

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located four blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story brick American Four Square. Full-width flat roof porch. Brick base and pedestals. Tapered square Doric supports. Paneled rail. Entablature with modillions under extending cornice. Glass paneled door with 3/4 length leaded sidelights. Lintel. Tri-part first floor window; double hung 1/1 center with leaded sides. Lintel. Second floor has two double-hung 1/1 windows. Lintel window

ARCHITECT: <u>head. Modillions under roof eave.</u> Hip roof dormer has modillions under eave. Two double BUILDER: <u>hung 1/1 windows.</u>

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: An American Four Square with Colonial Revival styling. Willow Lawn, a one-block street between Crescent Avenue and Main Street just south of Jewett Parkway, is located on the lands of Elam R. Jewett and was named after the Jewett homestead. The last street to be created in the eastern portion of the Parkside subdivision, Willow Lawn was deeded to the city by Jewett's widow in 1905. It is the only Parkside street with a grassy median. While this specific street does not appear on Olmsted's 1870's maps of "The Parkside," it follows Olmsted's subdivision rule of providing easy access to a major thoroughfare leading toward downtown.
