The service, held annually and sponsored by AIDS Family Services in support of people living with HIV/AIDS, caregivers, the bereaved and others affected by the pandemic, included readings from Christian, Jewish and Islamic scriptures and a prayer in the Native American tradition.

# Bernstein rarity on January 16 and 17 concerts

A program note and sneak preview

Music Director Barbara Wagner has chosen a wide spectrum of music for the January concerts that has not only challenged the chorus but will also pique listeners' curiosity.

A highlight of the concert will be Leonard Bernstein's "Dream with Me," a rarely performed yet highly lyrical piece whose origin remains shrouded in mystery. According to the Bernstein estate it was originally published as a song for medium voice and cello. Rumor has it that Adolph Green and Betty Comden heard the melody and wanted to incorporate it into the score of *On the Town*. But no matter where it was placed in the score, it never quite worked, and was dropped from that 1944 show.

Bernstein later wrote incidental music for a stage version of *Peter Pan* that featured Jean Arthur and Boris Karloff. The incidental music turned into several songs and some choruses, which resulted in a show that was not quite a musical, yet not quite a straight play. Although "Dream with Me" is not listed in the original score of the Bernstein version of *Peter Pan*, it seems the composer added it to later productions

It should be noted that "Dream with Me" has nothing to do with the version of *Peter Pan* that Mary Martin starred in on Broadway and television.

We performed at a community concert sponsored by the YWCA Week Without Violence to support the WNY Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Domestic Violence Committee. The BGMC was an integral part of an interfaith community healing service on International AIDS Day organized by AIDS Family Services.

Recognition of our good work is strengthened by invitations from organizations that recognize the excellence of our musical presentations.

We'll be making history on March 13 and 14 when the BGMC makes our first appearance with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra on a program called The French Connection. In April, our Chorus will return to Ithaca to participate in the second Festival of Voices, a showcase for New York State gay and lesbian ensembles. As we have for the past two years, we will proudly sing at Buffalo's Pride Week event. And in July 2004, we will represent Buffalo at the international gathering of over 100 gay and lesbian choruses at the International GALA Festival in Montreal.

We hope to see you on January 16 or 17 for our winter concert, *If Music Be the Food of Love, Play On.* Tickets are available now! On June 18 and 19, 2004, we will present our spring concert, *Singing with Pride*.

We of the BGMC are grateful to you for being there for us. We appreciate your support, not only your monetary gifts, but your attendance at our concerts, sometimes in the most daunting winter weather, and by your willingness to spread the word to your friends and families. In this season of celebration, let me express the profound gratitude and thanks of the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus.

I'm delighted that it's time for another issue of *Crescendo!* because I love writing about BGMC and the work we do. We're now well into our preparations for the winter concerts on January 16 at the Unitarian Universalist Church and January 17 at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church.

The theme is If Music Be the Food of Love, Play On. As you might expect, this kind of open-ended title allows our imaginations to run riot. There's actually a marvelous setting of those Shakespearean words by Henry Purcell and we plan to open and set the tone for the evening with that piece. As always, the program is not only very diverse, but challenging for the chorus. We are constantly striving for the perfect vowel sounds in songs like Daniel Gawthrop's exquisitely mournful "Sing Me to Heaven," Morten Lauridsen's luscious "Dirait-on" and "Winter Song," a Celtic folk song arranged by Jeffrey Jones-Ragona. "Winter Song" is reminiscent of last season's "Stopping By Woods on a Snowy Evening," so prepare yourselves for some transcendent singing.

We're excited about Brazilian composer Ernani Aquiar's setting of Psalm 150 as well as Hungarian composer Gyorgy Orban's "Daemon Irrepit Callidus" (the Demon sneaks expertly tempting the honorable heart). Both of these go like the wind and surprise and delight us in rehearsal with their excitement and new vocal problems to solve. And what program that includes food in its theme would be complete without "Lollipop?" We love a bit of silliness.

For those of you who remember some of the great old sentimental love songs like I do, you'll get

a chance to hear "Drink to me Only With Thine Eyes" as arranged by Robert Shaw and Alice Parker. I want to weep every time I hear my "boys" sing it. There's lots more, including the gorgeous Leonard Bernstein "Dream With Me" as arranged for the New York City Gay Men's Chorus by Larry Moore (see Tim Fox's sneak preview program note on the front page), "Who Will Buy" from Oliver, "I Remember It Well" from Gigi, and "Good Old A Cappella," a song made popular by the Nylons.

As we celebrate the beginning of our third year together, we are grateful for the support of our wonderful audiences, the commitment of our nonsinging members, the work of the Friends of BGMC, the dedication of our hardworking volunteers, the successes of our singers and the love and concern we have for one another. It surely does "take a village."

If any of you would like to attend one of our spirited rehearsals, you are most welcome any Tuesday evening at the Unitarian Universalist Church beginning at 7 PM. The coffee break feasts are something to experience! Drop in and see what the magic is all about and please plan to attend our concerts in January!
