

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located four blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story American Four Square. Hip roof with extending eave. Partial-width flat roof porch. Rough cut, regular course stone pedestals. Tapered square Doric supports. Entablature with extending cornice. Storm door flanked on one side by small rectangular window. First floor left bay has tri-part window with bowed left end. Center single-hung single-light with double-hung 1/1 sides. Entablature window

19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: c. 1900 surround with partial-width

ARCHITECT: porch over window. Second floor left bay has paired double hung 1/1 windows. Semi-hexagonal right bay BUILDER: has 5 single-light windows with stained glass transoms. Wide band of trim below roof eave. Segmental arched

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: pedimented dormer. Center A typical window has a pair of 6-light casement windows. Ends have single-light windows. Leaf and vine motif in American tympanum.

Four Square with Colonial Revival styling. Elam Place, Cympuname a one-block street between Crescent Avenue and Greenfield Street just north of Jewett Parkway, is located on the lands of Elam R. Jewett and was named after him. It was deeded to the city by his widow in 1889. A similar street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside," although that street was angled to connect Greenfield with the intersection of Crescent and Jewett. Elam Place also follows Olmsted's rule that a subdivision street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
