

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story with Craftsman styling. Hip roof with flared extending eaves. Exposed rafter tails with decorative curved ends projecting beyond roof eaves of roof proper, porch and dormer roof. Semi-circular one-story wing has brick base. Engaged Doric columns flank window bays. Each bay has two single light windows significance flanked by sidelight and leaded transoms. Paneled apron. Deck roof. Second floor wood paneled porch door flanked ARCHITECT: by double-hung 6/1 windows. Entablature window and

ARCHITECT: by double-hung 6/1 windows. Entablature window and door surrounds. Hip roof dormer has three rectangular BUILDER: windows; 6 light center and 4 light sides. The use of decorative exposed glass bands enframing panel. rafter tails emphasizes Craftsman styling that is juxtaposed to Classical details found in wing and window surrounds. Originally the Buffalo and Williamsville Macadam Road, Main Street was a pre-existing street at the time Olmsted designated it as the eastern border for "The Parkside." While the streets within the subdivision were designed specifically to avoid commercial development, this portion of Main Street became a combination of commercial and residential structures. It was also a major thoroughfare into the city, allowing easy access to downtown from this 21. SOURCES: suburban neighborhood.
