First-Ever BGMC Performance at African American Church

For the first time in its history, the Antoine M. Thompson, who was Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus performed in presented with Unity Fellowship's an African-American church as part of Bayard Rustin Award in recognition of its ongoing commitment to support LGBT people of color. On February 20, 2010 the BGMC presented its "Love Unbound" concert at Unity Fellowship Church on Main St. in Buffalo. The concert raised over \$1,300 for the church headed by Rev. Gerard Williams, who has worked to bring a congregation of the Unity Fellowship to the Buffalo area. Unity Fellowship is the only denomination in the African-American church tradition that welcomes LGBT people to full inclusion.

Joining the BGMC and Pastor Williams for the fundraiser were LGBTsupportive local clergy Geri Lyon of First Presbyterian Church, Joel Miller of the Unitarian Universalist Church, and Rabbi Alex Lazarus-Klein of Temple Sinai. Carol Speser, a leader in the local LGBT community, also spoke at the event, as did New York State Senator

As I reflect on the year that has passed by so quickly since last fall, I sometimes wonder how we survived! As we looked at the financial statement that was to dictate what we could do this past year, I must say it was a bit terrifying. How could we continue? Yet financial gifts came in from supporters, leaders

and singers within our beloved chorus. We had a brand new Board. The strong and determined prevailed and we went out and sang.

We started at the Chautauqua Institution singing for a group of gay and lesbian people who all lived in the Chautauqua area, in places where no other gays lived. It was an amazing event. As we sang and laughed and cried with the audience we realized that both they and we were exactly where we needed to be that early fall evening.

We sang at the Buffalo Seminary (I invited us there--I can be a bit pushy!) where the strong, young women wept with us through the songs that mean so much to us all. To these high school students we were "sooooo cute!"

We sang on a program with the Buffalo Philharmonic Chorus. My dear, new friend and colleague, Doreen Rao loved us, as did the people from the BPO Chorus. It was a lovely evening, but like the Buffalo Seminary performance, our ranks were smaller than in the past.

I think the turning point was our performance at the Albright Knox Gallery for the "Lighting of the Christmas Tree" ceremony. The performance was almost like a miracle. With our numbers and spirits high, our singing was gorgeous. We had survived a difficult summer and fall and come in from something of a wilderness. That was exactly how I felt when that evening ended. I kept feeling and saying, "We're back, we're back." And we were.

We went on to a triumphant Christmas season of concerts that included our first ever appearance at the Riviera Theatre in North Tonawanda. Organized by Amilcar Hill, this was a program all about love. Amilcar and his wife had lost their

beautiful son in the late summer and this incredibly moving concert was a tribute to him and to the power of love.

We performed one more concert in February that was not only about love, it was an act of love. The BGMC was joined by prominent religious and community leaders to welcome and support the Unity Fellowship Church, a brand new, LGBT-affirming community of worship in the African-American church tradition. After our wonderful performance that night, I recalled the time several years ago when we were threatened by protesters for singing in a church. Now, the beautiful songs that told of our dreams for ourselves and our community were warmly applauded in this new, welcoming church that we had come to support. A season that had begun for us with so much challenge now saw us renewed and recommitted to our mission to serve our community with pride.

Quite a story! This leads me to my thoughts about our upcoming concert series this June 18-20th.

I've always wanted us to tell our story in song--hence the title of this concert--"Once Upon a Time." Now, I've talked enough to my dear men to know that sometimes the gay life begins very early. So we begin the June concert with a very silly song about the birth of a "Drama Queen." You can imagine where we go from there, but I promise you'll hear some of the loveliest music we've ever sung, including: "Save the Last Dance For Me," "Walk Hand in Hand," "He Ain't Heavy, He's My Brother," the charming "Rainbow Connection," "A Love That Will Never Grow Old," and one of the most touching of all, "Both Ways," the story of a puzzled young gay teenager who wonders why he's treated one way in front of all his pals and another way when he's alone with his special friend. I can hardly wait for you to hear all of this powerful music as we tell you our story.

If I've been reminded of anything after what began as a difficult year with many challenges, it is that we have each other, we're brothers, and we're there for each other no matter how hard it might be. Please come join our family in June. We want to share our stories with you, our beloved and loyal friends and patrons.

Thank you, dear friends, for all you have done and will do to help us continue our mission to our community.

Many of us have experienced the pain and suffering of coming out. Some of us came out at a very early age and some of us later in life. Regardless of when in our lives we made this difficult journey, what we have in common is that we lacked a place to go to find help.

For myself, I never did get to talk to anyone about my sexuality. I was talked at about how bad "those people" are and about what a "bad lifestyle that is." There wasn't anywhere for me to turn or anyone I could reach out to with my questions. I had the feeling that I was all alone.

So imagine how excited I felt, years later, singing as a proud member of a gay chorus. A room of 150 high school students had come together to discuss the challenges they face as LGBT teenagers and to listen to us sing. The event was the Gay and Lesbian Youth Services Conference held at Niagara Wheatfield High School this past February. I was part of a small contingent of BGMC singers who made the trip up to Niagara County for this evening of music and outreach.



I was deeply moved by the youth I met. Not only did they enjoy our singing, but they appreciated that the members of the BGMC shared our growing up and coming out stories. The BGMC members who were there that night felt a bond with these youth. We had all experienced much of the same pain and suffering growing up. However, they had a place where they could go to find information, support and friendship. That place is the Gay and Lesbian Youth Services here in Buffalo.

As we sang and shared our stories with the youth of Niagara Wheatfield High School, I felt pride building up. The pain and suffering of coming out seemed distant. In its place was the awareness of what I had longed to know as a child myself. Affirmed on the faces of our appreciative audience I realized, "I know I am not alone."

Member Spotlight:

Nathan E. Phillips

Award-winning Amherst Middle School teacher, coach, advisor and legend of Buffalo's Imperial Court (and former Miss Queen City), Nathan E. Phillips is a valued member of the BGMC's Tenor II section and one of the most dedicated people you are ever likely to meet.

"My mother always stressed giving back to the community," Nathan said during our interview for the Crescendo. The effects of growing up with such an ethos became obvious from our brief conversation.

Take, for example, the genesis of Nathan's beloved drag persona, Gladys Over. Initially resistant to the idea of donning mascara and an evening gown, Nathan finally took the plunge into Gladys only after a longtime friend pressed him to perform drag to help raise money to support people with HIV-AIDS. Several colorful years and \$75,000 later, Nathan, aka "Gladys," continues to give back to local AIDS charities in high and hilarious style. Anyone who's ever attended Gay Bingo can attest to that.

Later, Nathan told me, "I don't remember a time when music wasn't a part of my life." Nathan joined the BGMC back in 2007, bringing with him years of singing and musical theater experience. During his high school days in central New York, Nathan's vocal abilities won him positions in the prestigious All-State and All-Eastern U.S. Choruses. In the BGMC, Nathan combines his musical gifts with a giving spirit that overflows from every other part of his life, whether it's teaching his middle-school students, coaching softball and volleyball, mentoring youth, or calling bingo.

"Nathan just overflows with enthusiasm," said one chorus member. "It's hard not to be inspired by getting to know Nate." Nathan's personal journey encompasses years of struggle and finally overcoming issues with his weight; a victory of courage and personal fortitude in which the BGMC played a vital role. "When I first heard the chorus, I wanted to join. I wanted to sing. I went to all the concerts, but I couldn't fit into a tuxedo. I promised myself that I would fit into a tux and then join the
