

The Power of Music to Build Community Dennis C. Stuart, President, BGMC







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Reflections from the *Hr*tistic Director




Several weeks ago, one of my most respected colleagues on the Board of the BGMC lovingly referred to me at as a "bleeding heart liberal." I felt proud and honored that he believed that I was one of those people that I had admired for so many years. If I was not a "bleeding heart liberal," I don't believe the men of the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus and I would have enjoyed the give-and-take relationship we have enjoyed these past 5+ years.

In the early days, many of the men gave me the benefit of the doubt when I knew that some of them wondered how a "straight old broad" could possibly succeed as the director of a gay men's chorus. In return, I accepted the challenge and the doubts and gave the best of everything I had learned over more than 37 years in the choral conducting field to my now, most beloved men. They listened as I told them how to produce a beautiful five-note scale, how to sing a gorgeous, warm fortissimo, how to modify their vowels so they were all perfectly unified, how to find their head voices, their falsettos.... They took all of this to heart and, in return, sang with a beauty I never thought possible. There were many simple five-note scales that were so exquisite; they brought tears to my eyes. We have given and taken musical and personal gifts to and from each other for more than five years, always with unexpected powerful results for all of us. It's been magical and exciting for many of us, and for me, the only way to reach the beauty and goodness for which we all strive.


My tolerant men gave me gay humor, with all of its often hysterical permutations. How we have laughed at my silly mistakes! There have been many, but unfortunately, they are not fit for publication in an elegant program like this one. (Talk to me later.) In return, I gave of my bawdy, mature humor, a product of many years in a field where humor, beauty, love and joy all go hand and hand. There has been much laughter and joy and yes, often tears in the rooms where the BGMC has rehearsed. It's all necessary so we can achieve even more than our best when we sing. These magnificent, warm, loving men have changed my life in ways I never dreamed were possible. I am so grateful for the opportunity that was offered to me by our founders, and even more grateful for the giveand-take that has made it all work. And yes, as I said at our very first concert, I can still "feel the love tonight."



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
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Reflections From Within The Chorus - 4.

We first wore modest outfits: black pants with polos or casual black-collared shirts. Something "everybody could afford." Then came Montreal! Summer 2004, a city enlarged with 5,000 gay and lesbian singers from around the continent and abroad. A week listening to other choruses ... the men resplendent in their tweedos, often singing from memory. When our turn came, we had raised our own expectations. Thirty minutes singing our specially commissioned song series on Whitman poems from memory, before an audience of 3,000. An incredible, mind-bending experience! Back in Byfalo, we immediately arranged for tweedos for everyone and made a commitment to strong memorized elements in our concerts. This was, now, truly serious.


Reflections From Within The Chorus - 5 Our choice of music has sometimes been accompanied with a touch of controversy. Some would prefer lighter, showtune music. Others, classical. Some wanted it a bit more "gay;" others, less so; Opinions did not just vary within the Chorus, they were sometimes strongly held. But Barb has encouraged us to mix the lighter with the more serious music, including some of the beautiful material available from other lands, in other languages. Oh, how some of us struggled with that - and not always happily! But we have persisted. And a confidential survey of the members this year makes it clear that some of our most cherished repertoire comes from other-language music that you will be hearing tonight. It seems true that, by and large, we are all growing more comfortable with different musical experiences as we continue on our way.


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
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


In our wildest areams, we would never have associated "BGMC" and "BDO" in our minds, But in 2003 and 2006, under the batons of Ron Spiegelman and JoAnn Falletta, in turn, we sang with the BDO. What glorious experiences they were! There we stood, singing our music with pride, with gratitude that it could be heard and, we hoped, with confidence that it measured up to our very best. In 2003, we sang the serenely elegant "Cantique de Jean Racine", by Gabriel Fauré, as part of an all-French program. At the Olmsted Dark Conservancy event in 2006, we sang a variety of music ranging from the quiet and sedate to the magnificence of "Nessun Dorma," Duccini's operatic masterpiece. We are confident we know what brought us to the BDO stage on both occasions: the focused, persistent musical genius of our own Barbara Wagner, to whom her "boys" offer their continuing devotion and affection.



