

Summit Avenue is a uncated north-south street, located between Woodward and Crescent enues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern ction of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of vett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The rkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except to the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was eded in 1892.
