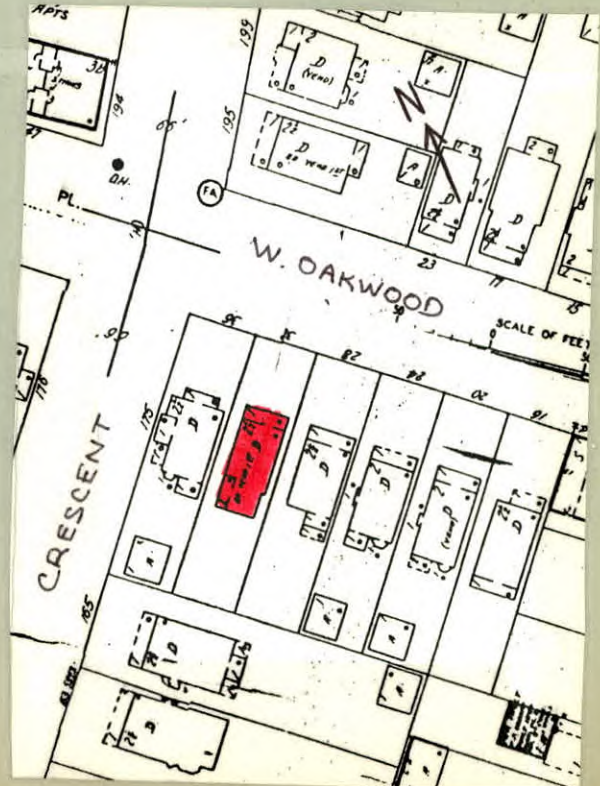

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located four blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story brick and frame Dutch Colonial Revival style. Steep pitched side gambrel roof. Cornice end returns. Full-width flat roof enclosed porch. Rough cut, regular course stone base. Aluminum glass paneled door flanked by 3/4 three-light sidelights. End bays have 12-light windows. Paneled apron. Doric pilaster strips flank bays and entrance. Curved brackets over pilasters support roof

SIGNIFICANCE

19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: c. 1910
 ARCHITECT: double hung 1/1 windows. Louvred window shutters. Band of trim below roof eave. Two pedimented gable dormers.
 BUILDER: Double-hung 1/1 windows in each dormer.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A fine example of vernacular form of Dutch Colonial Revival style residence with exaggerated pedimented dormers. West Oakwood Place extends from Main Street to Parkside Avenue. At the northern border of the first section of the subdivision to be developed, the eastern portion of West Oakwood was deeded to the city by Jacob Davis in 1887 and the remainder by Caroline Jewett in 1888. West Oakwood closely resembles a street found in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." While it does not connect with Jewett Avenue at the park entrance as Olmsted originally planned, it remains curvilinear and as a cross street provides easy access to the main thoroughfares and the park.
