





PRAYER, in unison

DEAR FATHER, we bow in gratitude for all those who have gone before, whose lives and influence have led us to this place. We ask Thy blessing upon us in the joy of this high hour as we join in thanksgiving, bowing [kneeling] humbly before Thee, and asking for Thy guidance. Amen.

MEDITATION: Bread of Life

[The Bread of Life is symbolized by a loaf placed on the altar, surrounded by its four basic ingredients.]

Leader: Grateful for the heritage of the past, let us now rejoice in the realities of the present. As many ingredients are combined in a loaf of bread, so we bring together our concerns, our prayers, and our talents, remembering Jesus' words: "I am the bread of life." What do you think of as you look at this loaf of bread? Seeds? Harvest? Mill? Baker? How many steps have gone into the making of this loaf? The birth of the Society/Guild which we celebrate today has also been preceded by steps in which we sense the hands of many working together with God.

What do we see when we look at bread? Sweet-smelling loaves for our family? The famine which faces so many? The human needs to which we respond? Our love and resources placed on the altar for others? Or, perhaps, our united fellowship is symbolized by the loaf which we break and share together, the Hebrew tradition of bread and salt, our coffee hours. Food and fellowship can help to link us together in many ways bridging former barriers. What should be the characteristics of the bread we give the world?

1. Daily bread symbolizes **our daily life in Christ** and **our task in the mission of the Church**. All of us are accustomed to One Great Hour of Sharing, in which — as Protestant Christians — we join in alleviating some of the needs of the world. In some of our European churches, especially in Germany, this ecumenical offering is called "Brot für die Welt," which means "Bread for the World."

2. Bread symbolizes **security** around the world. The promise of food for tomorrow is said to have a tranquilizing effect on the hungry. A story is told of starving children, rescued after World War II. The only way to get them to sleep at night was to give them a piece of bread to hold in their hands, thus assuring them that more would be available in the morning.

3. Bread represents **fellowship**. As we break bread together, celebrating our new union in Christ, we rejoice in our opportunities to share and serve.

4. Bread **supplies the nourishment** that leads to renewed energy and strength. Renewal is one of the important words and needs in the church today.

Looking to the future with joyful anticipation, let us recognize our new challenges and accept the responsibilities with courage and faith.

PRESENTATION OF THE INGREDIENTS

[Each woman presenting the object she holds]

First Woman: The basic ingredient of bread is **flour**. Flour is ground and refined from a variety of grains. Once our lives are committed to the faithful following of our Master, they, too, must become refined that we may more nearly fulfill God's purpose for us.

Second Woman: **Milk**, with its vitamin-enriched nourishment, changes the character of the flour. (Or maybe you use water. What is more vital to life than water, "the water of life"?). As representatives of Christ's mission in the world, we should add to our understanding of God's will, and infuse the message we offer with a fresh palatability.

Third Woman: **Salt** is a seasoning, adding taste and interest to food. The interaction of our lives in service and the inspiration of Christian fellowship should provide zest for our every activity. For, as Christ said to his disciples, "You are the salt of the earth."

Fourth Woman: The activity of the Holy Spirit within us is the **yeast**, the vitality and leaven animating our lives as we understand more fully Christ's purpose and extend his love to all.

Leader: Let us go forward today in our new organization, the Women's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild, of the Women's Division of The United Methodist Church, wholly dedicated and creatively committed to an earnest desire for the fulfillment of the purpose of this infant organization in the church and the world.

OUR PURPOSE, pledged in unison

The purpose of the Women's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild shall be to help women grow in the knowledge and experience of God as revealed in Jesus Christ; to challenge them to respond to God's redemptive purpose in the world; to unite them in a Christian fellowship to make Christ known throughout the world; and to develop a personal responsibility for the whole task of the church.

