Wells died in Cleveland on Sunday (Nov. 20, 1988), a week after suffering a stroke.

Born in Sulligent, Ala., he moved to Buffalo at age 4 and attended School 28 and South Park and Burgard Vocational high schools. He then entered the Navy, in which he was a member of a championship basketball team.

Wells spent his working life in Cleveland, where he was employed for many years by Ford Motor Co. and later was secretary of a retired autoworkers' organization.

Surviving are his wife, Willie Maude Quarrels Wells; a daughter, Dolores McCarly of Buffalo; two sons, Phillip of Oklahoma City, and Kenneth of Cleveland; a brother, Melvin of Buffalo, and four grandchildren.

Melvin Wells, was runner-up Mr. America

Funeral services were held this week for Melvin Wells, 75, a professional bodybuilder who once placed second in the Mr. America contest and later was inducted into the Mr. America Hall of Fame. Burial was in Forest Lawn.

Wells died March 17, 1994, in Buffalo General Hospital after a long illness.

Known as the "Buffalo Hercules," Wells placed second and received the "best arms" award in the Mr. America contest in January 1949.

He was inducted into the Mr. America Hall of Fame in 1985.

In 1949, Wells became the second African-American to appear on the cover of Strength and Health Magazine after he won the title of Mr. Strength and Health.

He also was chosen the most muscular man at the 1951 Nation-

al AAU Championships.

A graduate of the former Hutchinson High School and a star basketball player, Wells worked as a foreman at the Chevrolet plant on East Delavan Avenue and later as a foreman at the Ford Stamping Plant in Woodlawn.

In 1957, he started working as a clerk at the Court Street post office in the U.S. Courthouse, where he worked until his retirement in 1991.

He served as a master sergeant in the U.S. Army during World War II, when he was stationed in Japan.

Survivors include his wife, the former Julia Adams; a daughter, Loretta Dunkwu; a stepson, Leroy Powell; seven grandchildren; and 12 great-grandchildren.

John K. Whitney Jr., Gaymar president

He later worked for Bechtel Corp. in San Francisco as an architect and project leader, designing and supervising construction in Saudi Arabia and then became vice president and partner in Crossing Inc., a real estate development company in Tacoma, Wash.

He returned to Orchard Park in 1990 to become executive vice president at Gaymar, a company founded by his father. He became president and chief operating officer in 1992.

Survivors include his wife, Concepcion; a stepson, Samuel, and a stepdaughter, Judith, both students at Arizona State University; his parents, John and Marilyn of Dorado Beach, Puerto Rico; and three sisters, Jean Chait of New York City, Ann Ami of Novato, Calif., and Mary.

Fred D. Willis Sr. Is Dead; Was Hospital Executive

A memorial service for Fred D. Willis Sr., assistant to the vice president for planning at Buffalo General Hospital, will be held at 6 p.m. today in the Emmanuel Temple Seventh Day Adventist Church, Peckham and Adams streets.

Willis, 70, died Wednesday (Dec. 7, 1988).

A native of Winston-Salem, N.C., he lived in Buffalo most of his life and was associated with Buffalo General for nearly 20 years.


In 1969 he joined an advisory board charged with planning programs for the hospital's Community Mental Health Center. He served a two-year term as chairman of the center's board of directors and was a member of the hospital board of trustees from 1972 to 1979.

Willis was named manager of Buffalo General's Ambulatory Services Clinic in 1979, and when planning began in 1980 for the hospital's 16-story tower, he was appointed an assistant to vice president for planning, a position he held until his death.

"In the almost 20 years he was associated with us, Fred touched and influenced hundreds of lives," said Dr. William V. Kinnard Jr., Buffalo General president. "We will never forget his gentle, caring and compassionate manner."

A community leader, Willis was a member of the Community Action Organization in the 1960s. He later served as VISTA coordinator for Erie County and in 1968 returned to the CAO as youth development director.

In 1971 he became executive director of the Drug Abuse Research and Treatment Center. There he created and directed a countywide mental health program serving 250,000 residents.

A lifelong Democrat, he also was a musical figure who performed as a soloist, director and arranger, once collaborating with Duke Ellington to present a concert of sacred music at Kleinhans Music Hall. He was a member of several singing groups and director of the Twin Coach Choir.
