



INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district) Building is situated on a standard sized corner lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located one block from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and east of the Zoo.
Two and a half story with Queen Anne styling. Cross gable roof. Right bay has two-story pedimented gable porch. Fluted Doric corner supports at first floor Ionic columns on second floor. Spindle balustrade. Entablature at first and second floor level. Fish-scale shingles in tympanum and porch base. First and second floor has paired double hung 1/1 windows. Plain window surrounds. 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: 1907 Left bay has porch extension with fluted Doric supports, ARCHITECT: spindle balustrade with upper porch spindle balustrade. Glass paneled door. Second floor has pair single- BUILDER: light casement windows. Transom light. Fish-scale shingled pedimented gable. Double hung 1/1 window.
Queen Anne style with multiple gables, porches and use of shingle and clapboard wall materials. Russell Avenue extends from Parkside Avenue to Greenfield Street. It was lair out in a map of 1886, paralleling the northern border of the lands of Washington Russell, after whom the street was named. However it was early 1889 before Russell Avenue was deeded to the city. While this particular street does not appear in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside," Olmsted felt cross streets would allow easy access to major thoroughfares and to the park, and he did include similar cross streets such as Jewett Avenue in his early plans.
