
Even the deep blue velvet of "In Remembrance" will make us think of how we hold those who have passed away in our hearts and minds.

We look forward to having you with us on Friday, June 15 at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Buffalo (695 Elmwood Avenue at West Ferry) or on Saturday, June 16 at First Presbyterian Church (One Symphony Circle across from Kleinhans Music Hall). Both concerts begin at 8:00 and doors open at 7:00, and both will be followed by receptions for the audience and chorus. Saturday's performance will be interpreted for the hearing impaired.

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Barb's Corner by Barbara Wagner, BGMC Artistic Director

Thanks to the extraordinary efforts of the members of the BGMC and the vision of our vice president, Spike Liska, the evening of April 28 brought many of us and our friends into the homes of BGMC members for dinner and later to the Unitarian Universalist Church for music and a look behind the scenes of chorus operations, followed by dessert and coffee.

How do you choose the music? That was the first question in the O & A session. I loved that question and it occurred to me that many of you might find it interesting. The process is a very thoughtful one and involves many of our experienced musicians whose advice I solicit constantly.

The first thing we do is choose a title for the concert. Every so often, a chorus member comes along and makes a suggestion for the next concert, so when the time comes there is something already on the table. The program you're about to enjoy on June 15 and 16 was easy. Our lives are indeed colorful and not always bright, so it seemed that "The Colors of Our Lives" would lend itself to a great variety of music.

Some of you may already know that a fairly large number of our GALA choruses do shows that might feature only one composer or style. That may happen to us one day, but for now I love the variety of music we're able to do with more open ended themes.

Once we're all agreed on a title, I begin looking for music. By now I have a huge stack of TTBB music that I've collected over the past six years. I'm obviously looking for things that fit the theme. I look for edgy things like "I Ain't Afraid" that will challenge us and our listeners to take a look at our lives and how we're living them. I'm looking for good music—there's a lot of bad, corny stuff out there—music that suits out voices. Is it too difficult? Too easy? I look hard at the poetry. Does it move me? I look for diversity of tempo. Too fast? Too slow? Just

When I'm satisfied with what I've found, the boys and I get together and look at it carefully. Then the suggestions begin to fly. We need to get "Stand by Me." Loren Gretsinger says Toronto has it. Denver has an arrangement of "Swimming to the Other Side." I have a recording, says Tim Mahiques. Wehave to do "Circle of Life," says Jason Ward. I'll get it from Kathleen McGuire. She and I are pals now. Shaun Doyle wails out the opening lines. We all nod our approval. I have trouble getting "Family" from Seattle. Finally, in desperation, I call

Jason, who says, I'll get it for you and he does. Stan Hill of the Twin Cities Gay Men's Chorus responds quickly and sends us his arrangement of "The Prayer."

Jaime Goldfuss, Flip Taporco, Bill Gardner, and David Mathewson have looked over my selections, approved many, but thought some weren't so good. That's the way it goes. We all loved "Plaisir d'Amour" and "Du Bist die Ruh." Is there enough diversity, a trademark of our concerts? And so it goes until finally the program falls into place.

I have the great pleasure of doing the programming, arranging the various songs in an order that will really tell the story of "The Color of Our Lives." It's an amazing process. I've already begun the search for music for our next concert, "The Proud and the Passionate." Isn't that a great title? It started as "The Sacred and the Profane" and gradually and carefully we arrived at this exciting alliteration.

So now you know the rest of the story. Let me know if you have any suggestions us—we welcome them.

Enjoy "The Colors of Our Lives" on June 15 or 16. Thank you for your enduring love and support of our work. With much gratitude to my boys and to all of you who come to listen to us.

In the spotlight: Woody Sipprell

Sherwood "Woody" Sipprell's vitality and leadership attest to the fact that 60 is the new 40. A founding member of the BGMC, Woody served as our first vice president and has successfully chaired the production committee. While amazed at the progress achieved by the chorus in its first five years, he is convinced that we "ain't seen nothing yet!"

An only child, Woody was born, as he says, "just prior to midcentury of the last millennium," was educated in Hamburg, NY and at Cornell University. While at Cornell, he went to an audition of the a capella group, "The Sherwoods" thinking he might just have an "in." He did not. However, he auditioned and won a place in the prestigious Cornell University Glee Club. He joined them on a tour behind the Iron Curtain at a time when it "was the scariest place you ever heard about." Fortunately, the bond of music got the group through all the checkpoints and united them with their Soviet counterparts.

For fifteen years, Woody lived near Clearwater, Florida, and worked at a major hotel. It was during this time in the south that the AIDS crises began. Having lost his best friend to the illness, Woody and a few others founded AIDS Coalition Pinellas which is similar to ACS in WNY. Beginning with a board of nine people and a client base of seventy, their aim was to turn the organization over to professionals in the field. It is now part of Hospice of the Florida Suncoast, the second oldest hospice organization in the nation.

When his parents needed him home for elder care, Woody returned to New York. Upon their deaths, Woody's longtime dream of a Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus began to materialize. He was thrilled to learn that others, who held that same wish, were in the initial meeting stages. And, over the next months, the organization we currently enjoy was given the necessary administrative and musical wings to fly. Woody notes that some of the "mileposts envisioned for the second five years have long been accomplished." He knows that the next five years will truly be awesome.

The BGMC is most grateful for Woody's inspiration and leadership. He continues to work behind the scenes to make this community of musicians the siblings he never had. And with Woody as a big brother, we cannot fail.

A few weeks later, the lady who helped the singers sing better answered her ring telephone again. It was one of the Bisons telling her that the Bisons wanted her strong, handsome singers to sing at a Bisons baseball game. They won first prize.

And so, they will sing the national anthem on Pride Day, June 3, at 1:05 at Dunn Tire Park, a very special day for the lady and her angelic singers.





Behr and Loliger are winners of Operabuffery Award


