On Monday, October 27th Western New York received a major wake up call. Chautauqua County Health Department officials announced that at least 10 young women had been unknowingly infected by one individual, and many more were at risk. A community in panic turned to AIDS Community Services which has been providing professional services to those infected and affected by HIV and AIDS since 1983.

There is new hope. People are living longer and healthier lives.
