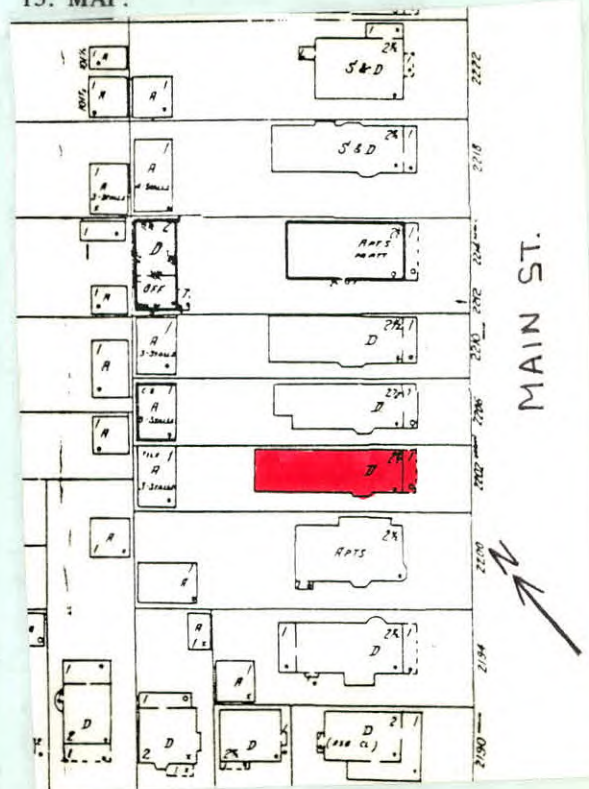

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

(Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located three blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story frame with front facing gable roof. Full-width flat roof porch with projecting eave. Fluted doric columns support entablature. Dentils under cornice. Open work stick balustrade. Glass paneled door with sidelights. Wrightian styled leaded glass. Three part double-hung first floor window, SIGNIFICANCE 1/1 lights. Upper porch stick balustrade. Second floor has two semi-hexagonal bays.

19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: c. 1899

Double hung 1/1 windows.

ARCHITECT: Entablature window surrounds. Glass paneled porch door on right bay. Pedimented gable, shingled. Four horizontal light window. Cornice window head.
 BUILDER: South side has two story semi-hexagonal bay with gable

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

dormer. Cornice end returns.
 A plain gabled frame with simplified Colonial Revival styling. Originally the Buffalo and Williamsville Macadam Road, Main Street was a pre-existing street at the time Olmsted designated it as the eastern border for "The Parkside." While the streets within the subdivision were designed specifically to avoid commercial development, this portion of Main Street became a combination of commercial and residential structures. It was also a major thoroughfare into the city, allowing easy access to downtown from this suburban neighborhood.