Toward the realization of this purpose, the Women's Society and the Wesleyan Service Guild shall provide opportunities and resources to meet the needs and interests of women; to increase their knowledge of the concerns and responsibilities of the church in the world; and to share in Christian witness, service, and missionary outreach.

The Women's Society and Guild shall enlist workers and secure funds for the fulfillment of their responsibility in the mission of the church at home and overseas.

OUR HERITAGE

Women of the former Evangelical United Brethren Church

"The past is ever with us and ever an inspiration for the future."

The month of October marks the ninety-third anniversary of the Women's Society of World Service and its predecessor women's organizations.

The Women's Society of World Service of The Evangelical United Brethren Church, as well as its counterparts in other denominations, has always had a central purpose, "to make Christ known throughout the world."

Our foremothers accepted what they saw as their responsibility to pray and to study and to give. They said, "Others cannot do our work. If God calls, dare we falter?"

Those women were not afraid to pray. Some historians suggest that their men-folk expressed some fear as to just what might happen because they prayed. History reveals that they prayed that God might open doors. He did.

Those women were not afraid to study. The early study books had impressive titles, and reports in *The Evangel* during those early years indicate that they not only studied, but also shared in discussions which led to action.

Those women were not afraid to give. They began with "two cents a week and a prayer." The appeals of the Thank Offering and the commitment to regular monthly giving were inherited from them.

Our foremothers did not feel that this was *just* women's work. Nor do we. Yet they were firmly convinced that this *is* women's work. They believed that opportunities and resources should be provided to women so that they might participate in the mission of the church to the world. So do we.

They found ways to demonstrate their oneness with other Christians, especially women, in Christian witness and outreach, in united mission study, joining in the World Day of Prayer, sharing in community and world concerns. This too is our intent today.

"The past is ever with us and ever an inspiration for the future."

A famous oculist once said, "Everyone should look back over his shoulder once in a while, to rest his eyes and to strengthen his vision."

If this is good for our physical eyes, it is equally good spiritual exercise to look back, now and again, at our heritage as a Women's Society of World Service.

The Women's Society of World Service in The Evangelical United Brethren Church stems from the valiant beginnings of Women's Missionary Societies in both The Evangelical Church and The Church of the United Brethren in Christ.

Women of the former Methodist Church

The Woman's Society of Christian Service of The Methodist Church was born in crisis! By 1940 the "Second World War" had already begun to move across the horizon to spread its devastation across three continents. From the suffering and destruction there emerged an unrest and a new demand for justice and peace for all mankind.

New nations were born. New freedom voices of the world's almost two billion peoples of color came forth in chorus and could never be muted again.

The revolution was on — and Methodist women were in it, like it or not! Their whole concept of missionary responsibility took on added dimensions, recognized the revolutionary changes which demanded that their mission must be realized in a new context. Time endless became no time at all! Traditional concepts of the church's task were no longer adequate.

This new-day-dawning created new insights and responsibilities for seeing God's mission in His troubled world as a task which in fact called Methodist women "to unite" with others in their efforts to bring about the "establishment of a World Christian Community" where all people could grow as persons.

These women had behind them a history of 71 years of service. The nation was recovering from a terrible civil war; children were working ten hours a day in factories and longer in the fields; women had no political or economic rights; and millions around the world lived in poverty, ignorance, and without medical care, when, on a March day of blustery winds and driving rain in 1869, eight women came together at the old Tremont Street Church in Boston to organize the first Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church. This group eventually sent to India Miss Isabella Thoburn, who established at Lucknow the first school for girls in that country, and Dr. Clara Swain, who set up a woman's hospital at Bareilly.

Four years later another small group of women of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, organized the Woman's Bible Mission of Nashville, which became the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. This society sent its first missionary, Miss Lochie Rankin, to China. In 1879, the Methodist Protestant Church organized the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and sent Miss Lizzie Guthrie to Japan.

Organization of home missionary societies by the three churches soon followed and eventually all the locally organized societies became national bodies.

