew against the hungry storm.

Then both stood the wheel watch again and the reflection of The Woman shone on the glass.

"Now it is all right," said the mate.

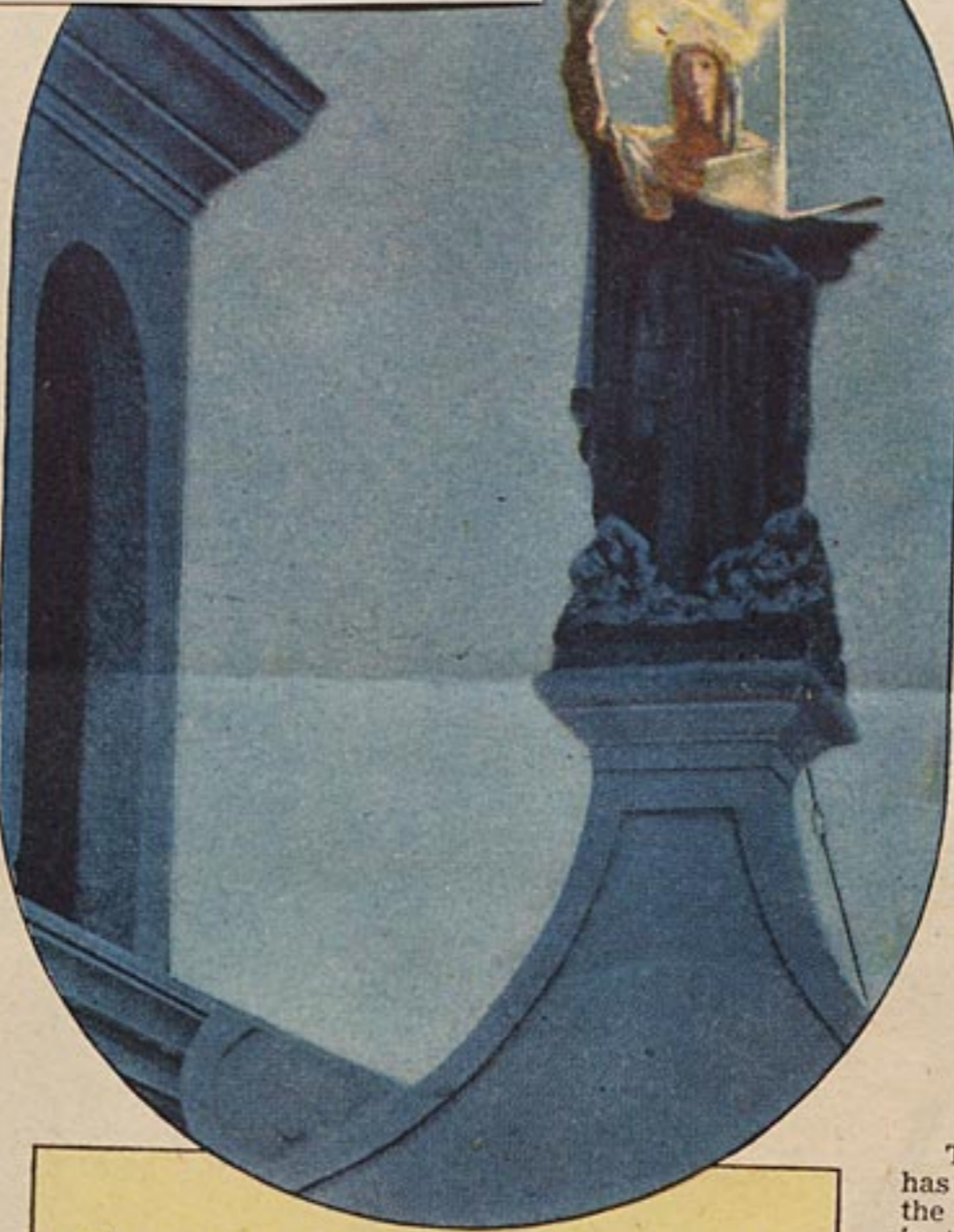
"Now it is good," said Captain Joe.

Two nights later, having weathered the worst whole gale of spring, the trawler was standing in for Gloucester and 20 miles outside Eastern Point breakwater the Captain was talking by radio telephone to his wife at home.

"We'll be in tonight," he said. "Call Father De Moura and ask him to put on the lights."

The night was clear, the sea flattening out. Fourteen members of the trawler's crew fined her bow rails, eyes peering in the direction of the distant unseen shore.

"Sling out when you see it," the Captain called down from the pilot house.