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Reflections From Within The Chorus - 7

We've donned our tuxedos. Concert time is near. There is a general milling around in the back rooms - with chorus members talking and laughing with one another, audience members and supporters coming and going. Barbara appears, dressed and ready. She signals and we come together around her. She calls our newest members to the center of our gathered group. Hands are raised as she asks for those who have sung at all our concerts, then all but one and so on, down to the present time. Then her quiet talk to our newest singers - how they are now, this night, full members of the chorus, and that it welcomes them with open arms, and that we sing for the music - but not just that. We sing to save lives, and we know that that happens. Whether in Buffalo, or in a small town Canadian church, or the Baptist Church in downtown Niagara Falls (to assist local ATDS relief effort,) or the Masonic Hall in Erie, La. (to help local gay men and lesbians, form their own gay chorus,) or an arts program at the College in Fredonia (in support of its gay and lesbian student activities,) or elsewhere as we are called and are able to respond. We should be proud of what we do, she says, a reminder from this straight woman of our more serious purposes. Then, we sing, to her and to each other and not necessarily in perfect key. Softly, so as not to be heard in the concert hall. But earnestly, sincerely. Always the same:

My life flows on, in endless song, above earth's lamentation.

I hear the real though far off song that hails a new creation.

No storm can shake my inmost calm, while to that rock I'm clinging. Institution we then Since Love is Lord of Heaven and Earth,


How can I keep from singing? The tones drift away, as we briefly stand there. Then: "Laces everyone. It's time." Another concert begins.

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





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Music Notes

Come to the Music

With a catchy tune, off-kilter joyful dance groove and buoyant lyric it's not surprising that "Come to the Music" has become a favorite piece of choral singers and audiences since Joseph M. Martin published it six years ago. The song was commissioned by a high school men's chorus for the Texas Music Educators Association. The BGMC heard no fewer than five renditions at the Gay and Lesbian Association of Choruses (GALA) festival in Montreal in 2004.

Laudate Pueri

Though a Romantic composer, firmly planted in the 19th century, Felix Mendelssohn absorbed the clarity and simplicity of Baroque and early Classical music into his own style.At a time when musicians rarely performed music of dead composers, Mendelssohn was keenly aware of his musical forbears: He revived Bach's St. Matthew Passion (abridged and somewhat reorchestrated) for public performance in 1829.

In his motet "Laudate Pueri Dominum" (Psalm 113,) published in 1830 and originally written for women's chorus, we hear a perfect example of Mendelssohn's refined musical language: The harmonies are adopted from Mozart and grafted to counterpoint that hearkens back to Bach. All melds easily – and wonderfully – with Romantic expressiveness and passion.

Hospodi Pomilui

In the Orthodox Church, the word "Liturgy" refers specifically to the Eucharistic service – in the West, its equivalent is the Mass.As the early church developed, a number of Liturgies arose in the East, but only four forms are in use today. One of those is the Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom which is used on Sundays and weekdays.The phrase "Hospodi Pomilui" ("Lord, have mercy") is sung many times throughout the Liturgy.We have included a setting by S.V. Lovovsky (1830-1894) – a lesser-known Russian contemporary of Tchaikovsky – in which that phrase is repeated no less than 75 times.

To a Stranger

Buffalo composer Martin J. Wimmer writes:

"Walt Whitman's poem 'To a Stranger' was published in 1860 in Leaves of Grass in the cluster of 45 poems of distinctly gay sensibility called the Calamus poems. Leaves of Grass was criticized because of its exaltation of the body and sexual love and also because of its innovation in verse form – that is, the use of free verse in long rhythmical lines with a natural, 'organic' structure. I was inspired to set poetry by Whitman after hearing the BGMC perform several Whitman settings by fellow Buffalo composer, Roland E. Martin. 'To A Stranger' was composed in 2004."

Mr. Wimmer hopes his music does justice to this remarkably potent poem.

The first time I came to a rehearsal, I reached out to shake the hand of a fellow chorister who pushed my hand aside. "This really isn't a hand shaking kind of group, welcome to the family!" he said, as he gave me a big hug.

Seeing all of our friends and family in the pews of the church warmly greeting and standing in support of us was overwhelming, as we processed down the aisle of a filled Blessed Trinity Roman Catholic Church.

