She was appointed by Gov.

Nelson Rockefeller to the state Social Welfare Board.

Mrs. Reid was a member and parliamentarian of the Buffalo Club National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's Club. She was a volunteer for the Community Action Organization and a member of its board of directors. She also promoted the grandmother program and pushed for observance of the week of the young child.

Mrs. Reid served on the advisory committee for the DART program on drug addiction and promoted three state halfway houses for delinquent youths.

Mrs. Reid was given the president's award for 20 years of service to Community Action and the National Sojourner Truth Meritorious Service Award from the National Association for Negro Business and Professional Women's Club. She received a recognition award as a member of the Salvation Army Advisory Board.

An avid bowler and excellent golfer, Mrs. Reid played at city and county golf courses for many years.

She lived on South Division Street for 30 years before her home was destroyed in a propane explosion in 1983.



# Joseph Leon 'Scotty' Scott Dies; Jazz Player Was Ellington Student

A Mass of Christian Burial for jazz musician Joseph Leon "Scotty" Scott, whose musical career spanned more than half a century,



will be offered at 11 a.m. Thursday in St. Benedict the Moor Catholic Church, E. Utica and Welker streets. He died Saturday (May 21, 1988) in Deacons Nursing Home.

Scott, 88, was born in Washing-

ton, D.C. and was a neighbor of Duke Ellington, who gave him his first piano lessons.

Scott went into vaudeville as pianist and tap dancer. Glaucoma eventually sidelined him from dance but "Scotty" continued to play. He was booked with the Theatre Owners Booking Association

(TOBA), known to many black musicians as "Tough on Black Artaists", which hired primarily black performers. The agency is famous for the old minstrel traditions of singing spiritual and ragtime songs between major vaudeville acts.

Scott performed with such acts as The Step Brothers and The Mills Brothers. He also performed at the Cotton Club with such legends as Josephine Baker and Lena Horne.

He belonged to Buffalo's Colored Musicians Club and played at the Federal Gardens on Genessee Street and various other clubs throughout the area during the 1940s and 50s. He was also a member of the Blind Association.

He is survived by two daughters, Patricia Lewis and Brenda McCall, and a son, Joseph Leon Scott Jr. of Los Angeles, nine grandchildren, and one great-grandchild.

past co-chairman of the Buffalo Chapter of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, she was presented with the group's Brotherhood Award in 1979, which cited her as a "mother to all children of

Buffalo." Mrs. Scruggs, who started work with the Buffalo Recreation Department as an instruc-tor in 1948, had been physical education instructor at St. Mary's Parochial School and a group worker in the Westminster Community House.

LATER, SHE became super-visor for field trainees from three local colleges and was named the first director of the John F. Kennedy Recreation Center, a post she retired from in 1967 after nearly 20 years.

Much of Mrs. Scruggs' volunteer work centered around her church, St. Philip's. After her retirement from the city payroll, she became the director of the St. Philip's Church Com-munity Center, a position she held until 1974.

Involved with the church since 1950, Mrs. Scruggs was the first woman elected to the vestry and served in many capacities in several church

organizations.

and activities, including: the Citizen's Advisory Committee of the Board of Education; a consultant on human relations for the Buffalo and Kenmore-Town of Tonawanda schools: the Council of Churches of Buffalo and Erie County; the United Way; Travelers Aid, 4-H of Erie County, the services committee of Veterans Hospital; board of Westminister Community House; the Board of Finance Committee of St. Augustine's Center and the Office of the Aging.

SHE ALSO was a member of Paramount Chapter 57, Order of Eastern Star; a founding member and past president of Iota Phi Lambda Sorority; past secretary of the local Pan Hel-lenic Council; and a member of the Bison Assembly 48; Order of the Golden Circle.

She was the recipient of numerous other awards and had been named a distinguished citizen by The Buffalo Evening

Last February more than 2,000 members of the 32nd annual Joint Legislative Mobilization of the Black and Puerto Rican Caucus and the state chapter of the NAACP honored Mrs. Scruggs with their Community Service Award.

Mrs. Scruggs had played an active role in local politics since her arrival in Buffalo in 1938. She once nominated fromer Gov. Thomas E. Dewey at a state convention and served as a Republican committee-

man in the 5th Ward.

MRS. SCRUGGS was born in Winfall, Va., in 1906 and was educated at St. Paul's College in Lawrenceville, Va. She came to Niagara Falls in 1930 and married the late Leonard A. Scruggs Sr., a mortician, in 1932.

She worked at the College Croft Nursery School in Niagara Falls before coming to Buffalo.

## Russell N. Service, black Republican leader

Russell N. Service, 78, a longime Buffalo resident who became known as the dean of Long Isand's black politicians, was bur-

ied last month after services in Hempstead, L.I.

Service died Dec. 22, 1991, in Mercy Hospital. Rockville Centre.

Service, who came to Buffalo with his family in 1926 and was reared and educat-

ed here, was the first African-American elected to public office in Nassau County and for years served as its highest ranking black official.

Born in Boston, Mass., he attended Hutchinson Technical School and graduated from the University of Buffalo. He held a bachelor of arts degree and a master's degree in education. At UB, he excelled in sports as a member of the footba'i and wrestling teams.

For some 20 years, Service was executive secretary of the former Michigan Avenue YMCA. He directed activities at the YMCA, a central meeting and recreation place for youths in the Ellicott District.

He left that post in the early 960s to take a similar postion at a YMCA in the Bedford-Stuyve-sant section of New York City. He

was then appointed to the metropolitan staff of the New York City YMCA before retiring and begining a politician career that spanned nearly 50 years.

Service was a member of the Hempstead Republican Club for 13 years and for many years pushed to get more blacks involved in the Republican Party. In recent years he was involved in efforts to recruit more black officials in Nassau County.

Appointed to the Hempstead Village Board in 1968, he was elected to that position several months later and became the first African-American elected official on Long Island. He was re-elected several times before stepping down in 1987.

He was appointed deputy Nassau County executive in 1974 and served in that position as well as a number of other top county administrative postions until 1988, when he retired to spend more time with his family.

A Republican committeeman for the 38th District of Long Island, Service was chairman of the Black Leaders Council and the Hempstead Village Black and Hispanic Voters League.

Surviving are two sons, Michael B. of Brentwood, L.I., and Russell Jr. of Columbia, Md.; a brother, Cleon; a sister, Erna Clark of California, and five grandchildren.

# Alfred Smith, retired restaurant operator

Alfred Smith, 95, a retired restaurant operator who originated recipes for short rib gumbo and porky burger, died Friday (Jan. 10,



1992) in Veterans Hospital after suffering a heart attack Tuesday.

A Mississippi native, he grew up in New Orleans and came to Buffalo after serving in the Army during World War I.

He and his late brother, John, opened the Panama Lunch Room on Jefferson Avenue at William Street.

Smith did his own cooking during the 41 years he owned and operated the restaurant, which was best known as "Smitty's."

One of the favorite items at the restaurant, which had five seats, three booths, three tables and a Wurlitzer jukebox, was his porky burger, a specially prepared meat patty with gravy on a hard roll. Another item was a concoction he called "short rib gumbo."

Smith, whose wife of 53 years, Minnie, died about five years ago, kept his restaurant open 24 hours a day, seven days a week until he retired 23 years ago.
