Uncrowned Queens will partner with Studio Arena Theatre's production of A Raisin in the Sun (January 11 - February 8).

Peggy Brooks-Bertram, Dr. P.H., Ph.D. and Barbara A. Seals Nevergold, Ph.D. will be the featured guest speakers for two workshops, sponsored by the Education Committee of Studio Arena Theater. The educational programs will address topics related to SAT's production of A Raisin in the Sun, the award winning play written by the late Lorraine Hansberry. Ms. Hansberry was the first black playwright to have a play on Broadway.

On January 26th at 5:30 - 7:00 pm, Dr. Brooks-Bertram will discuss The World That Shaped A RAISIN IN THE SUN: Drama for Social Change. Dr. Brooks-Bertram will take closer look at national change, events, and ideas that influenced Lorraine Hansberry's groundbreaking drama A RAISIN IN THE SUN. This program will take place at Buffalo State College in Butler Library 210.

On February 2nd at 5:30 - 7:00 p.m., Drs. Nevergold and Brooks-Bertram's presentation is entitled: Women of Passion, Power and Purpose: The Uncrowned Queens of Western New York in the 1950's.

Focusing on the era during which Raisin in the Sun was set Drs. Nevergold and Bertram, co-founders of Uncrowned Queens Institute for Research and Education on Women Inc., will draw a parallel between the women in the play, e.g. the Uncrowned Queens of Raisin and the real-live histories of the African American women of Western New York. The biographies of these women provide the backdrop for a discussion about the roles and activities of women at this time, and how their contributions and accomplishments enriched an entire community. This program will take place at the Theater in the Stage Left Lounge.

Both programs will offer time for audience discussion. Refreshments will be served. These programs are free and open to the public and are part of a four-part series of community outreach activities accompanying the production of A Raisin in the Sun.

WELCOME TO THE NOVEMBER 2004 EDITION OF THE UNCROWNED QUEENS INSTITUTE FOR RESEARCH AND EDUCATION ON WOMEN, INC. NEWSLETTER.

Throughout the year, the UQ Institute recognizes the contributions of its many Uncrowned Queens. This year, a particular emphasis is placed on those Queens who are in their 70's, 80's and 90's. Recently, UQ was particularly honored to participate in ceremonies that honored Garnet Hicks Wallace for her nearly two decades of outstanding community building as a member of the Buffalo Psychiatric Center's Board of Visitors.

#### ===== GARNET HICKS WALLACE =====

The Board of Visitors, at the Buffalo Psychiatric Center, is a seven-member board appointed by New York State's Governor, and confirmed by the State Senate. Board members are empowered to monitor the care of mental health patients and act as advocates on their behalf. Initially appointed to the Board in 1986, Ms. Wallace served as Board secretary on several occasions and served on numerous committees, most notably the Minority Family Advisory Committee. During her Board tenure, Ms. Wallace often visited individual patients and attended many functions for patients as well as staff.

Ms. Wallace's decision to resign from the Board was prompted, in part by the fact that as she puts it, she's three years away from 90. But, her retirement from the Board means she will be devoting more time to her other volunteer activities, her church, Bethel AME Zion and several other organizations in which she has membership. On October 14<sup>th</sup>, the Board of Visitors and members of the Psychiatric Center's administrative staff hosted a reception in Ms. Wallace's honor. Members of Gamma Phi Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., The Links, Inc., Buffalo Chapter and Women for Human Rights and Dignity, Inc. attended this reception and lauded Ms. Wallace for her contributions to those organizations, as did members of the Center's executive staff. Dr. Nevergold, who is President of the Board of Visitors, also spoke on behalf of the Uncrowned Queens Institute when she recognized Ms. Wallace as a "Mother Warrior", who has set an example, by her good works, for all of us.

Assembly member Sam Hoyt also attended the reception and presented Ms. Wallace with an Assembly Resolution in her honor. The Resolution concluded, "Therefore, we wish to recognize this extraordinary woman for all she has given to those in need of mental health services and also to our entire community throughout her many years of work and volunteerism. We wish her continued good health, peace, and contentment for many years to come, and we express our grateful appreciation for her outstanding service." Although they were unable to attend, Erie County Legislature Demone Smith and New York State Senator Bryon Brown also sent proclamations in honor of Ms. Wallace.

We are also pleased to recognize Ms. Virginia DeBerry, author of several successful novels.

#### ===== VIRGINIA DEBERRY =====

Best-selling authors Virginia DeBerry & Donna Grant took top honors in both Contemporary Fiction, and Female Author of the Year categories for their novel, "Better Than I Know Myself" (St. Martins Press, June 2004) at the First Annual Open Book Awards, presented by the African American Literary Awards Show, Inc. The ceremony and dinner were held September 29, 2004 at the historic Alhambra Ballroom in Harlem, New York.

"To be acknowledged by readers means a lot to us," DeBerry said. "That's who we're thinking about when we sit down at the computer together to write," Grant added.

According to the publishing industry, African American consumers spend over \$400 million annually on books. The AALAS Open Book Awards is an opportunity to not only celebrate and recognize African American authors and writers, but to focus more attention on this market segment as a whole.

#### ===== UNCROWNED QUEENS ORAL HISTORY PROJECT =====

During the month of November, the Uncrowned Queens co-founders will be conducting oral history interviews with seven of our Uncrowned Queens who are septuagenarians and octogenarians. This unprecedented project will add another dimension to the regional history of African American women. Sometime during next year, we will have excerpts of these interviews on our website. The Oral History Project is funded by a grant from the University at Buffalo's Educational Technology Center and is a collaboration with the University Archives, African American Studies Department and the American Studies Department.

== UNCROWNED QUEENS TO COMMEMORATE THE NIAGARA MOVEMENT CENTENNIAL ==

Next year, 2005, is a very significant year for the entire Buffalo and Western New York community. It is the centennial of the Niagara Movement. As a bit of background, the Niagara Movement, albeit short-lived, was an organization founded by a group of African American leaders that included W.E.B. DuBois, John Hope, and Monroe Trotter. It is believed that local Buffalo residents Mary B. Talbert, her husband W.H. Talbert and the Rev J. Edward Nash were also involved in the founding meetings, and at least one of these meetings was held at 521 Michigan Avenue, site of Mr. & Mrs. Talbert's home. The Talbert home was located next door to the Michigan Street Baptist Church, pastured by Rev. J. Edward Nash. Held from July 11-14, 1905, the Niagara Movement, named for the mighty Falls, because of the plan to "unleash a mighty current" of protest laid the groundwork of the modern civil rights movement and is recognized as the fore-runner of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

The Uncrowned Queens Institute is planning several activities to commemorate the Niagara Movement Centennial. In fact, we are advising you now to reserve the dates, October 7-8, 2005. Induction ceremonies will be held that weekend for Mary B. Talbert and nine other women into the National Women's Hall of Fame. The Institute will organize a bus trip to Seneca Falls for the induction services. Additional information will be available in the next few months.