The Buffalo Gay Men's Charus Every moment I spend as a member of this organization is a memorable one. I know that we can't expect to change the entire world at once, but if we keep working on it one heart at a time we'll be successful.

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

Shenandoah

The original lyrics of this haunting riverboatmen's song tell the story of a roving trader in love with the daughter of Chief Shenandoah; the rover tells the chief of his intent to take the girl with him far to the west, across the Missouri River. The words in this arrangement omit mention of the daughter; the song is sung to the river, not to Chief Shenandoah.

Billed as a fairy tale for adults, Stephen Sondheim's 1987 musical *Into the Woods* interwove the stories of *Jack and the Beanstalk*, *Little Red Riding Hood*, *Cinderella* and *Rapunzel* as a witty and multi-layered examination of the parent-child relationship, the responsibility to community, and the inevitability of growing up and discovering the real world. Despite darkness, murder and mayhem, sweetness and simplicity color the book and score of *Into the Woods*. "No One Is Alone" is a pragmatic – and affecting – conclusion to the story.

Seize the Day

The 1992 Disney musical *Newsies* retells the story of the 1899 New York City newsboys' strike against newspaper moguls Joseph Pulitzer and William Randolph Hearst. The boys explode into the anthem "Seize the Day" at the point in the story when, inspired by a recent trolley-workers' strike, they realize that they have the power to unite and fight for their rights.

You Can't Stop the Beat

"You Can't Stop the Beat," the finale of the blockbuster 2002 Broadway musical based on John Waters' loopy 1988 film comedy *Hairspray*, celebrates joy and pride among the exuberant young people of Baltimore who embrace diversity and triumph over prejudice. The song celebrates the joy that comes from "lightening up." Don't fight it – have fun with everything that's weird and wonderful about each of us!

How Can I Keep From Singing?

"How Can I Keep From Singing" holds a very special place in the hearts of the 35 men who gathered at the first rehearsal of the brand-new BGMC. That rehearsal began at 7 PM on September 11, 2001. At the end of that brutal and bewildering day, this lovely hymn centered and restored us.

The publisher's attribution of this song as a "Quaker hymn" is in dispute, as various sources claim that it was composed in 1860 by Baptist minister Robert Wadsworth Lowry, who wrote about 500 other hymns, including "Shall We Gather at the River."

The spontaneous applause and standing ovation for Father George Reger as he barely completed the phrase "Welcome to Blessed Trinity Church" will always hold special meaning for me. It demonstrates what the BGMC is about, that enlightenment through our music is always possible, even when faced with challenges from those who would prefer we remain in the closet.

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Dirait-on

Of the last song in his cycle of five songs, Les Chansons des Roses, the composer writes: "Rainer Maria Rilke (1875-1926) wrote nearly 400 poems in French. His poems on roses struck me as especially charming, filled with gorgeous lyricism, deftly crafted and elegant in their imagery. Dirait-on is set as a tuneful folksong that weaves together two melodic ideas first heard in fragmentary form in preceding movements of my choral cycle."

La Vergine degli Angeli

La Forza del destino was written for the Bolshoi Theater in St. Petersberg, where it premiered in 1862. Its libretto was the last of the nine that Piave wrote for Verdi. At the end of the third act of the opera the fugitive heroine Leonora, disguised as a monk, kneels in prayer before the altar of a monastery church and receives communion. Her voice soars over those of the monks.

Our Love is Soaring Across the Land

A child of politically active parents, Holly Near is a unique combination of entertainer, teacher and activist. Her career as a singer has been defined by an unwillingness to separate her passion for music from her passion for human dignity. "Our Love is Soaring across the Land" is one of nearly 500 songs she cowrote with composer Jeff Langley. It has been sung by gay and lesbian choruses around the world since its composition in 1994.

Cantique de Jean Racine

The Cantique is a setting of words by the 17th century dramatist and poet Jean Racine. It was Fauré's first significant composition, written in 1865 while he was in his final year at the École Niedermeyer, the 'École de musique religieuse et classique'. He submitted the piece for the composition prize, and won, though it remained unpublished for eleven years. Fauré went on to write a good deal of religious music – most notably the Requiem, written in 1888 – but of the shorter sacred pieces it is the Cantique that has particularly captured the affections of choirs and audiences.

