17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Wood-shingled hip roofed four square created with deliberate complexities. A deeply pedimented gable roof dormer has baroque console decoration. The southeast corner has a flat roofed one story circular room opposing a two-third width porch. Bay windows oppose a federal revival second-story window. The corner above the SIGNIFICANCE circular room has a single ionic pilaster cap with no pilaster below, a conceit 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1908 of the shingle style.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Shingled American four square with transitional asymmetrical elements relating to the Queen Anne style. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
