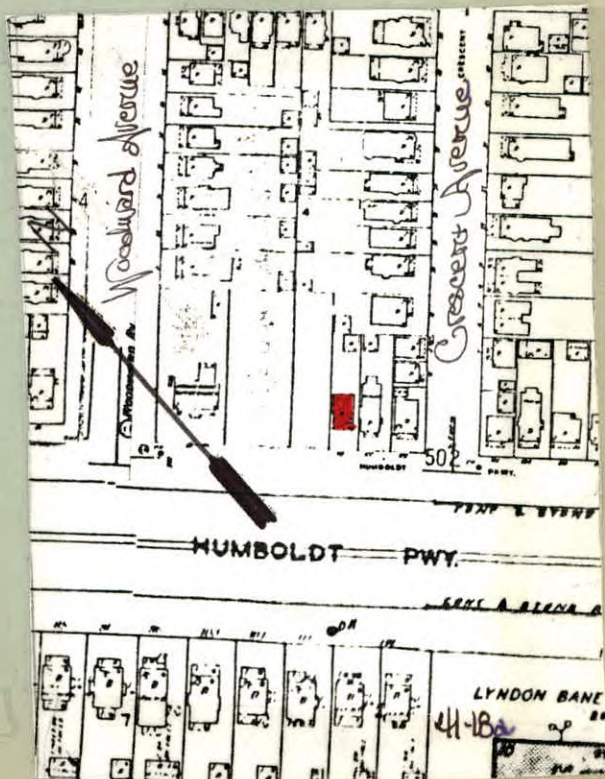

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:
(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)
The building is located on a broad east-west thoroughfare designed by Olmsted to "act as a route of access" to Delaware Park and the secondary parklands; i.e. Martin Luther King, Jr. Park. The City's expressway presently dissects the parkway. Situated on a standard size building lot in Olmsted's Parkside subdivision, surrounded by varied 20th century architectural styles; Queen Anne to Prairie.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):
Two and one half story vernacular version of the Colonial Revival Style. Steep pitch hip roof with projecting eave. Brackets under front eave. Hip roof dormer. Tri-partite square-headed 6/1 window. Paneled end pilasters. Entablature under roof eave. Full-width flat roof porch. Paneled door with sidelights. Second floor oriel. First and second floor four-part rectangular windows, single light. Building end paneled pilaster strips. Hip roof bay on north side.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:
A typical example of a simplified Colonial Revival Style residence. Humboldt Parkway was named for Alexander Humboldt, a noted geologist, in honor of his work as a Naturalist. The Parkway was conceived by Olmsted as a broad thoroughfare, designed with central roads and walkways for "pleasure travel." This area would provide a setting for short walks, a playground for children and an "airing ground for invalids." Roadways outside of this area would "answer the purpose of a street for ordinary travel."