Non Nobis Domine

Patrick Doyle's stirring anthem was composed for the soundtrack of Kenneth Branagh's 1989 film *Henry V*, where it is heard during the now-famous climactic scene where King Henry, in the aftermath of the Battle of Agincourt, makes his way across the dead-strewn battlefield in a stunning, four-minute tracking shot.

El Yivneh Hagalil

Julius Chajes (1910-1985) was born in Lvov, Poland. He served as head of the piano department at the Music College in Tel Aviv and came to the United States in 1937. In 1940, he became the conductor of the Center Symphony Orchestra in Detroit and was appointed to the faculty of Wayne State University in 1950. This energetic piece, written in 1945 as excitement grew in advance of the opening of the State of Israel, suggests a spirit of hard work, cooperation and growth. Michael Chikinda, a member of the BGMC in 2003, recast this popular piece for performance by our chorus.

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The Last Words of David

The Boston Symphony Orchestra commissioned "The Last Words of David" in 1949 in honor of the 25th anniversary of its director, Serge Koussevitzky. Randall Thompson, professor of music at Harvard University and a teacher of the young Leonard Bernstein, drew his text for this soaring work from II Samuel 23:3-4 in the King James version. The words "Alleluia ...Amen" are not part of the scripture.

From the Adamic Songs

Acclaimed Western New York composer, teacher and organist Roland E. Martin set six poems from *Leaves of Grass* for the BGMC in 2004. He writes: "It was an overwhelming pleasure for me to set these wonderful poems. They are filled with moments of great tenderness, intimacy, longing, lust, joy and more. Many composers have set Whitman's poetry. His 'love poetry,' perhaps because of its abundance of masculine pronouns, has only seldom been set to music. This is probably the first musical setting of most of these poems."

One More Walk Around the Garden

Despite words by Lerner (*Brigadoon, My Fair Lady, Camelot*) and music by Lane (*Finian's Rainbow*), the artistic forces who had teamed up to create On a Clear Day You Can See Forever (Grammy for best original cast album), the 1979 musical Carmelina did not fare well on Broadway. Based on the 1968 film Buona Sera, Mrs. Campbell and nominated for a Best Original Score Tony, the cast included Georgia Brown and Paul Sorvino.

The lovely trio "One More Walk around the Garden" is sung by three WW II veterans, any of whom might have fathered Mrs. Campbell's daughter, who is now 17 years old.

Nessun Dorma

Puccini's final opera, *Turandot*, is saturated with exotic characters and colorful harmonies. They tell the tale of the handsome Prince Calaf, who is given the chance to spare his life from a death sentence placed on him by the cold-hearted Princess Turandot – if he can correctly answer three riddles. Act 3 opens in gloom of night, with shadowy voices promulgating the death sentence. With a key change to a bright, strong major mode, the Prince vows to find the answers, save his life – and win the hand of the Princess.

Our arrangement jumps to the final pages of the opera as all celebrate the power of light and love.

Naked in the Leaves

While there are many songs that celebrate the joys of conventional married life, there are few songs that capture the joy and tenderness experienced by gay men blessed with the stability of long-term relationships. Robert Seeley, the longtime composer-in-residence of the San Francisco Gay Men's Chorus, has set this tender, slow waltz to extraordinarily perceptive words by Robert Espindola, who is himself an educator and strong advocate for teenagers living with HIV/AIDS.

I Ain't Afraid

Holly Near released "I Ain't Afraid" on her album, *Edge* in 2000. Five gay and lesbian choruses sang this stirring, in-your-face anthem at the 2004 GALA Festival

in Montreal. We heard Steven Milloy himself directing his chorus, *VocalPoint!* The song has been adopted, with Holly Near's gracious permission, as the theme song of the Institute for Humanist Studies, based in Albany.

