

INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district) Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located four blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.
Two and a half story frame with front facing gable roof. Full-width flat roof porch. Glass paneled door flanked on one side by small square leaded window. First floor single light has capping cornice with dentils. Leaded transom. Entablature window surround. Second floor end bay has semi-hexagonal bay. Double-hung windows. Top light has three SIGNIFICANCE vertical lights. Lighted porch door with exaggerated 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1908 paneled entablature. Left projecting end bay has ARCHITECT: rectangular leaded window. Entablature spans second floor. Modillions under cornice. Pedimented gable BUILDER: has three double-hung windows, three vertical lights
in top light. Paneled pilaster strips flank windows 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: and support entablature. A gabled frame residence with Dentils under cornice.
Classical details applied to facade. Greenfield Street extends from Amherst Street to Main Street, paralleling the Belt Line Railroad. Although Greenfield Street was deeded to the city in 1889, it was laid out in 1886 by the Parkside Land Company, which had purchased the land between Amherst Street and West Oakwood Place from two major landowners, Elam R. Jewett and Washington Russell. A street very similar in configuration appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Greenfield follows Olmsted's plan for providing easy access to major streets while being too narrow for extensive commercial development, although some commercial buildings 21.