A few minutes later, distant and low on the horizon but brighter than any star, the light that serves as guide for the homing ships of Gloucester blazed forth. As the trawler ate up the miles for home, the light burned brighter and took form—a great 20-foot statue of Our Lady of Good Voyage, flanked by the cross-tipped twin spires of the church named for her on the hill overlooking the sea from which not every ship returns.

The next evening in the office of Captain Ben Pine, Captain Ben's business partner, Miss Ray

Adams, was paying off the crew. The men share in the proceeds of all voyages according to the price their fish brings in market. There is the owner's share. There is "the share for God."

Generally, fishermen of the Atlantic area get a 60-40 share in the gross earnings under an agreement which recently ended a 139-day strike of trawler crew members.

The owner's share has been set aside. Crewman Peter DeCosta approaches Miss Adams' desk.

"Four hundred and sixty-seven dollars for you, Pete," she smiles.

"Four hundred for me, to feed and clothe the little ones," says Peter. "The rest is the share for God."

Miss Adams sets \$67 of Pete's share aside. One by one as the men are paid in turn, "God's share" is set aside, and the total, as year's end approaches—at Christmastime—is presented by skipper of the vessel to Rev. Stephen De Moura, pastor of the Church of Our Lady of Good Voyage, for charities. It's the crew's donation in thanksgiving to God. Every crew makes it.

**T**HERE is an ancient proverb: "Let him who knows not how to pray go to sea." The English clergyman, George Herbert, expressed it a little differently in the early 17th century: "He that will learn to pray, let him go to sea."

The same thought, however expressed, has come down through the ages to attest the fact that there is no layman's group in the world more constantly in danger and more devout—perhaps none so devout—than the men who make up the fishing fleets of the world.

They are bluff, rough, hardy men of toll, daily braving peril of sea and storm and fog, and conscious always of the need for a spiritual hand at the helm.

**P**ETER paused in his fishing on the Sea of Galilee to become an apostle of Christ. The fisherman of today, as he has done since the days of Jesus, pays constant reverence to God.

Fishermen of racial strain and religious beliefs carry on with the ages-old traditions and ceremonies in America's great deepwater industry on

## Fire of Gypsy Airs and Singing Of Students Delight Pop Fans

Fittingly, the last "Pop" concert of the season by the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra focused the spotlight Friday evening on a Buffalo violinist and two Buffalo choral groups. Sponsored by The Buffalo Evening News and WBEN, the concert drew a capacity audience to Kleinhans Music Hall. William Steinberg, musical director of the orchestra, conducted.

Max Miller, concertmaster of the orchestra and music director of WBEN, has a large and faithful local following which paid tribute to his playing of Sarasate's Zigeunerweisen with the biggest ovation of the evening. His technical facility, pleasing tone and con brio tossing-off of the exciting, showy passages of the Sarasate work fully merited the enthusiasm.

Two State Teachers College choral groups, directed by Silas L. Boyd, head of the music department, demonstrated the quality and serious intent of Mr. Boyd's training and gave good promise for future appearances.

#### A Capella Choir Fills Need

A certain tonal restraint and the fact that the men's voices tended to over-balance the women's contributed to the somewhat negative impression left by the A Capella Choir of 80 mixed voices. Great credit is due Mr. Boyd for his initiation of this group, for there is definitely a place here for such

a choir, singing the choral literature represented by selections from Kountz, Christiansen, Schreck and Nicolai at Friday evening's performance.

Pretty in their pastel-tinted gowns, the 90 members of the Senior Women's Glee Club should have allayed the fears of any little boys in the audience destined to be taught by these teachers-to-be. The singers sang charmingly and unpretentiously Di Lasso's "Echo Song." The off-stage "echo" chorus gave it a pleasant, pastoral quality.

#### Whistling Wins Encore

The manner in which the girls accomplished some expert whistling in Krone's Hiking Song pleased the audience and elicited a repetition of the final perky bit of the selection. A Dance Song by Holst was another gay number.

The orchestral mood of the evening was quite romantic, opening with the graceful Overture to "Euryanthe" by Weber, and continuing with Liadov's delightful "Music Box." Contemporary romance had its innings in Robert Russell Bennett's symphonic synthesis of Jerome Kern tunes. After intermission, the orchestra swung back to the heyday of old Vienna to play Strauss' Emperor Waltz.

The bizarre coloring of Oriental romance in selections from Rimsky-Korsakov's Scheherazade rounded out the romantic atmosphere of the program and concluded the concert.