Seasons of Love

The *Rent* phenomenon captured the imagination of theatergoers in 1996.A modern retelling of the story made familiar to opera lovers from Puccini's *La Boheme, Rent* covers the year in the life of persons living with AIDS, and their friends and lovers among the New York crowd of struggling artists and actors. Jonathan Larson, the creator of *Rent* tells us in this song to make the most of time and love, despite burned bridges and untimely death. Larson died or an aortic aneurism two weeks before the show's opening.

Today

This lovely ballad was first sung by The New Christie Minstrels in the more-or-less forgettable 1964 Civil War comedy, "Advance to the Rear." Composer Sparks was a member of The New Christie Minstrels at the time, as was the late John Denver.

Nkosi Sikelel' iAfrica


"Nkosi Sikelel' iAfrika" was composed in 1897 by Enoch Sontonga, a teacher at a Methodist mission school in Johannesburg. For decades the song has been regarded as the national anthem of South Africa by the oppressed. It was always sung as an act of defiance against the apartheid regime. There are no standard versions or translations of "Nkosi Sikelel' iAfrika" so the words vary from place to place and from occasion to occasion.

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
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When the BGMC first performed "Our Love is Soaring Across the Land" at our Spring 2003 concert, I found a song that 'spoke' to me and helped me feel at peace with myself. I finally felt content with identifying myself as a gay man. The" message of this song truly empowered me. I still get goose bumps every time I hear the introduction!




About the Artists

Boundary The Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus (BGMC) performs a rich catalog of classical, contemporary, Broadway, pop and multi-cultural music. The repertoire is as diverse as the 75 men who are singing with pride as members of the BGMC.

The BGMC has been honored by the Empire State Pride Agenda with a Community Service Award. This award was in recognition of efforts to raise awareness and to enlighten our region through song. To that end, the BGMC has performed in a variety of venues throughout Western New York and Ontario for many community events. Additionally, the BGMC has traveled to Montreal to participate in the seventh annual GALA Festival, an international gathering of gay and lesbian choruses. Recently the BGMC won the *Artvoice* Best of Buffalo 2006 Award for 'Best Vocalist.'

While maintaining a strong presence within the gay community, The BGMC also has been privileged to perform with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra at Kleinhans Music Hall on two occasions, and has done benefits for the Amherst Unitarian Universalist Church music program; Blessed Trinity Roman Catholic Church's restoration; the annual World AIDS Day Memorial Service; and, the AIDS Community Services fundraiser Cause for Celebration. Additionally, BGMC performed for the arrival of The Amistad; participated in "Gusto at the Gallery" at the Albright-Knox Art Gallery; sang at the Ars Nova Musicians "Viva Vivaldi" Concert; sang at Fredonia College for their diversity and multicultural groups; and, at the Nichols School for Diversity Week. Of course, our four major concerts annually bring our work to thousands of avid listeners.

The BGMC is a membership association dedicated to producing high quality vocal music in the rich tradition of men's choral singing. Through song, the Chorus endeavors to entertain and enlighten, create harmony and celebrate personal and community pride.





Barbara Wagner, the charter **Artistic Director** of the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus, has served as Minister of Music at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Buffalo (UUCB) since 1962 and was Director of Vocal Activities at Nichols School for more than 24 years.

The Choir at the UUCB, in addition to its Sunday morning responsibilities, enjoyed two highly


acclaimed European tours: the first to Germany, Austria and the Czech Republic and the second to Ireland, Wales, England and Scotland. The Choir under Ms. Wagner's direction has recorded for American Public Radio, performed locally with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra (BPO), Amherst Saxophone Quartet and the Ars Nova Musicians. Ms. Wagner was the conductor for the Peace Odyssey Concert Tour of Hungary and the former Soviet Union. Choral singers from all over the US participated in this tour.

She ran a choral program at Nichols High School that involved more than 100 young singers, including a Concert Chorus, Women's Ensemble, Men's Ensemble and a Mixed Chamber Group. She was also guest conductor for the City of Good Neighbors Chorale, Buffalo's Gay & Lesbian chorus in the mid 1980s.

Ms. Wagner earned a BFA Degree from the State University of New York at Buffalo, where she studied organ with Squire Haskin, and completed graduate work at Westminster Choir College. Her advanced studies include organ study with Karl Richter at the Munich Conservatory and conducting with Raymond Harvey, formerly Assistant Conductor of the BPO and presently Music Director of the Kalamazoo Symphony.

