



A M s	wood shingled variant of the basic gabled homestead type. Multiple two-story window bays. Windows in gable have pagoda Shaped separate "roof." Corner porch leads to a vestibule with a group of three round arched stained glass windows. Transome Chroughout have leaded and colored glass.

t F S " m w f n s	O. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Variant of the basic homestead type. Crescent Avenue is the longest curvilinear street in the Parkside subdivision, stretching from Humboldt Avenue to Colvin Street. This street appears on Olmsted's early 1870's maps of 'The Parkside." By the 1880's plans for Crescent Avenue had been modified by Olmsted to its current form. Portions of the street were deeded to the city by five different owners over a span of five years, beginning in 1887 near Humboldt and ending in 1892 near Colvin. Crescent Avenue begins and ends within the Parkside subdivision, following Olmsted's rule that a suburban neighborhood street "not lead with special directness toward the town."