#### ===== FUTURE UNCROWNED QUEENS =====

Forty-one young women completed the Rites of Passage Ceremony of the Debutante's Program of the Gamma Phi Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. On October 21<sup>st</sup>. the young women participated in a program that showcased their talents, grace and maturity as young women who are poised for adulthood. As stated by the Sorority, the purpose of the Rites of Passage Ceremony is two-

fold. "First, we feel the need to affirm for our daughters the positive aspects of passing from childhood into womanhood in a way that will punctuate their transition. Secondly, we want to affirm from our community, the support, examples, the role models, the respect, and the responsibility to bring out the best in these young ladies." Judging by the response from the packed auditorium, both goals were achieved. The program was held at McKinley High School, where Crystal Barton, co-Mistress of Ceremonies, is Principal. UQ Janet Barnes was the Rites of Passage Chair. Sorors Ingrid Johnson-Jacobs and Gina Mayo-Hawkes are co-chairs of the Debutante Program. Co-founder of the Uncrowned Queens Institute, Barbara Seals Nevergold, shared Mistress of Ceremony duties. Dr. Nevergold is a member of Xi Epsilon Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. and is pleased to have been invited by the Sorors of Gamma Phi Omega Chapter to participate in this outstanding event.

====== NEVERGOLD SPEAKS AT WOMEN'S ACTION COALITION =======

On Wednesday, October 20<sup>th</sup>, Barbara Seals Nevergold spoke to the members of the Women's Action Coalition. This group, comprised of representatives from Women's organizations throughout Erie County, meets monthly to share information about their organization's programs. Further the groups coalesce to support and strengthen efforts, which will ensure that women's voices are heard on the social, political and economic issues affecting us. Dr. Nevergold spoke on the development and growth of the Uncrowned Queens Institute and the Institute's plans for commemorating the Niagara Movement Centennial.

\_\_\_\_\_ OKLAHOMA! \_\_\_\_\_

Photos and biographical sketches for African American community builders of Oklahoma are beginning to arrive. Naturally, the first addition is that of Drusilla Dunjee Houston after whom the Web page is named. Her 1917 poem, America's Uncrowned Queens provided the inspiration for the establishment of the Uncrowned Queens Project. The very next bio is that of Mollie Lee Parker Franklin. The photo and bio-sketch was provided by her son John Hope Franklin who is the nation's most celebrated African American historian. Professor Franklin is a native of Oklahoma and in 1996 was elected to the Oklahoma Historians Hall of Fame. He is the James B. Duke Professor Emeritus of History at Duke University and has also served on the faculties at St. Augustine's College, Howard University, Brooklyn College, and the University of Chicago. A former president of the Southern Historical Association, the American Historical Association, and the United Chapters of Phi Beta Kappa, he has received dozens of major awards and more than 100 honorary degrees. In 1995, he was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian honor. That same year the John Hope Franklin Research Center was founded at Duke as a repository for African and African American studies documentation. During the Clinton administration, Professor Franklin was appointed by President Clinton to lead a panel of advisers on promoting racial understanding in the United States.

Another early arrival is that of Eddie Faye Gates, Oklahoma Historian and author of the recent book on the Tulsa Oklahoma massacre of 1921, Riot on Greenwood: The Total Destruction of Black Wall Street. Other early arrivals include Maggie Ellis. In 1889, Maggie Riley Ellis and her family were among the first Blacks to voluntarily settle in the Oklahoma Indian territory. They made their new home in Lincoln County, near Chandler Oklahoma. This information was received from Mel Chatman, an independent scholar and researcher from Lincoln County, Oklahoma. Mel has been working in collaboration with the Uncrowned Queens Institute for the past two years and we look forward to his continued assistance in building the repository of women from Oklahoma.



=== UNCROWNED QUEENS - 2003-- THE YEAR IN REVIEW ======

Annual Report of the Uncrowned Queens Institute for Research and Education on Women, Inc.

This Annual Report 2003 is not only an opportunity to reflect on the past year and our activities, but also an opportunity to express our sincere gratitude to the countless people who have contributed to the success, growth and development of the Institute and who continue to support and encourage us. This report reflects the versatility and vitality of the Uncrowned Queens Institute and offers tangible examples of the Institute's continued growth and development.

The year 2003 marked the fourth year of the founding of the Uncrowned Queens Project. As with previous years, it was a year of expansion, advancing our mission and establishing an organization that will have sustainability and longevity. To that end, we are pleased to report that the Uncrowned Queens Institute for Research and Education on Women, Inc. was formally designated a 501 c (3) non-profit organization in 2003. We are indebted to a small group of individuals, who constitute our Board of Directors, for their commitment to and support of the Institute. We will say more about the Board later in this report. We have developed new partnerships, solidified old alliances and created innovative ways to get the "message" out about the history and role of African American women and men in the Western New York region.

# === STATUS OF BIOGRAPHIES =====

The Institute continued one of our foundational activities: collecting biographies for the website. The "techno-pedia" which we have created has grown to more than 700 biographies, including new biographies of women from Rochester, Niagara Falls, New York City, Syracuse and Lackawanna, in addition to those from Buffalo. Future plans include the creation of a "digital repository of black women's regional history," which will preserve and extend the Institute's pioneering work into other regions of the country. Throughout this year we worked diligently to communicate the message that the Uncrowned Queens Institute is dedicated to the identification, collection, preservation and dissemination of Black women's history using web-based technology, as well as traditional publications, to display African American women's photos and biographies. In particular, we strived to ensure that black women whose contributions and achievements-large and small-- resulted in the improvement of the quality of life in our community are recognized and rewarded with their "crown".

While we continue to be successful in obtaining new biographies of hundreds of Uncrowned Queens we've also encountered several barriers and challenges that have hampered the achievement of this goal. They include the following:

- Many women do not think they've done anything to "deserve" the recognition;

- Many women have the misconception that only "high profile" women can be named Uncrowned Queens; and

-Many women are reluctant to write about themselves in positive and complimentary ways.

- Others believe we discontinued identifying "queens" after the initial launch in February of 2001. Nothing could be further from the truth.

We continually answer the questions resulting from the above by restating our mission and by working, pro-actively, to teach women how to value their own achievements and to document their achievements and contributions in writing. We have offered and will continue to offer workshops to women on "How to Write Your Biography". We invite those of you who are reading this and fit any of the above descriptions, or know someone else who falls into one or more of these categories, to write to us and set up a workshop on writing the biography.

= WEB SITE UPDATE =====

We are excited to report that the website has grown in the number of daily "hits" received from individuals around the world. Our analysis of the reasons why people use the website includes educational, research, personal interest in the goals and objectives of the Institute, searches for specific individuals on the site and use of the site to prepare profiles of a specific Queen for an award or other honor. Currently we are averaging 40,000 to 45,000 hits per month. As we continue to expand to other geographical locations we anticipate that access to the website will similarly increase.

We have established a number of new Linkages with other websites that compliment our site, and contribute to the increase in hits. For example last year we were linked with the Chicken Bone Journal-this site receives 70,000 hits per day!; List serve of the Association for the Study of African American life and History-this site carries our conference and event notices nationally and they get more than 100,000 hits per day; Facing History-another national site that lists UQ on its site with accompanying information; the National Women's History Project; and Kate Clifford Larson's site on the biography of Harriet Tubman.

# == APPEARANCES AND EVENTS ======

Uncrowned Queens Day Proclaimed in Buffalo and Erie County In honor of its second year anniversary, the Uncrowned Queens Institute for Research and Education on Women, Inc. received proclamations from the City of Buffalo and County of Erie declaring February 15, 2003 Uncrowned Queens Day. The proclamations were presented to Uncrowned Queens co-chairs Barbara Seals Nevergold and Peggy Brooks-Bertram during a press conference on that day in the State Hall of the Buffalo and Erie County Historical Society.

