

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): Two and a half story Tudor style. Front-facing gable roof. Bargeboard with tapered ends. Partial width gabled porch. Bargeboard with tapered ends. Rough-cut, regular course stone base. Tapered square Doric supports. Spindle balustrade. Decorative half-timbering in gable. Aluminum door flanked on SIGNIFICANCE one side by double-hung 6/1 window. Right bay has 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: C. 1907 two 6/1 windows. Decorative half-timbering on second

ARCHITECT:	floor and gable. Second
	floor has two three-part windows, double hung 4/1
BUILDER:	lights. Gable window; three part 4/1 lights each.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A Tudor style influenced by the Craftsman style. West Oakwood Place extends from Main Street to Parkside Avenue. At the northern border of the first section of the subdivision to be developed, the eastern portion of West Oakwood was deeded to the city by Jacob Davis in 1887 and the remainder by Caroline Jewett in 1888. West Oakwood closely resembles a street found in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." While it does not connect with Jewett Avenue at the park entrance as Olmsted originally planned, it remains curvilinear and as a cross street provides easy access to the main thoroughfares and the park.
