

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district) Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story frame with Colonial Revival styling. Front facing gable roof. Full-width flat roof porch. Rough cut, regular course stone base. Doric columns support entablature. Spindle balustrade. Glass and wood paneled door flanked on one side by leaded rectangular window. Tri-part first floor window. Double hung 1/1 windows. Second floor 3-light glass SIGNIFICANCE paneled porch door. Bowed DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: C. 1905 19 bay. Paired single hung windows with leaded top light flanked by paired ARCHITECT: leaded sidelights. Scroll-like brackets under gable eave. Pedimented gable has Palladian window. BUILDER:

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A gabled frame Colonial Revival style. Florence Avenue extends from Main Street to Parkside Avenue, paralleling Robie Street. Located within the first section of the Parkside subdivision to be developed, Florence Avenue was deeded to the city by Jacob Davis in 1887. Although Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside" show a street angling from the intersection of Main and Humboldt to Parkside Avenue, when it was finally developed Florence Avenue was modified to parallel Humboldt Avenue. It nevertheless still followed Olmsted's rule that a subdivision street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
