

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.	
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story American Four Square. Hip roof with extending eaves. Hip roof full-width one story clapboard wing, completely enclosed. Brick first floor. Band course at second floor level. South side has semi-circular entrance porch. Doric columns support entablature. Dentils under cornice. Wrough iron balustrade for balcony. Wood paneled door flanked by decorative iron sconces. 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1911 Second floor front facade.	5c
ARCHITECT: has two double-hung 1/1 windows placed directly under roof eave. Stucco second floor. Hip roof dormer has projecting eave and three double-hung

with Spanish Eclectic styling applied to entrance. Originally the Buffalo and Williamsville Macadam Road, Main Street was a pre-existing street at the time Olmsted designated it as the eastern border for "The Parkside." While the streets within the subdivision were designed specifically to avoid commercial development, this portion of Main Street became a combination of commercial and residential structures. It was also a major thoroughfare into the city, allowing easy access to downtown from this suburban neighborhood.