February was an extremely busy month for the Uncrowned Queens Institute and its co-founders. Our activities included numerous television, radio and newspaper interviews, presentations and programs. The co-founders were interviewed for a WIVB-TV documentary entitled "Black Soul: the Legacy Continues" that aired on February 10th on channel 4 and its sister station, WNLO. This documentary also featured a segment devoted to the photographic work of Barbara's father, Rev. Willie B. Seals. Rev. Seals, proprietor of Seals Ebony Studio, was a well known photographer in the Buffalo community. The Uncrowned Queens Institute collaborated with the Seals Family in mounting an exhibit of the photographic collection at the Buffalo & Erie County Historical Society that has been on display since June, 2001.

In recognition of African American History Month and continuing a partnership with our corporate sponsor, Tops Markets, Inc., a month-long series of activities resulted in raising awareness of the Institute and funds for the scholarship program of the area LINKS, Inc. chapters and introduced many Western New Yorkers, Black, White and Latino, to the Uncrowned Queens: African American Community Builders, Vol. 1. Members of the Erie County, Niagara Falls and Rochester chapters of the Links, Inc. joined the UQ founders for book signings at selected Tops Markets in Buffalo and Rochester. Proceeds from the book sales were donated to the Links scholarship fund.

Uncrowned Queens's founders were also interviewed by Linda White on her television program, "Live with Linda White" on Channel 7 and with Mayor Anthony Masiello on his cable television program. During the Tops Markets book signings, radio stations WUFO-AM and WXLO-Fm (Rochester) provided remote broadcast programs. Members of the Links organizations, as well as the Uncrowned Queens founders, were interviewed.

In addition to the aforementioned, several presentations were given: at Key Bank Corporate Offices, St. John Baptist Church, Campus West School, First Shiloh Baptist Church (Barbara conducted a Family History Workshop), the Niagara Falls Housing Authority (in honor of Doris Jones) and Tops Corporate Offices. Several specials activities included the induction of Mae Jemison, first black female astronaut, into the Uncrowned Queens; presentation of 75 copies of volume 1 of Uncrowned Queens to the Buffalo Board of Education (this gift made possible through the generous donation of the Buffalo Teachers' Federation and its president, Phil Rumore); and an extraordinary presentation to a group of Russian educators who were visiting Buffalo.

The educators, sponsored by the US State Department and World Connect, were hosted by the Uncrowned Queens Institute at the Educational Opportunity Center. Thanks to EOC and its director, Dr. Sherryl Weems for access to their distance conferencing facility. We were able to connect to the conference center at UB and conduct a joint program with Dr. Lillian Serece Williams, Chair, African American Studies at UB and Dr. Vladimir Ageyev, Clinical Professor, Department of Learning and Instruction, also at UB. The Russian educators were particularly interested in issues of women's role in grassroots organizing, work, education, social and political activism. Although we had an interpreter, language was not a barrier and the interchange was lively and enlightening. We received an invitation to come to Siberia, Moscow and other parts of Russian (when the weather gets warm!).

In March, Women's History Month, we returned to Rochester for a presentation and book signing at Memorial AME Zion Church. Dr. Juanita Pitts, M.D., a towering representative of Black women in that city, invited us to participate in the Annual Harriet Tubman program. Also in March, Uncrowned Queens took to the airwaves once again. This time as guest hosts of the Ted Kirkland Program on WUFO-AM radio. Peggy and Barbara also appeared on AM Buffalo, Channel 7 T.V.'s morning show where Peggy introduced the "Uncrowned Queens Vegetarian Pizza."

The co-founders were guest presenters at the Women of Excellence Program hosted by Alpha Beta Sigma at UB. The event took place at the Student Union on the Amherst Campus of the University at Buffalo.

We also had the opportunity to recognize two women of national stature as Uncrowned Queens. Poet Laureate, Lucille Clifton (a native of Depew, New York) and Dr. Beverly Hendrix Wright were added to the website. The Uncrowned Queens founders were also recipients of awards for their work, from Gamma Phi Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. and Alpha Beta Sigma Sorority.

In May, a presentation was given for the staff at Buffalo State College's Weigel Health Center and book signings took place during the National Conference of the Girl Friends, Inc. at the Adams Mark Hotel.

Peggy Brooks-Bertram was honored in June as one of the nominees for the YWCA Leadership award. She also participated, as a presenter, in the National Underground Railroad Family Reunion, which was held in Philadelphia. Barbara and Peggy were interviewed for another television documentary this month as well. Claudine Ewing, WGRZ-TV reporter highlighted the Uncrowned Queens Institute as part of a program on the significance of Juneteenth in the Western New York community. The Institute was a co-sponsor with St. John Baptist Church and the Center for Hospice and Palliative Care, Inc. for a program on African Americans and hospice care and featuring Uncrowned Queen and author, Dr. Karla Holloway, an Uncrowned Queen.

The Uncrowned Queens of Forest Lawn was the subject of a special presentation by Barbara Nevergold at the cemetery's Chapel. This program was part of the annual Ancestral Tour, in collaboration with the Afro American Historical Association of the Niagara Frontier, Inc. and the Forest Lawn Group.

Connie Porter, Lackawanna native, author of the Addy Girl Series, "Imani Mine" and "Albright Court", spoke at UB and was inducted into the Uncrowned Queens in September. This period also marked intense preparation for the third annual conference, scheduled for November 7th and 8th at the Marriott Hotel and the Buffalo Museum of Science.

In November we realized two major milestones: our third annual conference, "Embracing African American Women of Power, Passion and Purpose", and the publication of "Uncrowned Queens: African American Community Builders" volume 2. The book represents another one hundred bios of Uncrowned Queens from our website. A completely new Introduction, Analysis and Afterword accompany this volume. We also were invited to one of our first community book signings by Dr. Curlane Jones Brown. The book signing was held at the newly opened Refuge Temple Plaza on Jefferson Avenue. Thanks, Dr. Curly! We had a wonderful time.

Continuing a tradition and enduring partnership with the Xi Epsilon Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., we donated and auctioned off a two-volume set of Uncrowned Queens: African American Community Builders (Vol. 1 & 2) at the sorority's annual Lucky Number Luncheon. The proceeds of this fund-raiser benefit the sorority's community programs. The Institute is proud to participate in this worthy cause.

We also participated in "an evening with local authors" event, which was sponsored by the Buffalo & Erie County Historical Society. A similar event was also hosted by the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library at the Central Branch. We had the pleasure of joining other local authors in reading from the second volume of "Uncrowned Queens."

In December, we welcomed another international visitor, Ms. Ga Ma, chairwoman of the Women's Federation of Tibet Autonomous Region of China. Again, we are indebted to the Educational Opportunity Center for offering the resources of their Distance Learning Laboratory. Ms. Ga Ma and her interpreter, Dr. Mary Nimtz, were introduced to two grassroots movements initiated by women: the Uncrowned Queens Institute and the Buffalo Quarters Society as well as the programs and services offered by the EOC.

