

	lawns line this street. The grounds of the Buffalo Zoological Society are located one block to the south.

20.	HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:
	Fine example of Craftsman Style residence. The street takes its name from James Tillinghast, owner of property up until July 15, 1889 when it was conveyed to
	George L. Thorne and Byron Angell, to be subdivided for residential use. The
	subdivision named "Meadow View Park" carried restrictive covenants in its deeds of
	sale. The restrictions set forth minimum house costs and mimimum measures for street frontage. The homes on Tillinghast were to be of "tasteful design" and the
	cost was not to be less than \$3,000. The street reflects Olmsted's philosophy
	regarding roadways located within a subdivision; Tillinghast is a broad, long
	roadway with no intersecting thoroughfares, running east to west "with no special directness toward the town."
