

The History of Pilgrim Baptist Church

One of the basic gifts of a civilization is its history and records of past events and the changes and progress of human civilization.

The spring of 1934 began a new adventure for those who left the fellowship of The Friendship Baptist Church, pastored by the late Reverend Twillis Davis.

Unlike some slaves of long ago who had to get a written consent from their masters to attend meetings, this small group of trusted men and women met at the request of the late Mr. Willie Gibson, at the home of the late Mr. Cleveland Allen, 222 Jefferson Avenue to discuss the forming of a Mission Group. The group was organized with the late Mr. Cleveland as chairman.

A special meeting was called to select a name. Several names were submitted, but the name "Pilgrim Baptist", submitted by the late Mrs. Rosa Poole was voted upon and accepted.

A ministerial committee composed of the late Reverends B.C. McCarley, N.B. Harris and J.B. Benton worked with the Mission Group and successfully organized the Pilgrim Baptist Church.

September 19, 1934 at 278 Jefferson Avenue a "Reality" was realized. Pilgrim selected its first officers.

The late Reverend R.D. Harris was acting pastor. The late Mr. O.C. Madkins, chairman of the Deacon Board, the late Mr. Willie Gibson, chairman of the Trustee Board, Mr. Zenobia Alexander, church clerk, the late Mrs. Frances Moore, financial secretary, Mr. Luther Watts, treasurer, the late Mrs. Bessie Lytell, building fund treasurer, and the late Mr. James Ingram as poor saint treasurer.

We take a look at distinguished ministers and former pastors.

Since 1934 Pilgrim has had many qualified and brilliant leaders who were both preachers and pastors, builders of membership, stately churches, and organizers of christian organizations.

From 1934 through 1984, the pulpit of this church has been filled respectively by the following ministers, other than the acting pastor already mentioned:

Reverend Hosea Pickney, the first pastor who served for eighteen months at 488 Jefferson Avenue, Henry B. Shaw, the second pastor for many sought a new locale at 214 Clinton Street because of growing enrollment and many auxiliaries were organized: The number One and Two Choirs, The White Rose Club, The Red Circle Girls, The Gospel Chorus, The Pastor's Aid Club, The Missionary Society, The Usher Board and The Junior Usher Board.

Reverend A.H. Banks, the third pastor, served two years and again the Reverend John Davis was called upon to administer mini-

sterial services. Reverend Charles W. Alexander, the fourth pastor, sought and found better quarters at 108 Clinton Street. Reverend Samuel Austin, young and newly ordained, moved the congregation to this present edifice, 655 Michigan Avenue. Reverend R. David Holloway, the fifth and present pastor, has served for twenty-two years. Under his leadership our sanctuary has been renovated, a baptismal pool installed, rooms in educational building beautified, four memorial, three state clubs and a mission circle were organized.

In 1973, under the leadership of the Trustee Board and its chairman, the late Mr. Aaron Allen, Sr., Pilgrim burned its mortgage on property at 655 Michigan Avenue. The Laymen's League invitation into the District Laymen Movement was also extended to Pilgrim. More importantly, many new members have united with us, and four young men have been inspired to enter the ministry. Reverends Asborn Taylor, Edward Abram, Eugene Pringle and Andre' Washington.

In recent years Pilgrim's stand in the community has increased with the Pilgrim Village Housing Corporation. This corporation, led by Mr. Eugene L. Pierce along with Jack-Tram Developers secured ninety units of small family housing! Construction of the apartments started on August 1, 1980 and is now completed and occupied.

Out of the fold of Pilgrim has come several leaders in district, state and national associations. They are the late Deacon Cleveland Allen, the late Mrs. Ertie Hilliard, Mr. Joe E. Morrow, Mrs. Mary Morrow, Mrs. Freddie Staples, Deacon Robert Staples, Deacon James Watkins, Mrs. Grace Knox, Mr. Eligah Reed, Reverend Samuel Austin, Reverend Whitfield Washington and our very own Reverend R. David Holloway. "Ye Shall Know Them By The Fruit They Bear".

Let us dedicate ourselves to manifest the hopes and dreams of the pioneers of Pilgrim Baptist Church.