#### = HONORS AND AWARDS ====

Since its inception, the Uncrowned Queens website has received numerous citations from website experts who have evaluated our site and recognized it for its content, design, ease of navigation and innovation. This year was no exception. We received the following web awards: The Rose Awards - Silver Award - "rewards those web designers who are the best of the best". Uncrowned Queens received a Silver Rose Award because "your site provides the Internet community with a wonderful educational experience...your web site is well designed with excellent site content, a good navigational system, family-friendly content, and good choice in backgrounds/headings/colors/fonts..."; American Association of Webmasters - Silver Award : this award was "designed to supply formal recognition and acknowledge the hard work and dedication that has been put into constructing the website". The Association said that the Uncrowned Queens website was a "great site with nice graphics, layout, design and appearance. We are very impressed with the quality and content your website presents."

#### = THIRD ANNUAL CONFERENCE ======

Our third annual conference entitled, "Embracing African American Women of Power, Passion, and Purpose", was held November 7th - 8th. Local and national presenters and participants contributed to an exciting and educationally stimulating event. Eddie Faye Gates, a member of the Tulsa Race Riot Commission and author of several books on the Tulsa Race Riot of 1921 was our guest and key note speaker. In fact, we were pleased to have Mrs. Gates as a guest lecturer at the University at Buffalo on the 6th of November.

The Uncrowned Queens Institute has been selected by the Oklahoma Centennial Commission to replicate our project for that state's centennial in 2007. In honor of Mrs. Gates' work with the Tulsa Race Riot Commission and symbol of our connection to the people of Oklahoma, a scroll that listed all the names of the survivors/descendants of the Tulsa Race Riot was created for the conference. Conference participants were asked to sign the scroll, which will be sent to the Oklahoma Historical Society for permanent display in the African American Museum.

Workshop presenters included Bruce Fisher, Curator, African American Museum, Oklahoma Historical Society; Sharon Holley, Librarian and Coordinator of Urban Services for the Department of Extension Services at the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library; Kush K. Bhardway, Ph.D. candidate, Center for the Americas, University at Buffalo and instructor for the KIPP Sankofa Charter School; Jennifer Parker, President and Chief Executive Officer, the Black Capital Network, LLC, Inc.,; Sharon Barnes, Ph.D., Assistant Professor, Interdisciplinary and Special Programs, the University of Toledo; and Peggy Brooks-Bertram, Dr. P.H., Ph.D., co-founder of the Uncrowned Queens Institute.

The Uncrowned Queens Institute also honored several

individuals/organizations as "Culture Keepers", during the Conference. The "Culture Keepers" were cited for their outstanding contribution to the preservation and dissemination of local black history. Professor Jessie and Mrs. Hortense Nash; James and Carolyne Blount, Publishers, Editors, Owners of about...time Magazine; Dr. Juanita Pitts, M.D., of Rochester, New York and Mrs. Eddie Faye Gates of Tulsa, Oklahoma were this year's award recipients.

The success of a conference of this magnitude is due to the commitment, work and contributions (monetary as well as in-kind) of many. Our partnerships and collaborations with individuals, organizations, businesses, governmental agencies and community groups have truly lifted us higher. The Uncrowned Queens partnership with the State University of New York at Buffalo has been tremendous and we are especially appreciative of that important support. President Greiner has congratulated us on numerous occasions and commented on the publication of the Uncrowned Queens, volume 1. He states that, "Together with your tireless commitment to preserving our region's vibrant cultural heritage, this historical document promises to be a lasting legacy for future generations of leaders at UB and throughout Western New York."

#### FAMILY HISTORY WORKSHOP SERIES ======

This program is a full-year program that offers monthly workshops and other activities to a group of high school juniors and seniors. This year's intern group is comprised of 32 energetic and enthusiastic young men and women.

Barbara Nevergold arranged to conduct a series of family history workshops with the interns over a three month period. # ------ UNCROWNED QUEENS INSTITUTE ------

Another major milestone in the development and evolution of the Uncrowned Queens Project was reached this year. Uncrowned Queens was officially designated by the IRS as the Uncrowned Queens Institute for Research and Education on Women, Inc., a 501 c (3), non-profit organization. The mission of this organization is "to conduct research on the issues affecting women of color, to use this research to develop educational programs that will enhance the quality of life for women and their communities, to promote the collection and dissemination of the individual histories of women, women's organizations and women's collective history and to teach and educate women on the use of technology to preserve, and disseminate their histories."

Additionally, the work to replicate the Uncrowned Queens project in the State of Oklahoma continues. The historically black college Langston University agreed to host the Oklahoma Uncrowned Queens webpage. In October, Professor John Hope Franklin, Historian Laureate of the country and former Oklahoman, provided the bio-sketch and photo of his mother Mollie Lee Parker Franklin to contribute to the development of the webpage for Uncrowned Queens of Oklahoma. Independent scholars in Oklahoma including Bruce Fisher of the Oklahoma Historical Society, Mel Chatman formerly of Chandler, Oklahoma in Lincoln County and Jolyn Jackson of Sapulpa, Oklahoma have begun the work of identifying "Queens" for Oklahoma. We are deeply indebted to these individuals who "discovered" the Institute on line and continue to be ardent supporters. Their efforts are indispensable in replicating the project in Oklahoma.

===== ORAL HISTORY PROJECT RECEIVED FUNDING! =====

The Uncrowned Queens Institute and the University at Buffalo Archives' jointly proposed oral history project entitled: The Uncrowned Queens Oral Histories Collection and Website Project has been approved for funding. This project is one of several that have received support from the University's Educational Technology Center. The purpose of this project is to capture the oral histories of African American women, preserving the collection and making the interviews accessible from a dynamic web exhibition - the first online, audio/visual, digital techno-pedia of African American women's oral history.

Initially, we will focus on interviewing and preserving the oral histories of 5 African American women septuagenarians and octogenarians of Western New York. Secondly, the project will create a multi-media online exhibit accessible as links from both the University Archives (<u>http://ublib.buffalo.edu/libraries/units/archives</u>) website and the Uncrowned Queens webpage (<u>http://www.buffalo.edu/uncrownedqueens</u>). The website's components will include edited versions of the interviews, interactive study questions for educators and students, and a dynamic virtual guestbook feature where visitors to the exhibit can add a response to the exhibit. Dr. Peggy Brooks-Bertram and Dr. Barbara A. Seals Nevergold will conduct the interviews and oversee the project.

Intended outcomes of this collaboration include the beginning of a permanent, dynamic online exhibition focusing on the oral histories from African American women identified as Uncrowned Queens of Western New York. Importantly, the process of establishing a digital online oral history project has wide applicability and is intended to provide a prototype for future similar oral history projects in the UB community and of the regional oral histories of African American women across the country. The project will connect the University with broader audiences, particularly the University's African American community and enrich historical understanding in public memory by promoting historical research skills and services.

The project represents a continuing collaboration with the University Archives and forms new collaborations with the UB's Educational Technology Center, African American Studies, American Studies and the Educational Opportunity Center. The Uncrowned Queens Institute is pleased that this project also builds on an existing cultural and historical initiative which began in 1999 and which was an important element of the UB response to the 2001 celebration of the 1901 Pan American Exposition. The Uncrowned Queens Institute for Research and Education on Women, Inc. is the only continuing initiative of this county-wide centennial celebration and over the past 5 years has grown in statue both locally and nationally. The Institute's website is currently home to the biographical sketches and photos of more than 700 African American women from Buffalo and Western New York.

