17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story frame with front facing gable roof. Fullwidth flat roof porch. Rough cut, regular course stone base. Doric columns support entablature with dentils. Extending cornice. Spindle balustrade. Glass paneled door with 3/4 length leaded glass sidelights. Bowed first floor bay. Single-hung windows SIGNIFICANCE with leaded top lights. Second floor left side boxed 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1909 bay has two-light porch

door. Right side bowed ARCHITECT: bay has single-hung windows with leaded top lights. Band of trim below gable eave. Pedimented gable BUILDER: has tri-part window. Center 1/1 window flanked by smaller 1/1 windows.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A frame gabled residence with Colonial Revival styling. Florence Avenue extends from Main Street to Parkside Avenue, paralleling Robie Street. Located within the first section of the Parkside subdivision to be developed, Florence Avenue was deeded to the city by Jacob Davis in 1887. Although Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside" show a street angling from the intersection of Main and Humboldt to Parkside Avenue, when it was finally developed Florence Avenue was modified to parallel Humboldt Avenue. It nevertheless still followed Olmsted's rule that a subdivision street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