She is a member of the American Choral Director's Association, the Erie County Music Educators Association, MENC, Unitarian Universalist Musicians Network (founding member, former vice president and board member) NYSSMA, the American Guild of Organists (sub-dean and program chair for the Buffalo Chapter), and the Chromatic Club of Buffalo. She was Chair of the New Hymns Task Force of the Unitarian Universalist Association, which recently completed *Singing the Journey*, a brand new supplement to *Singing the Living Tradition*, the hymnbook for the denomination. Ms. Wagner also served on the

She is slated to be included in the upcoming 25th anniversary edition of Who's Who in America. She and the chorus were featured in *About* magazine's June, 2006 edition.





A native of North Carolina, **Debi Overton** (Accompanist,) has held positions as coach/ accompanist at the University of Texas at Austin, and served as director of the Chamber Music Program at The New School of Music in Philadelphia. For many years, she was active at the Summer Music Festival in Aspen, Colorado.As the coach/accompanist for the choral department in Aspen, she served as assistant to noted conductor Fiora Contino. She

has assisted in preparing choruses and soloists for such conductors as Tamara Brooks, John Nelson, Robert Shaw and Sergei Commissiona. Additionally, she has coached with coach/accompanists David Garvey, John Wustman, Brooks Smith and Dalton Baldwin and the local master, Livingston Gearhart.

Ms. Overton has accompanied Master classes for Luciano Pavarotti, Phyllis Curtin, Jessye Norman, Leontyne Price and Sylvia McNair. She has accompanied the regional Metropolitan Opera auditions in Greensboro, NC, Philadelphia, PA,Atlanta, GA and New York City. Considered by her peers to be one of the finest sight readers in the country, she offers nuances and subtle interpretations of music that have been enjoyed and applauded by thousands of listeners throughout the United States. Trained as a concert pianist, she has toured in Europe but prefers the roots, both spiritual and local, offered by a career as a church musician.

In addition to her duties as Organist and Choir Master at Calvary Episcopal Church in Williamsville, Ms. Overton is a past chair of the Music Commission of the WNY Episcopal Diocese, has been a member of the Board of Directors for the American Guild of Organists and is active in Western New York teaching, accompanying and performing with singers and instrumentalists.





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"How Can I Keep from Singing?" This simple Quaker song asked a question that burned in my heart each time I attended a BGMC performance. Each time I heard the group perform my desire to join intensified. My right brain emphatically said "Do it!" while my left brain screamed "Are you out of your mind? You don't have the time!"

By the time the chorus entered at measure 13, tears began to flow as wave after wave of beautiful music washed over me. I couldn't stop "leaking" until after the applause had ended. I had never been so profoundly moved by a performance.

A friend, Buddie Woodridge, brought me to a rehearsal when I was still very much in the closet. My entire life I've always been a bit of an outcast despite my apparent sociability. When I look back, I see myself as a young boy of 7 or 8 years who knew that he liked other boys, but was aware that his family, friends and society around him would not find it easy to accept. So, I kept my thoughts and feelings to myself. I was alone. I became best friends with a few boys in high school and for four years, for the first time, I felt as if I truly belonged to a group. But none of them truly knew all of me.

In college, I met a close gay friend and my one true love but life's journey would take us different places. I was alone again and although I'd not come out of my shell very much, without them, it was like being shown a glimmer of light and then thrust back into darkness. I was still very much closeted. Then came that fateful evening when, despite my fears of going to a place where other gay men congregated so openly, I agreed to accompany Buddie to just watch and listen. Then I spoke with Barb for the first time. She made me feel so welcome and that it was ok to be gay. The most crucial moment for me was accepting Buddie's invitation which led me to Barb who made me feel that there was a chance to finally be true to myself.

As I remember that moment now, I find myself crying because I never realized until this very moment what that magnificent lady did for me. And she doesn't even know it. I don't think I can ever convey to her how that simple act of warmth and love she exuded that night has changed my life in ways I never could have imagined before. I feel that I have grown tremendously as a gay man and have felt a certain sense of being part of a group that I have never known.



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