"These ten women embody the fulfillment of the 1848 conventioneer's vision of women's potential. Each of the inductees represents her own version of the American dream. None of their achievements would have been possible without the work of the brave women and men who convened the first women's rights convention. We are honored to share their stories of perseverance and accomplishment with the nation and the world," said the Hall's President, Clotilde Perez-Bode Dedecker.

Mary Burnett Talbert (1866 - 1923) Civil Rights activist and suffragist, Talbert was the first African-American high school principal in the state of Arkansas. Moving to Buffalo in 1891, she went on to lecture internationally on race relations and women's rights. In 1905, she helped found and organize the Niagara Movement, a forerunner of the

There is a month for everything! August is National Hair Loss Awareness Month. The American Academy of Dermatology states that this annual event is designed to increase public awareness about hair loss, the importance of early detection, and available treatment options. Hereditary hair loss, the most common form of hair loss, affects nearly 50 million men and 30 million women in the United States according to the National Hair Journal.

Hair loss is considered a beauty taboo. Confronting the stigma of hair loss poses considerable psychological and emotional challenges for both men and women. For every five men with hereditary hair loss, three women experience the same condition. Yet women's hair thinning remains a "taboo" subject for the media, the public and patients. Did you know that over 20 million women in the United States are suffering from some type of hair loss? About 40% of them are also under forty years old. The emotional aspects of hair loss range from anxiety, depression, frustration and poor self-esteem. Fortunately there are more options available now to help slow down and even reverse hair loss. Given the wide range of problems caused by hair loss, it can be said that one's spirit is a one of many casualties of hair loss no matter the cause. Excess hair loss can have many different causes Unfortunately, treating and diagnosing female hair loss is not as simple and straightforward as male pattern baldness. Many physicians subscribe to the theory that women should immediately begin a regimen of growth stimulants (whether it is Rogaine for Women or others). Like men's hair loss however, there are underlying causes, and the good news is that a large percent of women's hair loss is completely reversible. The general idea behind diagnosing and treating it involves a responsible informed physician and a series of tests to rule out, or rule in, the causes. Hair loss is especially difficult for women because hair has been called our "crowning glory," and society has placed a great deal of social and cultural importance on hair and hairstyles. Unfortunately, many conditions, diseases, and improper hair care result in excessive hair loss. People, who notice their hair shedding in large amounts after combing or brushing, or whose hair becomes thinner or falls out, should consult a dermatologist. === UQ INSTITUTE AND FOUNDERS ARE RECOGNIZED IN UB ARCHIVES ON-LINE EXHIBIT ===

The University at Buffalo Archives launched an on-line exhibit, entitled "Women's Work: A Tribute to the Women who make UB work" on September 28, 2004. The exhibit features the biographies and photos of 80 women who have been connected to the University in faculty or staff positions, and in many instances as alumnae. Archivists Jessica Tanny and Karen Walton Morse, who are responsible for the exhibit, introduce the exhibit with the following statement: "Women have been an important part of UB's history from its very beginnings. The University's first alumna graduated in 1876. The University hired its first female staff member in 1888 and its first female faculty members seven years later. As such, women have been, and continue to be, an important part of the life and legacy of this University.

This small exhibition focuses on the achievements that women faculty, staff, and administration have made and their contributions to the University at Buffalo over the past 100 years. Because women have been so involved in the University it would have been impossible to have an all-inclusive exhibit. We have chosen to feature the biographies of approximately 80 women, past and present, who through their own achievements will represent hundreds of their colleagues.

There have been a multitude of women over the years who through many different capacities have made the University work. From administrative assistants to nationally recognized scientists doing cutting-edge research, each woman who has worked at UB, whether specifically highlighted or not, has made a contribution to the University."

In addition to the Uncrowned Queens Institute and its founders, the exhibit includes 11 African-American women, most of whom are Uncrowned Queens. The exhibit links the biographies of these women to their biographies on the Uncrowned Queens website.

An estimated 2.3 million Americans have bipolar disorder, also called manicdepressive illness. A person with bipolar disorder can go from feeling very, very high (called *mania*) to feeling very, very low (depression). With proper treatment, people can control these mood swings and lead fulfilling lives. While the rate of bipolar disorder is the same among African Americans as it is among other Americans, African Americans are less likely to receive a diagnosis and, therefore, treatment for this illness.

Most African Americans with bipolar disorder are going undiagnosed and untreated.

## Several factors have contributed to African Americans not receiving help for bipolar disorder and other mental illnesses. Some of the reasons are:

== A mistrust of health professionals, based in part on historically higherthan-average institutionalization of African Americans with mental illness; and on previous mistreatments, like such tragic events as the Tuskegee syphilis study.

== Cultural barriers between many doctors and their patients.

== Reliance on family and religious community, rather than mental health professionals, during times of emotional distress.

== A tendency to talk about physical problems, rather than discuss mental symptoms, or to mask symptoms with substance abuse or other medical conditions.

== Socioeconomic factors which can limit access to medical and mental health care. About 25 percent of African Americans do not have health insurance.

== Continued misunderstanding and stigma about mental illness.

#### Signs of bipolar disorder

Bipolar disorder often starts in the teen years, but can emerge in later life. It is a potentially life-threatening illness that a person cannot handle alone. Tragically, one of five people with bipolar disorder commits suicide. The signs of bipolar disorder include:

#### Mania

- == Excessive energy, restlessness, racing thoughts and rapid talking
- == Denial that anything is wrong; Increased sex drive
- == Extremely happy feelings; Paranoia; Substance abuse
- == Easily irritated; Aggressive behavior
- == Needing little sleep; Unrealistic belief in one's ability
- == Poor judgment; Sustained, unusual behavior

#### Depression

- == Poor appetite or eating too much; Nervousness and worry
- == Trouble sleeping or sleeping too much
- == Loss of interest in and withdrawal from usual activities
- == Feelings of sadness that don't go away;
- == Irritability or restlessness; Lack of energy
- == Feelings of sadness, worthlessness or guilt;
- == Inability to think or concentrate; Repeated thoughts of death or suicide;

Chronic pain or other physical problems that don't respond to treatment

== Increased risk-taking behavior, including reckless driving or substance abuse

No one knows for certain what causes bipolar disorder. But its causes may include:

== Brain chemistry - There are chemical changes or imbalances in the brain during both extremes of behavior (mania and depression).

== Genetics - Close relatives of people with bipolar disorder are 10 to 20 times more likely to get depression or bipolar disorder than other people.

== Drug and alcohol abuse - More than half of the people diagnosed with bipolar disorder have histories of substance abuse. In some cases, substance abuse precedes the development of the problem; in others, alcohol or other drugs may be used as a form of self-medication.

== Stressful or disturbing events - Both can cause mood swings

#### Bipolar disorder can be treated.

== There is hope. People with bipolar disorder can be helped by treatment. Treatment can include:

== Medication - The doctor may recommend one or more medicines to find what works best.

== Counseling - Often, psychotherapy or other forms of counseling are used in combination with medication.

== Peer Support - The advice and support of others who have bipolar disorder can aid recovery.

== Complementary Care - Some people benefit from exercise, stress reduction classes and other activities to complement their treatment and help them manage their illness.

