Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story clapboard and shingle residence. Front facing gable roof. Full-width enclosed flat-roof porch. Rough cut, regular course stone base. Glass apeneld door flanked by single-light sidelights. Transom. Left bay has three-part single light window. Transom. Paneled apron. Bays flanked by SIGNIFICANCE paired Doric pilaster strips. Second floor center

19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1913 boxed bay. Paired double-hung 6/1 windows. End bays have double-hung 6/1 windows.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: hip roof through-the-cornice Prairie style influenced residence with \_\_\_\_\_ dormer. Colonial Revival styling. Florence Avenue extends from Main Street to Parkside Avenue, paralleling Robie Street. Located within the first section of the Parkside subdivision to be developed, Florence Avenue was deeded to the city by Jacob Davis in 1887. Although Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside" show a street angling from the intersection of Main and Humboldt to Parkside Avenue, when it was finally developed Florence Avenue was modified to parallel Humboldt Avenue. It nevertheless still followed Olmsted's rule that a subdivision street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
