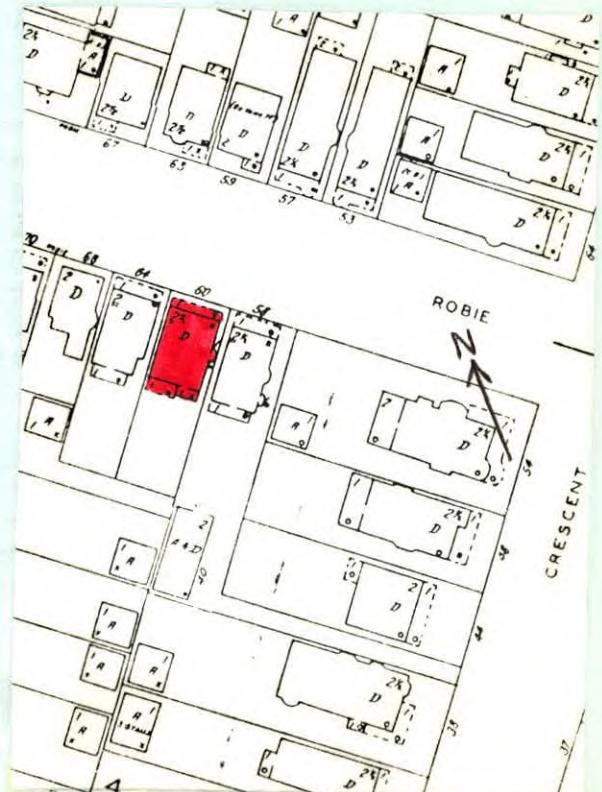

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story frame and shingle residence. Cross gable roof. Full-width shed roof porch with centered pediment. Tympanum decorated with vine and leaf motif with circular medallion. Prism shaped panels in frieze. Glass and wood paneled door. End bays have single hung single-light windows. Second floor semi-hexagonal bay. Double hung 1/1 windows. Right bay has single

SIGNIFICANCE

19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: c. 1900 double hung 1/1 window.

ARCHITECT: Window and door surrounds have fluted sides. Band of trim below roof eave decorated with prism shaped panel decorated with

BUILDER: three petal cut-out flower. Decorative shingled gable has semi-hexagonal bay. Double-hung 1/1 windows. Saw-

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: tooth band below window sills and above windows.

A simplified form of the Queen Anne style. Robie Street extends from Parkside Avenue to Main Street. Located in the center of the first section of the Parkside subdivision to be developed, on lands owned by Jacob Davis, Robie Street was deeded to the city in December 1887. Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside" show a street angling from Humboldt to Parkside Avenue; however when Robie Street was laid out, it paralleled Humboldt Avenue. The street nevertheless still followed Olmsted's plan to have short cross streets in the subdivision, giving residents easy access to main thoroughfares and the park.