== ECT, or electroconvulsive therapy - This is used as a last resort to treat severe bouts of depression and suicidal thoughts. It's only considered when medication and therapy haven't worked.

# **Buffalo Soldiers: Lest We Forget to Honor our Veterans**

African Americans have served honorably and courageously in every American war. Theirs is a history of nobility in the face of American prejudice, and courage in the face of America's enemies.

ow do you celebrate Veterans Day? Shop-ping at the mall? Vacationing? Catching up on homework, housework, the newspaper, the latest bestseller or resting? Or perhaps you had to work that day? In the not-too-distant-past, it was a day to remember and honor the veterans of our country. Now, somehow we are too busy doing other things. -It's Time To Celebrate-

For Veterans Day 2004, take a veteran to lunch or supper. Better yet, involve the entire family and plan a Veterans Family Day Supper, asking for covered dishes to feed the crowd. Surely everyone has a relative or knows someone who served in a branch of the service, because the draft was an inescapable part of life at one time.

#### -Sharing Their Stories-

Be aware when you ask the former (or current) serviceman or woman to join you in celebrating the day, they might be surprised, but I assure you, they'll be pleased. When offering the invitation, ask the veteran to consider sharing memories of times spent in the military. If it's a close relative (father, brother, grandfather, favorite uncle or cousin) remind them that their story will expand and complement the family history as well as provide a legacy to the younger generation. A friend recalled how much she enjoyed reading the stories of her father-in-law's World War II experiences, thinking, "What a wonderful gift to us.

This may be the first time these stories have been discussed with anyone, evoking strong and sometimes hurtful memories. And do not be surprised if your request is met with a smile and a polite, "Not now, maybe later," or "I'd rather not talk about those days, thank you." Respect these wishes and enjoy the day. Perhaps the memories are too painful to recall.

Our older veterans are a shrinking group and we need to record their stories to set the historical record straight. Sharing their experiences is a chance for them to describe in their own words, feelings about institutional racism of the past, and how they dealt with it.

Many veterans felt the military did not take advantage of their abilities and all too often, this was true. It was representative of the times when African Ameri-

cans were thought to Then: Mr. Bell, top, and be incapable of higher level thinking and performance, a problem we still confront today in many situations. -Recalling Past **Generations-**

Albert Bell, an 82 year old WWII veteran can certainly speak to that issue. Inducted in 1942, he was trained at Lt Leonard Wood, Missouri as a combat engineer. But after six months in a Field Artillery Battalion learning to fire the 155mm Howitzer, his group was pulled out and sent to New Orleans where they were assigned to a

Port Battalion, loading and unloading cargo onto ships. Six months later he was transferred to Station Island, N.Y., where they loaded vessels heading for combat zones in the European theater of war. His unit was segregated and discrimination off-base was the order of the day.

Mr. Bell served overseas from 1944-46 in England and France, hitting the Normandy Beachhead on D-Day plus 21. At one time he loaded trucks that traveled the Red Ball Express, with Black drivers who risked life and limb transporting supplies to the front lines.

Following his discharge in January 1946, Mr. Bell returned to the United States.

John Henderson Jr., a veteran of the Korean War, was drafted into the Army, November, 1952. He received reconnaissance training in a Tank Battalion at Fort Knox, KY., and assigned to a special unit whose members examined and rated equipment for combat readiness, prior to purchase by the military. He field-tested jeeps, tanks, half-tracks, ducks (amphibious troop car-

riers), etc., in Arizona and Alaska. In this instance, his training and subsequent assignment were commensurate with his talents and abilities.

Prior to that time, President Truman had in 1948 issued Executive Order number 9981, Desegregation of Armed Forces. Mr. Henderson's battalion was racially integrated, and off-base, he recalled encountering minimal discrimination. Nevertheless, despite the Executive Order, enforcement was spotty at best, and often depended upon the base commander.

Mr. Henderson does recall an incident when Afri-

can American servicemen were asked to sit in the back of the local bus transporting personnel from the base into town. The men spoke to their commanding officer who assured the bus company that if the practice wasn't discontinued immediately, the military would substitute their own buses to service the base. The practice ceased forthwith!

Upon discharge from the Army, Mr. Henderson joined the US Army Reserve.

Leon Kelly, Jr. was a career veteran who traveled the world while serving in the Marine Corps, the Navy and the National Guard. At age 17, he enlisted in the Marine Crops, Third Marine Division, receiving training in amphibious assault. He later served two tours of duty in the Navy assigned to Special Services on the USS Sierra AD-18, and the USS Brumby DE-1044. Upon discharge from the Navy in 1975, he joined the National Guard in New Jersey, transferring to Buffalo, N.Y. and was assigned to the 27th Armored Division at the Masten Avenue Armory. He retired in 1979.

Mr. Kelly enjoyed his long service in the military, but encountered racial discrimination throughout his career, primarily in the United States. He recalls an incident in Quantico, VA., when he was asked to sit in the back of the bus, but the three White Marine recruits with him

from Jamestown, N.Y., said they'd sit back in the rear with him. When the bus driver refused, all four young Marines exited the bus together. Mr. Kelly remembers this incident so vividly because it was shortly after arriving at the base. He said "It opened my eyes to the differences between the north and the south at the time.' Mr. Kelly was fortunate to have



# The Black Soldier: A Portrait in **Bravery and Sacrifice**

rom enslaved Africans in the Revolutionary War, to Colin Powell as the top military man of Desert Storm, African Americans have served honorably and courageously in every American war. Theirs is a history of nobility in the face of American prejudice, and courage in the face of America's enemies. We salute them on this Veteran's Day. Following is a brief history

of the sacrifice of America's Black soldiers: \* Crispus Attucks, the son

in the streets of Boston on March 5, 1770 (Africans in America were still enslaved). When the British opened fire, Attucks, along with four others, was killed. He and his companions became the first popular martyrs of the American Revolution.

\*During the Revolutionary War, some 5,000 Blacks served under George Washington. By 1779, as many as one in seven members of Washington's army were Black. According to historian Thomas Fleming, the Continental Line was "more integrated than any American force except the armies that fought in the Vietnam

\*West Point cadet Charles Young, class 1889, was the third Black graduate of the U.S. Military Academy. A hero of the Philippines and Mexico and a legendary Buffalo Soldier, Young hoped to lead Black troops in World War I but was instead retired as a full colonel because the military could not accept even the thought of a Black general.

\* Lǐ e u t e n a n t Benjamin O. Davis of the U.S. Army Calvary in 1907, became the Army's first Black general. He was the father of Benjamin O. Davis Jr. who led America's first Black fighter pilots in the Second World War.

\*Eugene Bullard – boxer, acrobat, aviator and spy, was a hero of the French Foreign Legion, the French army, and the French air corps. Decorated in two world wars, by the time he received the French Legion of Honor in recognition of his heroism, he was back home in America, working as an elevator man.

\*The Spanish Civil War was the first war in which White Americans fought under Black commanders.

<sup>\*</sup>During the Spanish-American War, Theodore Roosevelt and his "heroic" Rough Riders were saved from humiliation and defeat by the Black Ninth and Tenth Calvaries.