## Guard Against Temptations Graduate

Christ's Example  
Cited at Bacc

The Rev. Oscar C. Plumb, pastor of the Kenmore Methodist Church, speaking yesterday afternoon at the State Teachers College baccalaureate service in the school auditorium, urged graduates to "wake up and be big enough to care for humanity."

"Your generation can't win in a warless world," he declared. "If you don't get rid of war, you are going to get rid of all of us." He said a quarter of a million of our youth have paid the price and gave us a chance to make it that way. "We've got to pay the price of love and sacrifice. Narrow loyalties are dangerous than selfishness."

### Secret of God Called Vital

"We have the secret of the universe in our hands. But we cannot survive in this world unless we get the secret of God in our hearts. It is not big for nationalism, denominationalism, the narrow loyalties and the little things that make us fight and quarrel."

The theme of Dr. Plumb's baccalaureate sermon was the temptation of Christ in the wilderness.

"The devil appeared to Him and said: 'All these things I will give you if . . .,'" Dr. Plumb said. "That experience was by no means peculiar to Him and foreign to you. All those gifts will be extended to you, to, if—if you will lower your moral standards, are willing to throw all your traditions to the wind, if you cheat a little, shade the truth a little bit, or be dishonest."

### Temptation Recognized

"The gifts look so attractive but always there is an 'if.' Don't sell out too cheap. Remember that Jesus recognized this as a temptation. Lesser minds would have thought it an opportunity. It is a great shock to wake up and find that you have paid too much for those gifts, too much in moral sacrifice, moral integrity, self-respect, in sheer character."

"We get Epicurus all wrong. He said more than eat, drink and be merry. He said never do anything today that will bring you sorrow tomorrow, never indulge in a happiness today that will bring sadness tomorrow, so live that your joys will never come home weeping."

"You must learn to forever take the price tags off some phases of your life. You have education, skills, ability to sell. God pity you as a teacher and a person if you have character and morality to sell."

### Some Doors Should Stay Locked

"There are some doors in your life that you should lock, and throw the key away. There are some other doors of your life that you should block open and throw the key away. There are some things that you ought to settle now and that ought to stay settled forever. Don't sell out the person you can be. The worst ghosts are the forgotten acts and are grown out of the surrenders made to get some of the things that appear so beautiful today."

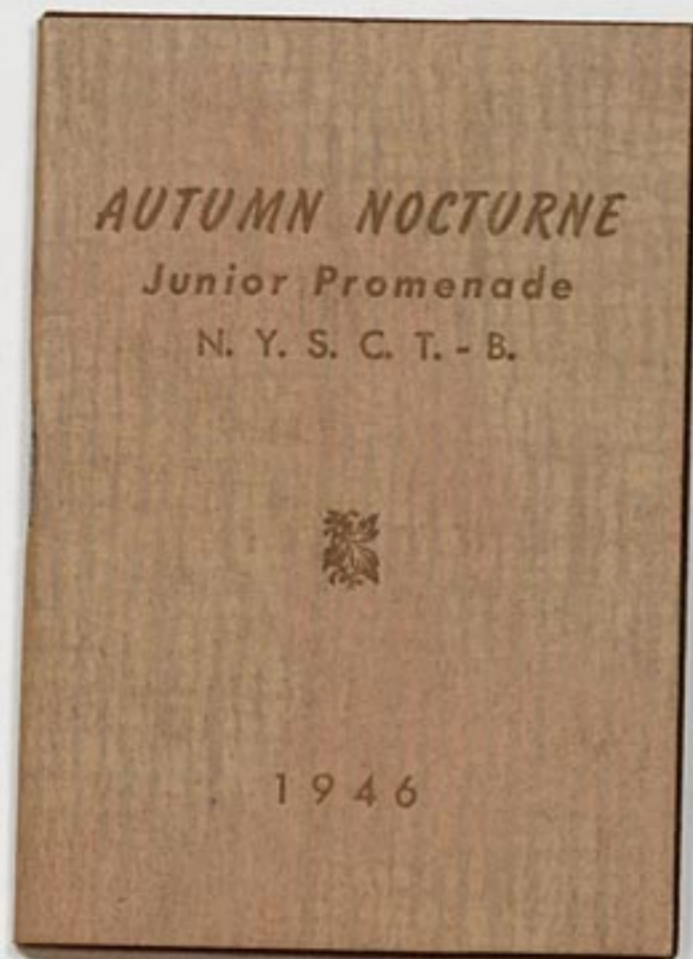
Dean Ralph Horn presided at the exercises and introduced Dr. Plumb. A musical service featured organ selections and the college capella choir.


