

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

Building is situated on a standard sized lot within Olmsted's Parkside subdivision. House is located two blocks from Delaware Park, which was designed by Olmsted and is listed on the National Register, and southeast of the Zoo.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

Two and a half story Colonial Revival style. Hip roof with modillion blocks under eave. Full-width porch. Glass paneled door flanked by leaded sidelights. Two story semi-hexagonal bay window. First floor single light windows with leaded transoms. Second floor 1/1 windows. Second floor bowed bay has single light <u>SIGNIFICANCE</u> windows with leaded transom. End fluted pilaster 19. DATE OF INITIAL CONSTRUCTION: <u>c. 1908</u> <u>strips. Hip roof dormer</u> has pair 1/1 windows with <u>ARCHITECT:</u> <u>end paneled pilaster</u> strips.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Simplified form of Colonial Revival style. Summit Avenue is a truncated northsouth street, located between Woodward and Crescent Avenues and extending from West Oakwood Place to the northern section of Crescent Avenue. A similar street, ending south of Jewett Avenue, appears in Olmsted's early 1870's maps of "The Parkside." Summit Avenue was deeded to the city in 1889, except for the small section between Amherst and Crescent which was deeded in 1892. This street follows Olmsted's rule that it "not lead with special directness toward the town."