\*World War I veterans fought for and came home to the most racist American political regime since before the Civil War. Within four months of Harlem's heroic 369<sup>th</sup> Regiment's triumphal Fifth Avenue parade, there were race wars in the streets of America. The summer of 1919 was known among Blacks as Red Summer – "Red" for blood. Seventy-eight Blacks were lynched (on record) in 1919: ten were veterans, several of whom were lynched in uniform. By the end of the year, there had been race riots in 28 cities, North and South. Blacks were fighting back

back. \*The first American hero of World War II was Black. Dorie Miller was a messman on the burning deck of the U.S.S. West Virginia at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. A shy 22-year-old son of a Texas sharecropper, he carried the ship's mortally wounded captain to safety, then manned an antiaircraft gun to bring down what witnesses said were four Japanese planes. Miller had never been taught to fire the antiaircraft gun; it was against Navy regulations for Blacks to do so. Only when the ammunition

was exhausted and the Arizona was sinking beneath him did he abandon ship. It took three months for his heroism to be officially recognized. Miller became the first Black to win the Navy Cross.

\*The 332<sup>nd</sup> Fighter Group, led by Colonel Benjamin O. Davis Jr., was America's first Black fighter pilots. The 332<sup>nd</sup> flew more combat missions than any other unit in Europe during World War II. In 200 missions they never lost a single bomber.

\*Captain Roscoe C. Brown, Jr., in March 1945, was one of the first Americans to shoot down a German jet. Film of Brown's jet encounter was used by the War Department as combat training for

new pilots. \*The Marines was the last branch of military service to open its ranks to Black volunteers, the first which joined in 1944. U.S.

U.S military remained rigidly segregated throughout World War II, but the Battle of the Bulge saw a brief racial experiment when Black platoons fought the crucial stages of the Battle among eleven combat divisions. When the Battle of the Bulge was over, the Blacks were returned to their segregated

units. \*On August 6, 1950, Private First Class William Thompson became the first GI to win the Medal of Honor in Korea and the first Black to win the medal since the Spanish-American War. His medal was awarded posthumously because his commander at first refused to

submit the recommendation. \*Colonel Fred V. Cherry's portrait hangs in the Pentagon. A pilot who was shot down over North Vietnam in October 1965, Cherry became the first Black American prisoner of war. He spent eight years as a POW.

\*The Gulf War, with the ascendancy of General Colin Powell as the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, marked the historical zenith of the Black American military experience. Blacks, about 12 percent of the U.S. population, made up 20 percent of the total U.S. troops in the Gulf; some 30 percent of the Army, 22 percent of the Navy, 17 percent of the frontline Marines, and 13 percent of the Air Force. -Additional Military History


Facts-\*Bambaata (1865-1906), a courageous Zulu leader, tried to rid Southern Africa of European settlers. His "rebellion" lasted nine months (July 1905-April 1906) ending in his death.

\*Shaka Zulu of South Africa (1786-1828) was one of the finest warriors and generals in history.

\*Ann Nzinga (1582-1663) fought and defeated the Portuguese slavers for more than 18 years in what is today Angola. She commanded a woman army of fierce warriors.

# Sam Feaster: VA Specialist Helps Local Vets

Sam Feaster can speak from experience when he talks to veterans about their VA benefits. Feaster was 18 years old when he joined the Marine Corps, the beginning of his 23 year Federal service. In the Marines he took part in NATO operations throughout Europe. His VA career has been spent as a Patient Services Assistant in the admissions office where he has assisted thousands of area veterans who seek health care from the VA.

Feaster provides eligibility information to veterans, explaining the process that can enroll them in the largest health care system in the nation, the one that has been chosen by over 40,000 veterans here in Western New York. "Veterans who use the VA feel comfortable here because we have so many veterans on the staff. They like the care they receive and they know the excellent prescription benefits can't be matched anywhere," he said.

An enthusiastic spokesman for VA Healthcare, Feaster has taken part in VA outreach at many local events such as the Juneteenth Festival, Erie County Fair, Broadway Market Health Fair, area churches and veteran's posts. The personal contact he provides is welcomed by veterans in completing the paperwork involved in obtaining VA services. He is a member of the VA's Minority Veterans Committee which works to eliminate barriers to VA health care access. He is a member of several veterans' organizations, including the AMVETS and the Vietnam Veterans of America.

Feaster can be reached at the VA at 862-8894 or for assistance in enrolling for VA care. He is available to speak to groups on VA eligibility.

"I want to clear up misinformation about the VA and tell veterans about the respect and compassion veterans will find here," he stated.

WELCOME TO THE DECEMBER 2004 EDITION OF THE UNCROWNED QUEENS INSTITUTE FOR RESEARCH AND EDUCATION ON WOMEN, INC. NEWSLETTER. The purpose of this newsletter is to provide our e-mail users with the most current information pertaining to Uncrowned Queens' activities and events.

===== UNCROWNED QUEENS ORAL HISTORY PROJECT: IT'S A WRAP! =====

Drusilla Dunjee Houston, after whom this web site is named, would often describe her meetings with outstanding women and men in Oklahoma as engaging in "mountainstepping." Indeed, meeting with and recording the oral histories of UQ octogenarians and septuagenarians was truly "mountain stepping." On November 3<sup>rd</sup>, Barbara and I began meeting with women selected for the UQ digital oral history project. The purpose of this project is to capture the oral histories of African American women, in their 70's and 80's, preserving the collection and making the interviews accessible from a dynamic web exhibition - the first online, audio/visual, digital techno-pedia.

The project began with the interview of Uncrowned Queens Gwendolyn Greene followed by Eva Noles, Thelma Ayers Hardiman, Garnet Hicks Wallace, and Georgia Burnette. The initial goal is to collect and preserve the oral histories of 5-10 Uncrowned Queens who are septuagenarians and octogenarians. Secondly, the project will create a multi-media online exhibit accessible as links from both the University Archives\_<<u>http://ublib.buffalo.edu/libraries/units/archives></u> website and the Uncrowned Queens web page. The website's components will include edited versions of the interviews, interactive study questions for educators and students, and a dynamic virtual guest book feature where visitors to the exhibit can add a response to the exhibit.

These oral history interviews are the beginning of a permanent, dynamic online exhibition focusing on the oral histories from African American women identified as Uncrowned Queens of Western New York. This project connects the University with far broader audiences because as a digital online oral history project it has wide applicability and will provide a prototype for future similar oral history projects. It will also enrich historical understanding in public memory by promoting historical skills and services.

We were privileged to be able to conduct the interviews in the homes of the "Queens." Here they took the opportunity to make available any and all documents, photos and other materials that they wanted to share. We were not disappointed. First, we were most impressed with the willingness of the "queens" to share personal and professional information about themselves and their families. Personal attributes of the "queens" were also both impressive and illuminating. Each had a vivid memory of events and the detail of the events was extraordinary. They talked about the obstacles in their lives and how they overcame them. It was curious to see that little was made of the obstacles as they focused more on their triumphs over obstacles. They encountered many problems and one of the most frequently referred to social problem was racism. It was interesting to see that each individual experienced racism differently. Consistent with the data in Vol. II of <u>Uncrowned Queens, African American Women</u> <u>Community Builders of Western New York</u>, Uncrowned Queens have a long and rich history of Church involvement. This is matched only by their involvement in Black women's social clubs and organizations. All share a deep appreciation and love of higher education. Each has a long record of community activism and love for the African American community.

