(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district) Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located four blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story frame American Four Square. Hip roof with slight eave overhang. Full-width enclosed porch. Hip roof. Brick base with pedestals supporting tapered Doric pilaster strips. Two four-part windows, 6 lights each. Entrance on right side of porch has lighted door with lighted sidelights. Second floor has two single-hung windows; single light with 5-light top light. Plain window ARCHITECT: surround. Louvred window shutters. Hip roof dormer.

BUILDER: 3/1 light.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Typical American Four Square with alterations to porch. West Oakwood Place extends from Main Street to Parkside Avenue. At the northern border of the first section of the subdivision to be developed, the eastern portion of West Oakwood was deeded to the city by Jacob Davis in 1887 and the remainder by Caroline Jewett in 1888. West Oakwood closely resembles a street found in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." While it does not connect with Jewett Avenue at the park entrance as Olmsted originally planned, it remains curvilinear and as a cross street provides easy access to the main thoroughfares and the park.