As the need for a missionary group for employed women began to be realized,

Evangelical United Brethren

In The Evangelical Church the first attempt at organization was in 1839 when a group of women formed "The Evangelical Missionary Society of the Immanuel Evangelical Church in Philadelphia" but it was not until 1884 that a constitution for such organizations was ratified by the Board of Missions.

In The Church of the United Brethren in Christ the earliest record of organized effort is "The Sisters' Mission Society of the Ohio German Conference" in May 1869. In Dayton, Ohio, Lizzie Hoffman, a young schoolteacher, was struggling with not only a need for deeper personal consecration but also with the call to go to Africa as a missionary. She wrote of this experience, "with my Bible and lamp I went to my room . . . read and prayed till day-dawned when relief came, and I could pray, 'Lord, use me as it seemeth to thee good.'"

Her conviction that the women of the church should be organized to undertake special work for missions led to the organization of the Miami Conference Branch in Ohio, which in turn became the pattern for other branches and resulted in the organization of the Women's Missionary Association in 1875.

With the merger of The Evangelical Church and The Church of the United Brethren in Christ in 1946 the women's organization became the Women's Society of World Service of The Evangelical United Brethren Church. The name was chosen ". . . after prayerful and careful consideration of what the women purposed this new organization should become." They envisioned one all-encompassing women's organization in the church. The traditional emphasis has always been on mission, but in addition to this the Women's Society of World Service purposed to develop among its members a readiness to participate in the TOTAL MISSION of the church.

The Women's Society of World Service of The Evangelical United Brethren Church brings into the Women's Society of Christian Service of The United Methodist Church (according to the 1967 reports) a total of 2,919 local societies, with a membership of 105,420. The grand total in giving for the year 1967 was \$1,352,142.98. They also bring a subscription list to *The World Evangel* of approximately 65,000, which represents 61% of their membership.

These are the tangible assets. The intangibles are equally, if not more, important. They are best expressed by the purpose and scope of the organization. "The purpose of the society shall be to

the Wesleyan Service Guild was organized within the Methodist Episcopal Church. Charter members were first received May 7, 1921. In 1939 the guild became a part of the new woman's organization of The Methodist Church.

In 1939-40, members of the new Woman's Society of Christian Service had come from three Methodist Communions, the Methodist Protestant Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, which united the organized women's groups whose concerns, rooted in the local churches and communities of this country, reached across the world.

In 1940 this united body had 1,113,000 members in 19,468 charter organizations. The Woman's Division of Christian Service that year had a budget of \$3,593,000. The offering of the Week of Prayer and Self-Denial, begun in 1887 in the South and adopted by the Woman's Division of Christian Service in 1941, brought an offering of \$113,440.71, which has now increased to more than \$600,000, annually.

Now, in 1968, another year of war and freedom crises, the new Women's Society of Christian Service of The United Methodist Church is born. To this organization the Woman's Societies of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guilds of the former Methodist Church bring over 1,500,000 members in more than 33,500 societies and guilds, 250,000 subscribers to *The Methodist Woman*, and an annual budget of \$11,100,000.

The roots and programs of these societies and guilds have related, in some measure at least, to its declared purpose: "To help women grow in the knowledge and experience of God as revealed in Jesus Christ and to challenge them to respond to God's redemptive purpose in the world."

unite all women of The Evangelical United Brethren Church in a Christian fellowship to make Christ known throughout the world and to develop a personal responsibility for the whole task of the church.

"The scope of work of the Society shall be the needs and interests of women and the concerns and responsibility of the Church in today's world. The Society shall foster spiritual growth, missionary outreach, and Christian service."



Toward the realization of this purpose, The Women's Society shall provide opportunities and interests of women; to increase their knowledge of the concerns and responsibilities of the church in the world; and to share in Christian witness, service, and missionary outreach.

The Womens Society shall enlist workers and ~~secure~~ funds for the fulfillment of their responsibility in the mission of the church at home and overseas.




