

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)
Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.
Two and a half story with Colonial Revival style influence. Hip roof with brackets and end consoles under eave. Full-width shed roof porch has doric columns and spindle balustrade. Glass and wood paneled door. First floor 8/8 windows. Second floor low-relief boxed bay has 6/6 windows with 4/4 sidelights. Pilaster SIGNIFICANCE strips flank windows. Support entablature. Hip 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: c. 1893 roof dormer has single window with "X" shaped
ARCHITECT: tracery.
BUILDER:
20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A Colonial Revival style residence with Classical details applied. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
