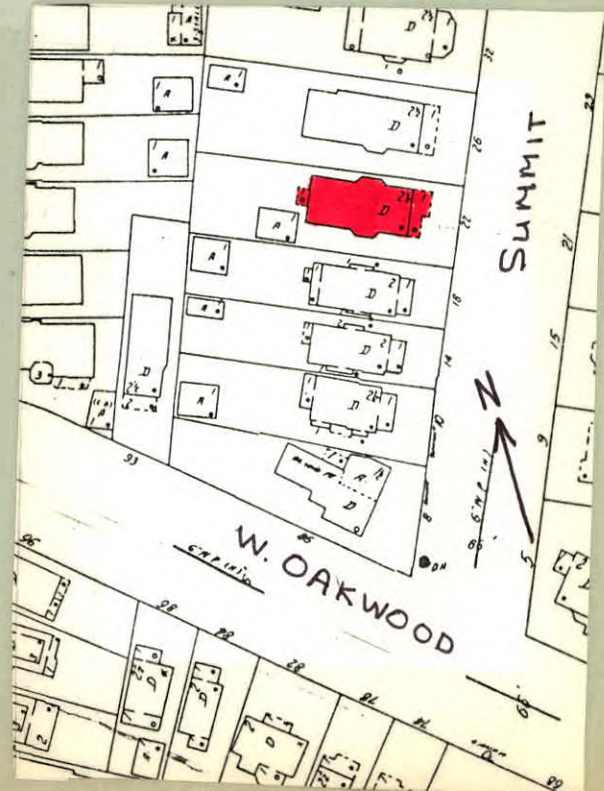

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):
 Two and a half story Colonial Revival style. Front facing gable roof. Full-width flat roof porch. Paired fluted Doric columns support entablature. Stick balustrade. Pair of three-light wood doors. First floor single-light window with transom. Second floor semi-hexagonal bay with 1/1 windows. Pair of 1/1 windows.

SIGNIFICANCE Entablature window surrounds. End paneled Doric pilaster strips. Pedimented gable, shingled, has paired end brackets under projection. 1/1 window with broken pediment window head in low relief. Vine motif decorates. Entablature flanks pediment with brackets under cornice.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:
 A good example of Colonial Revival style residence with stylized Classical details applied. Summit Avenue is a truncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