This is only the beginning of our journey into the oral memoirs of these extraordinary women. In our next update on this project, we will share with you some of the names, places and organizations remembered by these extraordinary women. Perhaps you will remember them also.

# == UNCROWNED QUEENS TO COMMEMORATE THE NIAGARA MOVEMENT CENTENNIAL ==

Next year, 2005, is a very significant year for the entire Buffalo and Western New York community. It is the centennial of the Niagara Movement. As a bit of background, the Niagara Movement, albeit short-lived, was an organization founded by a group of African American leaders that included W.E.B. DuBois, John Hope, and Monroe Trotter. It is believed that local Buffalo residents Mary B. Talbert, her husband W.H. Talbert and the Rev J. Edward Nash were also involved in the founding meetings, and at least one of these meetings was held at 521 Michigan Avenue, site of Mr. & Mrs. Talbert's home. The Talbert home was located next door to the Michigan Street Baptist Church, pastored by Rev. J. Edward Nash. Held from July 11-14, 1905, the Niagara Movement, named for the mighty Falls, because of the plan to "unleash a mighty current" of protest laid the groundwork of the modern civil rights movement and is recognized as the fore-runner of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

The Uncrowned Queens Institute is planning several activities to commemorate the Niagara Movement Centennial. In fact, we are advising you now to reserve the dates, October 7-8, 2005. Induction ceremonies will be held that weekend for Mary B. Talbert and nine other women into the National Women's Hall of Fame. The Institute will organize a bus trip to Seneca Falls for the induction services. Additional information will be available in the next few months.

The Uncrowned Queens Institute is partnering with the Studio Arena Theatre, Tops Markets, County Legislator Demone Smith, the Convention & Visitor's Bureau, the Mary B. Open to the public, the Niagara Movement Centennial Kick-off will be held at the Theatre, 710 Main Street, from 1:00 - 3:00pm. All of the community/civic organizations that have plans for events during the centennial year have been invited to attend the Kick-off and bring literature, etc. to publicize their events.

We have also been working with Studio Arena Theatre to capitalize on the production of the play, "CROWNS", a gospel musical based on the importance of hats in the religious lives of African American women. The UQ Institute has identified 16 African American women leaders whose photos will be exhibited at the Theatre throughout the production. The Uncrowned Queens Institute and Studio Arena will unveil this exhibit during the Centennial Kick-off. This display lends a personal/contemporary face to the Centennial events and underscores the continuing role that African American women play in their churches and in the life of their community.

# County of Erie Executive Chamber Proclamation

- *WHEREAS,* Dr. W.E.B. DuBois, the first African-American to earn a doctorate from Harvard University, author of the <u>Souls of Black Folk</u>, and sociologist who proclaimed the race problem as the "greatest problem of the 20<sup>th</sup> century", called for a national meeting of Black leaders to be held in Buffalo, New York and Fort Erie, Ontario from July 11 to July 14, 1905; and
- *WHEREAS,* this meeting attended by 29 men, including DuBois, William Monroe Trotter, John Hope and others came to be known as the Niagara Movement, named for the Falls because the leaders wanted to unleash a "mighty torrent of protest"; and
- WHEREAS, the members of the Niagara Movement met at the home of William H. and Mary B. Talbert at 521 Michigan Avenue and at the Erie Beach Hotel and developed a manifesto calling for full civil liberties, abolition of racial discrimination, and recognition of human brotherhood; and
- *WHEREAS,* the Niagara Movement, in its brief five-year history established 30 branches and achieved several civil-rights victories at the local level, despite its organizational weakness and lack of funds; and
- *WHEREAS,* the Niagara Movement is recognized as the first significant black organized protest movement of the twentieth century and is credited with clearing the way and chartering a course for the establishment of the NAACP in 1909
- *WHEREAS,* the Centennial of the Niagara Movement funding will be commemorated during 2005 by a bi-national collaboration resulting in numerous organizational observances and programs in Western New York and Canada;

I would like to take this opportunity to commend the Uncrowned Queens Institute and its many community partners in memorializing the Centennial of the Niagara Movement. I regret that prior commitments prevent me from joining you in person. I am, however, with you in spirit.

In 1905, an organization of black intellectuals led by W.E.B. Dubois, John Hope, Monroe Trotter and 27 others, met secretly in the home of Mary B. Talbert, a prominent member of Buffalo's Michigan Street Baptist Church. The organization sent forth a clarion call for full political, civil, and social rights for Black Americans. This development, known as the Niagara Movement, is recognized as the first significant Black organized protest movement of the twentieth century and was the precursor of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, which is nationally recognized today as the NAACP.

It is indeed significant for Buffalo, New York to be distinguished as the home of the Niagara Movement. Today it is vitally important for each of us to pause and remember our roots, and to respect the heritage of others; for it is the grand diversity of this country that makes the American spirit unique.



# Studio Arena production gives boost to Niagara Movement's July convention

Going strictly by the calendar, the centennial of the Niagara Movement's historic convention isn't until July.

But events commemorating the forerunner of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People begin Saturday in Studio Arena Theatre. From 1 to 3 p.m., the public can learn about the plans of myriad

groups that intend to observe the centennial throughout the year.

Studio Arena is presenting the gospel musical "Crowns," which celebrates the tradition of hats worn to church by African-American women.

Before opening night Jan. 7, the theater is unveiling a photo exhibit developed with the Uncrowned Queens Institute of Research and Education on Women that features several members of the organization wearing their "crowns."

"Our idea was to reflect the diversity of ways in which these women have contributed to the community at large and the African-American community," said Barbara Seals Nevergold, co-founder of the institute. "We all wear different hats at different times."

Uncrowned Queens Institute honors black women in Western New York who have made significant contributions to the community, dating to the Pan American Exposition of 1901.

The exhibit will remain at the theater throughout the play's run, which ends Jan. 30. It also will be featured in Tops Markets around the region during February - Black History Month - and in Canada in March.

"While this is a fun thing, the idea is not to lose sight of the historic event," Nevergold said.

It was July 1905 in Fort Erie, Ont., that dozens of black intellectuals, writers and activists met for three days, laying the foundation of the civil rights movement of the 20th century and the NAACP, which was formed several years later.

At least one preliminary meeting was held in the Michigan Avenue home of Mary B. Talbert.

## Studio Arena production gives boost to Niagara Movement's July convention

In recognition of her role in the Niagara Movement and other achievements, Talbert is among 10 women who will be inducted this fall in the National Women's Hall of Fame.

Several local organizations are planning events to commemorate the Niagara Movement's centennial, and a national group - the Association for the Study of African American Life and History - is holding its 90th annual convention here in October.

The Buffalo Niagara Convention & Visitors Bureau is spreading the word.

"The response to the CVB's recently published African-American Heritage Guide demonstrated a high level of visitor interest in events celebrating this community's history," said Richard Geiger, its president.

"We're pleased to be able to build on that interest by promoting a variety of community events scheduled to commemorate the Niagara Movement throughout 2005."

Also Saturday at Studio Arena Theatre, the Uncrowned Queens will present its 2005 Culture Keeper Award to Lillion Batchelor, founder and president of the Buffalo Quarters Historical Society, and Wilma Morrison, founder of the Niagara Black Historical Society and the Norval Johnson Heritage Library in Niagara Falls, Ont.
