

Humboldt Parkway was named for Alexander Humboldt, a ed geologist, in honor of his work as a Naturalist. The Parkway, a broad coughfare, was designed with central roads and walks for "pleasure travel." as area would provide a setting for short walks, a playground for children and 'airing ground for invalids." Roadways outside this area would "answer the pure of a street for ordinary traffic."
